The Incompatibility of Righteousness

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The King and His Glory / Old Testament; New Testament / Matthew 9:14–17 In Matthew 9:14-17, Jesus gives two critical reasons why righteousness from God and man's righteousness are incompatible.

Proposition and Outline

In Matthew 9:14-17, Jesus provides two key reasons why righteousness from God and man's righteousness are incompatible. You can know they are incompatible because only true righteousness:

- Only True Righteousness Equates with Jesus
- Only True Righteousness Exists in His Kingdom

Only True Righteousness Equates with Jesus (<u>Matt 9:14-15</u>)

Matthew 9:14 LSB

¹⁴ Then the disciples of John came to Him, asking, "Why do we and the Pharisees fast, but Your disciples do not fast?"

Who are the disciples of John?

John 1:35-37 LSB

³⁵ On the next day, John again was standing with two of his disciples, ³⁶ and he looked at Jesus as He walked, and said, "Behold, the Lamb of God!" ³⁷ And the two disciples heard him speak and followed Jesus.

Acts 19:1-3 LSB

¹ Now it happened that while Apollos was at Corinth, Paul passed through the upper regions and came to Ephesus and found some disciples. ² And he said to them, "Did you receive the Holy Spirit when you believed?" And they *said* to him, "No, we have not even heard if the Holy Spirit is *being received*." ³ And he said, "Into what then were you baptized?" And they said, "Into John's baptism."

Their Question

OT Fasting

Leviticus 16:29-31 LSB

²⁹ "And *this* shall be a perpetual statute for you: in the seventh month, on the tenth day of the month, you shall humble your souls and not do any work, whether the native or the sojourner who sojourns among you; ³⁰ for it is on this day that atonement shall be made for you to cleanse you; you will be clean from all your sins before Yahweh. ³¹ "It is to be a sabbath of solemn rest for you, that you may humble your souls; it is a perpetual statute.

Luke 18:12 LSB

¹² 'I fast twice a week; I pay tithes of all that I get.'

Matthew 6:1 LSB

¹ "Beware of doing your righteousness before men to be noticed by them; otherwise you have no reward with your Father who is in heaven.

Religious ritual and routine have always been dangers to true godliness. Many ceremonies, such as praying to saints and lighting a candle for a deceased relative are actually heretical. But even if it is not wrong in itself, when a form of praying, worshiping, or serving becomes the focus of attention, it becomes a barrier to true righteousness. It can keep an unbeliever from trusting in God and a believer from faithfully obeying Him. Even going to church, reading the Bible, saying grace at meals, and singing hymns can become lifeless routines in which true worship of God has no part. A fast is always meaningless if it is performed from habit and does not result from deep concern and mourning over some spiritual need. Going to church on Sunday is hypocritical if it is done apart from a genuine desire to worship and glorify God. Singing a hymn is only a pretense of worship if it does not come from a heart that seeks to praise the Lord. ~ John MacArthur

Jesus's Response to the Disciples

¹⁵ And Jesus said to them, "Can the attendants of the bridegroom mourn as long as the bridegroom is with them? But the days will come when the bridegroom is taken away from them, and then they will fast.

Acts 2:22-23 LSB

²² "Men of Israel, listen to these words: Jesus the Nazarene, a man attested to you by God with miracles and wonders and signs which God did through Him in your midst, just as you yourselves know— ²³ this *Man*, delivered over by the predetermined plan and foreknowledge of God, you nailed to a cross by the hands of lawless men and put *Him* to death.

Discussion Questions

Pastor Brandon said God's Word "anchors us in the stormy sea." How has Scripture been an anchor for you in recent trials?

When Jesus called Matthew, he immediately obeyed. What does Matthew's example teach us about responding to Christ's call in our own lives?

Matthew's joy led him to invite others to meet Jesus. How does joy in Christ naturally lead to evangelism? How have you seen this in your life?

The Pharisees criticized Jesus for eating with "sinners." How should we prepare ourselves to face criticism when we follow Jesus in ways that challenge cultural or religious expectations?

What differences did Pastor Brandon highlight between Pharisaic righteousness and the righteousness of Jesus? Which of these contrasts stood out most to you, and why?

The disciples of John asked a sincere question about fasting. How do we discern the difference between a sincere question and a disguised accusation?

Religious practices like prayer, fasting, and church attendance can either be expressions of true worship or lifeless rituals. How can we guard against turning good disciplines into empty routines?

Jesus compared His presence to a wedding feast with the Bridegroom. What does this imagery teach us about the joy of being with Christ?

Jesus said His disciples would fast after He was taken away. What role should fasting play for believers today, and how should our motives differ from the Pharisees'?

