And he stood up and followed Him. ¹⁰ Then it happened that as Jesus was reclining *at the table* in the house, behold, many tax collectors and sinners came and were dining with Jesus and His disciples. ¹¹ And when the Pharisees saw *this*, they said to His disciples, "Why is your Teacher eating with the tax collectors and sinners?" ¹² But when Jesus heard *this*, He said, "*It is* not those who are healthy who need a physician, but those who are sick. ¹³ "But go and learn what this means: 'I DESIRE COMPASSION, AND NOT SACRIFICE,' for I did not come to call the righteous, but sinners."

Review

The Author

Matthew 9:9 LSB

⁹ And as Jesus went on from there, <u>He saw a man called Matthew</u>, sitting in the tax office; and He said to him, "Follow Me!" And he stood up and followed Him.

The Gospel of Matthew Was Written By a Profaned Character!

Who was Matthew and what was his background?

"The Talmud distinguishes two classes of 'publicans:' the tax-gatherer in general (Gabbai), and the Mokhes, or Mokhsa, who was specially the douanier or custom-house official. The Gabbai collected the regular dues, which consisted of ground-, income-, and poll-tax. ... The Mokhes collected a kind of duty on imports and exports, on all that was bought and sold, and on all kinds of property." ~ Alfred Edersheim

- Gabbai = handled the basic state taxes (land, income, poll tax).
- Mokhes = handled customs duties and tolls, and was more despised because his work opened the door to corruption and abuse.

[Tax collectors] were classed with harlots and heathens. They were excommunicated in the synagogues, their testimony was not admitted in Jewish courts, and the Rabbis reckoned it disgraceful to associate with them." ~ Alfred Edersheim (*The Life and Times of Jesus the Messiah*, Book III, ch. 17, ccel.org link)

"As the Rabbis taught, there is no hope of restitution from a tax-gatherer; to take his alms was a sin. A Jew who became a publican was regarded as cut off from the congregation of Israel." ~ Alfred Edersheim (*Sketches of Jewish Social Life*, ch. 4, biblestudytools.com link)

Discussion Questions

Pastor Brandon said he "cannot overstate the importance of the local church." Why do you think Jesus promises in Matthew 16:18 that "the gates of Hades will not overpower" His church? How does that promise encourage you to stay committed to a local body when attendance trends or cultural pressures go the other way?

The sermon noted that many people have stopped attending church or have replaced gathering with online ministries or other activities. What are some dangers of "going it alone" in the Christian life? How can we graciously encourage friends or family who have stepped away from the local church?

Pastor Brandon reminded us of <u>Ephesians 6:12-13</u>, that our struggle is "not against flesh and blood." How does recognizing a spiritual battle shape the way you respond to tragedies or public events? What does "taking up the full armor of God" look like in daily habits this week?

Jesus warns in <u>Luke 14:28</u> to "count the cost" of following Him. What "costs" have you personally experienced, or expect to experience, because you follow Christ? How does remembering the surpassing worth of Christ help you endure those costs?

Read <u>Matthew 9:9</u> again. Matthew leaves everything at a single command: "Follow Me." What does this immediate obedience teach us about the nature of Jesus' call? Where might God be calling you to take a decisive step of obedience right now?

Jesus dined with tax collectors and sinners (vv. 10-11). Why was this so scandalous to the Pharisees? How can our group or church imitate Jesus' willingness to share the table with those society—or even Christians—might consider "unclean"?

In <u>Matthew 9:13</u>, Jesus quotes Hosea: "I desire compassion, and not sacrifice." How can religious activity become a substitute for genuine compassion or mercy? What practical acts of compassion could you show this month?

Pastor Brandon said followers of Jesus will "receive overwhelming criticism." Where have you seen criticism or misunderstanding because of your faith? How can we encourage one another to stand firm when criticized?

Tax collectors like Matthew were viewed as beyond hope. What does his conversion reveal about Christ's ability to save anyone? Who in your life seems far from God, and how can this passage fuel your prayers for them?

Charles Templeton admired Jesus yet turned away because of doubts about God's goodness. When have you wrestled with similar doubts, and how did God meet you there?

Sinner, we shall know whether God calls you by this: if he calls, it will be an effectual call—not a call which you hear and then forget but one which produces good works. ~ **Charles Spurgeon**

Discussion Questions

Irresistible Command – Jesus simply says, "Follow Me," and Matthew immediately obeys (Matt 9:9; Luke 5:28). What does this teach about the authority of Jesus' call? How does this compare to your own experience of coming to faith?

Counting the Cost – Matthew left wealth, security, and career (Phil 3:7). What might "leaving everything" look like in our culture today?

Overflowing Joy – Matthew hosted a banquet for other "tax collectors and sinners" (Matt 9:10). Why is joy a natural fruit of salvation? How can we cultivate that same eagerness to share Christ with friends and neighbors?

New Believer Zeal – The sermon compared Matthew's excitement to new believers today. How can seasoned Christians keep their first-love passion alive (Rev 2:4-5)? What practical ways can your group encourage someone recently saved?

Expecting Opposition – The Pharisees grumbled at Jesus' table fellowship (Matt 9:11). When have you faced criticism for preaching the truth or sharing the gospel? How does Jesus' response in Matt 9:12–13 help you endure misunderstanding?

Association without Compromise – Scripture warns against joining in sin (e.g., 2 Cor 6:14). How do we balance Jesus' example of befriending sinners with the call to holiness? What safeguards help you engage the lost without drifting toward their lifestyle?

