- 1. Before describing the final judgments on earth before Christ returns, God reveals to the earth the reality of the coming end. It is a sober **last call** to humanity to repent.
- 2. The angel making the announcement of the coming final judgments is imposing and has the glory and majesty of coming from the presence of God (10:1). His announcement is to the whole world as indicated by standing on land and sea (v. 2). His announcement is sobering and terrifying like that of the roar of a lion (v.3)
- 3. What does this angel swear by in v. 6? What does this indicate about the truthfulness and certainty of his announcement?
- 4. What does he announce in v.6?
- 5. What does v. 7 indicate will no longer be delayed? "NOTE: "Mysterious" refers to things the Old Testament prophets prophesied but that they didn't understand or comprehend. Daniel 12 describes some of these. What does Daniel 12:1-2 say were some of these events? What is Daniel told to do in 12:4? What does Daniel say about these prophecies and what was the angel's response in 12:8-10?
- 6. Why do you think God gives a final warning of "no more delay?" What does 2 Peter 3:9 tell us about why God delays?
- 7. Read Rev. 10:8-11. What is John told to do? What effect will the message of the little book will have on him when he eats it? What do you think this is telling us? In what way is the message of the coming of God's judgments on earth sweet to a Christian? Why? In what way is the message bitter for a Christian? Why?
- 8. Revelation 11:1-2 describes God's final testimony to the nations. What does 11:1-2 say will happen? NOTE: the 'temple' refers to the one in Jerusalem. It indicates Israel will be back in their land, in their original capital city. How would that reality be a testimony to the nations from God of the certainty of His prophecies of future judgment?
- 9. What does Rev. 11:2 tell us about the situation for Israel in the last days? How is that starting to come to pass now?
- 10. Read Rev. 11:3-6 NOTE: God doesn't tell us who they are. They could be Elijah and Moses or two men who minister with the same power as they did. In 11:3 what will they do? NOTE: 'prophesy' meant to declare God's message. What message do you think they are declaring? What is the world's response to their message in Rev. 9:20-21? What Message did Jesus tell us to declare in Luke 24:47?
- 11. What are these two witnesses able to do in Rev. 11:5? Why would that be a testimony for the nations to repent?
- 12. What authority does God give the two witnesses to do in Rev. 11:6 and the end of 11:10? Theis reveals that all the judgments on the earth are announced and caused by God's prophets so the world knows GOD is the one doing them. What does this reveal about God's heart for man?
- 13. What does Rev. 11:7-11 indicate about the way the world feels about these two prophets? What does it reveal about mankind's' heart towards God?

- 14. In 11:9, what technology is indicated by the fact the whole world will simultaneously look at the bodies of these two witnesses? How is this a witness of God to people to repent?
- 15. What happens to the two witnesses in Rev. 11:11-12? How is this a witness for the nations to repent? NOTE: this same miracle is done by the antichrist in raising from the dead and in contrast to the two witnesses, the whole world worships him (Rev. 13:3-4). Why do you think this is so? What does Ephesians 2:1-3 and 1 Corinthians 2:14 reveal about man that would explain this?
- 16. Read Rev. 11:15-17. What does v. 15 say will certainly happen? In 11:16-17, What effect does this reality have on the 24 elders (representing believers)?
- 17. In 11:18 what effect does God's judgments have on the nation? What does this verse tell us will certainly happen?
- 18. How does what you learned from Revelation 10 & 11 affect the way you view the future? The way you view non-Christians? The way you view God? Take time to pray: give thanks and pray for those you know who do not yet know Christ as savior.