Pastor Brandon said only true righteousness equates with Jesus and His Kingdom. How does this truth challenge the way we think about "being a good Christian"?

What are some examples of "man-made righteousness" in our culture or churches today that we need to guard against?

How does <u>2 Corinthians 5:21</u> (Christ becoming sin for us so that we might become righteous in Him) give you assurance and freedom in your walk with God?

Only True Righteousness Exists in His Kingdom (<u>Matt</u> 9:16-17)

True Righteousness Cannot Attach to Pharisaical Righteousness

Matthew 9:16 LSB

¹⁶ "But no one puts a patch of unshrunk cloth on an old garment; for the patch pulls away from the garment, and a worse tear results.

Human beings would like to think that they can attain God's standard of righteousness merely by adding to their own, but since the two kinds of righteousness are different in nature, this is impossible. ~ **James Montgomery Boice**

Our Old Lives Cannot Contain True Righteousness

Matthew 9:17 LSB

¹⁷ "Nor do *people* put new wine into old wineskins; otherwise the wineskins burst, and the wine pours out and the wineskins are ruined; but they put new wine into fresh wineskins, and both are preserved."

The only suitable container for new wine is a fresh wineskin. In the same way, the only life that can contain true righteousness is the new life given by God when a person repents of his sin and trusts in Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior. ~ John MacArthur

2 Corinthians 5:17 LSB

¹⁷ Therefore if anyone is in Christ, *he is* a new creation; the old things passed away; behold, new things have come.

Conceit of our own righteousness sticks to us as the skin to the flesh. Sooner may the leopard lose his spots than the proud man his self-righteousness. ~ Charles Spurgeon

Discussion Questions

Jesus compared Pharisaical righteousness to patching an old garment with unshrunk cloth. What does this teach us about trying to "add" Jesus to a self-righteous or tradition-based system?

In what ways do people today try to combine legalistic or cultural traditions with the gospel? Have you ever been tempted to do this yourself?

Pastor Brandon emphasized that Jesus didn't come to reform Pharisaical religion but to replace it. How does this change the way we think about

following Jesus—especially when it means leaving behind comfortable habits or traditions?

Why is new life in Christ the only "container" suitable for true righteousness? How does this image of new wineskins help you understand salvation and transformation?

What are some examples of trying to "pour new wine into old wineskins" in the Christian life (e.g., clinging to old patterns, legalism, or sin while claiming new life in Christ)?

How does John MacArthur's statement that "the only life that can contain true righteousness is the new life given by God" encourage or challenge you personally?

Pastor Brandon reminded us that the old wineskins don't represent God's Law, but rabbinical traditions that contradicted God's Word. Why is it important to distinguish between God's Law (fulfilled in Christ) and man-made traditions?

Pastor Brandon concluded that true believers show obedience, joy, perseverance, and detachment from their old lives. Which of these four do you find most difficult right now, and why?

Jesus said in Matthew 16:24–25 that following Him means denying ourselves and taking up our cross. What does that look like in your daily life?

How does <u>James 1:2–4</u> reshape your perspective on trials you are currently facing?

In what ways can we encourage one another as a group to live with joy and perseverance in true righteousness rather than slipping back into lifeless or legalistic patterns?

The Gospel

God

Created and owns everything

<u>Gen 1:1</u>—In the beginning God created the Heavens and the Earth

<u>Psalm 24:1</u>—The earth is the Lord's, and all it contains, the world and those who dwell in it.

Is Perfectly Holy

<u>1 John 1:5</u>—This is the message we heard from Him and announce to you that God is light and in Him there is no darkness at all.

Matt 5:48—Therefore you are to be perfect as your heavenly Father is perfect.

Requires perfect obedience to His Law

<u>James 2:10</u>—for whoever keeps the whole law and yet stumbles in one point, he has become guilty of all.

Man

Has broken God's law

<u>Rom 3:10,23</u>—there is none righteous, not even one...for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God

Will pay the eternal penalty for his sin

<u>Rom. 6:23</u>—For the wages of sin is death, but the free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord

Cannot save himself by his good works

<u>Titus 3:5</u>—He saved us not based on works which we have done in righteousness, but according to His mercy, by the washing of regeneration and renewing by the Holy Spirit.

Christ

Came to earth both as God and sinless man

<u>Col 2:9</u>—For in Him the fullness of deity dwells in bodily form

Demonstrated God's love by dying on the cross to pay sin's penalty

<u>Rom 5:8</u>—But God demonstrated His own love toward us, in that while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us

<u>2 Cor 5:21</u>—He made Him who knew no sin to be sin on our behalf so that we might become the righteousness of God in Him.

