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LORD'S DAY DEVOTION AND QUESTIONS

In Genesis 1:26-28 we are given a panoramic view of creation, where God creates man and woman in his image and gives them dominion over all the earth. In this passage, man and woman are presented as the crowning jewel of creation, image bearers of God, exercising authority over the earth and all that is in it.

Then, in Genesis 2, we zoom in on the earth and are shown how that God-given dominion mandate is to be applied: man is placed in a garden (a place of order and beauty) and is to exercise dominion by tending the garden, working in it, and expanding it over the earth.

The man is free to eat of any of the trees in the garden, save one; the tree of the knowledge of good and evil. If the man obeys this one command, he and his posterity will be confirmed in his obedience and enjoy true freedom and liberty. But if he disobeys, he and his posterity will suffer death and bondage and separation from the Creator. This is what we refer to as the covenant of works (or covenant of life).

- 1. Read Genesis 1:26-28. What are some ways God clearly sets the man and woman apart from all the other creatures? Why is this important? How does the dominion of the man and woman over the earth reflect God's dominion over all creation?
- 2. Read Genesis 2:1-16. How is the garden of Eden described? Would you want to live there? What does the beauty and abundance of the garden reveal about God's goodness to his creatures? Is the beauty of creation maintained after the Fall? In what ways is it maintained and in what ways is it not?
- 3. Consider this Q & A from the Westminster Larger Catechism:
 - Q. 20. What was the providence of God toward man in the estate in which he was created?

A. The providence of God toward man in the estate in which he was created, was the placing him in paradise, appointing him to dress it, giving him liberty to eat of the fruit of the earth; putting the creatures under his dominion, and ordaining marriage for his help; affording him communion with himself; instituting the sabbath; entering into a covenant of life with him, upon condition of personal, perfect, and perpetual obedience, of which the tree of life was a pledge; and forbidding to eat of the tree of knowledge of good and evil, upon the pain of death.

What were the benefits of the covenant God made with man? What were the consequences for breaking that covenant?

4. We know that man broke the covenant of works (or covenant of life). But God graciously rescued us from those consequences with another covenant. Look up Westminster Larger Catechism Q & A 30 and 31 and give the name of that covenant and who that covenant is made with.