"I Desire Compassion, Not Sacrifice" – Quoting <u>Hosea 6:6</u>, Jesus rebuked the Pharisees. In what ways can religious activity become empty sacrifice? Where might God be calling you to show concrete mercy this week?

Avoiding a Pharisaical Spirit – The Pharisees added burdens but offered no cure. What signs warn that we are slipping into self-righteousness? How can the gospel free us from judging others while still calling sin what it is?

Faith That Acts – <u>Hebrews 11</u> highlights Noah, Abraham, Moses, and Rahab who obeyed despite risk. Which example most challenges you to step out in faith?

Compassionate Reputation – The sermon closed by asking if people know us more for what we hate than for Christ's love. How would your neighbors and your family describe your witness?

The Gospel

God

Created and owns everything

Gen 1:1—In the beginning God created the Heavens and the Earth

<u>Psalm 24:1</u>—The earth is the Lord's, and all it contains, the world and those who dwell in it.

Is Perfectly Holy

<u>1 John 1:5</u>—This is the message we heard from Him and announce to you that God is light and in Him there is no darkness at all.

Requires perfect obedience to His Law

Man

Christ

Came to earth both as God and sinless man

<u>Col 2:9</u>—For in Him the fullness of deity dwells in bodily form

Demonstrated God's love by dying on the cross to pay sin's penalty

<u>Rom 5:8</u>—But God demonstrated His own love toward us, in that while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us

<u>2 Cor 5:21</u>—He made Him who knew no sin to be sin on our behalf so that we might become the righteousness of God in Him.

Rose from the grave and is alive today

<u>1 Cor 15:4</u>—And that He was buried, and that He was raised on the third day according to the Scriptures

Sinners

Must repent of all that dishonors God

<u>Isa 55:7</u>—Let the wicked forsake his way and the unrighteous man his thoughts; and let him return to the Lord, and He will have compassion on him and to our God, for He will abundantly pardon.

<u>Luke 9:23</u>—if anyone wishes to come after Me, he must deny himself, and take us his cross daily and follow Me.

Must believe in Christ as Lord and Savior

<u>Rom 10:9</u>—that if you confess with your mouth Jesus as Lord and believe in your heart that God raised Him from the dead, you shall be saved.

Will you repent and believe in Christ?

<u>Acts 17:30</u>—therefore having overlooked the times of ignorance God is declaring to men that all everywhere should repent.

All who have heard the Gospel preached have been called to some extent. The Word of God calls every sinner to repent and trust the Savior, but that call brings nobody to Christ unless it is accompanied by the special effectual call of the Holy Spirit. ~ **Charles Spurgeon**

The general call of the gospel is like the common "cluck" of the hen which she is always giving when her chickens are around her. But if there is any danger impending, then she gives a very peculiar call, quite different from the ordinary one, and the little chicks come running as fast as they can, and hide for safety under her wings. That is the call we want, God's peculiar and effectual call to his own. ~ **Charles Spurgeon**

Call" and its cognates are used by Paul to express an "effectual" calling. What is meant is not an "invitation" but the powerful and irresistible reaching out of God in grace to bring people into his kingdom. ~ **Douglas J. Moo**

Effectual calling, sometimes called the *internal call*, is this: God sovereignly, efficaciously summons (John Murray's word) the elect into fellowship with Christ. ~ **John Frame**

They were set apart before they were created, they were legally set apart by the purchase of Christ, they are manifestly and visibly set apart by the effectual calling of the Spirit of grace. ~ **Charles Spurgeon**

There is also an effectual call of God in the life of the believer. It is a call that brings about its desired effect. Effectual calling is related to the power of God in regenerating the sinner from spiritual death. It is sometimes referred to as "irresistible grace." ~ R. C. Sproul

Many people will find themselves in hell eventually who have heard the general call. There are men who are living in sin and gloating in it who can tell you exactly what the gospel says. They can describe what the call to

repentance means, and what the offer of the gospel means. They have a general intellectual knowledge of it. They have heard the general call, but they have not responded to it; it has not been 'effectual' in their cases. ~ David Martyn Lloyd-Jones (Welsh Preacher and Writer)

God's sovereignty in election, redemption, effectual calling, and regeneration does not render humans' response to the gospel irrelevant. Rather, God's initiating power makes our believing response possible by imparting life to the dead. ~ R. C. Sproul

The other kind of call is internal, specific, and effectual. That is, it not only issues the invitation, it also provides the ability or willingness to respond positively. It is God's drawing to himself or bringing to spiritual life the one who without that call would remain spiritually dead and far from him. ~ **James**Montgomery Boice

The preaching of the gospel represents the outward call of God. This call is heard audibly by both the elect and the nonelect. Human beings have the ability to resist and refuse the outward call. He will not respond to the outward call in faith unless or until the outward call is accompanied by the effectual inward call of the Holy Spirit. ~ **R. C. Sproul**

Effectual calling is the *sovereign summons* of God. ~ **Joel Beeke; Paul M. Smalley**

God "stirs up" the spirits of His elect when the effectual call comes to them, and not till then do they have any willingness to respond to the Divine proclamation. ~ **Arthur Walkington Pink**

The evidence of God's effectual call is a heart made willing to respond. Divine grace is able to subdue every lust, conquer every prejudice, surmount every difficulty. ~ **Arthur Walkington Pink**