Rose from the grave and is alive today

<u>1 Cor 15:4</u>—And that He was buried, and that He was raised on the third day according to the Scriptures

Sinners

Must repent of all that dishonors God

<u>Isa 55:7</u>—Let the wicked forsake his way and the unrighteous man his thoughts; and let him return to the Lord, and He will have compassion on him and to our God, for He will abundantly pardon.

<u>Luke 9:23</u>—if anyone wishes to come after Me, he must deny himself, and take us his cross daily and follow Me.

Must believe in Christ as Lord and Savior

<u>Rom 10:9</u>—that if you confess with your mouth Jesus as Lord and believe in your heart that God raised Him from the dead, you shall be saved.

Will you repent and believe in Christ?

<u>Acts 17:30</u>—therefore having overlooked the times of ignorance God is declaring to men that all everywhere should repent.

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Further Quotes

Unfallen Adam was righteous, but it was his own righteousness as a created being, it was the righteousness of a man. Adam never had the righteousness of Jesus Christ upon him. What he lost was his own righteousness. But you and I are not merely given back a human righteousness, the righteousness that Adam had before he fell—we are given the righteousness of Jesus Christ. ~

Rather, "the righteousness of God" involves a *declaration* of righteousness before God. It is a forensic term signifying that people who are still sinners stand as not guilty before God because of the gift of God's righteousness. ~ **Thomas Schreiner**

God looks at men and women in their sins, and applying to them the righteousness of Christ, declares them to be just. That is *imputed* righteousness. But in sanctification, we are discussing *imparted* righteousness. Not the righteousness that is put to my account, but the righteousness that is created within me and produced within me. The law was given, in order to convert a great into a little man—to show that you have no power of your own for righteousness; and might thus, poor, needy, and destitute, flee to grace. ~ **Saint Augustine of Hippo**

Beware of self-righteousness. The black devil of licentiousness destroys his hundreds, but the white devil of self-righteousness destroys his thousands. ~ **Charles Spurgeon**

Specifically we should notice that he is not suggesting that people can make a strong effort and achieve the righteousness of which he is writing: it is a given righteousness, not an achieved righteousness. The blessed do not achieve it

but *hunger and thirst* for it. They *will be filled*, which surely means that God will fill them (cf. 6:33, "his righteousness") ~ **Leon Lamb Morris**

Thus, those who "hunger and thirst for righteousness" long to live righteously, and for righteousness to prevail in the world. It is a passionate desire, which begins with one's own life, that all things should be lived in line with God's will. ~ **R. Kent Hughes**

It is God's righteousness that disciples must seek. ~ Leon Lamb Morris

God begins his good work in us, therefore, by arousing love and desire and zeal for righteousness in our hearts; or, to speak more correctly, by bending, forming, and directing, our hearts to righteousness. He completes his work, moreover, by confirming us to perseverance. ~ John Calvin (French Reformer)

Holiness is the standard, and righteousness is its active fulfillment. Or you might say His holiness is His complete separation from all that is sinful, and His righteousness is the manifestation of that holiness. ~ **John F. MacArthur**

It seems legitimate to affirm, therefore, that 'the righteousness of God' is God's righteous initiative in putting sinners right with himself, by bestowing on them a righteousness which is not their own but his. 'The righteousness of God' is God's just justification of the unjust, his righteous way of pronouncing the unrighteous righteous, in which he both demonstrates his righteousness and gives righteousness to us. He has done it through Christ, the righteous one, who died for the unrighteous, as Paul will explain later. And he does it by faith when we put our trust in him, and cry to him for mercy. ~ **John Robert Walmsley Stott (English Preacher)**

Kingdom points to rule, and the expression is to be understood in terms of doing the will of God now as well as looking for the coming of his final kingdom. The important thing for the disciple is to be constantly seeking to do the things that God wills, that is, to be submissive to the King. In this context seeking God's *righteousness* (not our righteousness) will mean seeking that righteousness which God only can give (there is no thought that the believer by his own efforts can attain a righteousness that may fitly be called "God's") ~

When we say that God *imputes* Christ's righteousness to us it means that God *thinks of* Christ's righteousness as belonging to us, or regards it *as belonging to* us. ~ **Wayne Grudem**

I have always felt that <u>Matthew 5:20</u> was the key to this important sermon: "For I say unto you, that except your righteousness shall exceed the righteousness of the scribes and Pharisees, ye shall in no case enter into the kingdom of heaven." The main theme is true righteousness. The religious leaders had an artificial, external righteousness based on Law. But the righteousness Jesus described is a true and vital righteousness that begins internally, in the heart. The Pharisees were concerned about the minute details of conduct, but they neglected the major matter of *character*. Conduct flows out of character. ~
