Confession of Faith

The Westminster Shorter Catechism

- Q. 88. What are the outward means by which Christ communicates to us the benefits of redemption?
- **A.** The outward and ordinary means by which Christ communicates to us the benefits of redemption are his ordinances, especially the Word, sacraments, and prayer; all of which are made effectual to the elect for salvation.
- **Q. 89.** How is the Word made effectual to salvation?
- A. The Spirit of God makes the reading, but especially the preaching, of the Word an effectual means of convincing and converting sinners, and of building them up in holiness and comfort, through faith to salvation.
- **Q. 90.** How is the Word to be read and heard, that it may become effectual to salvation?
- A. That the Word may become effectual to salvation we must attend to it with diligence, preparation, and prayer; receive it with faith and love; lay it up in our hearts; and practice it in our lives.

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LORD'S DAY DEVOTION AND QUESTIONS

In teaching us how to pray, Jesus gave us six petitions or requests to pray on a regular basis. The second of these petitions is "Thy kingdom come." What does it mean for us to request this in prayer? It means that we are asking God to bring more and more of the realities of heaven into our age. We want him to subdue our sin by his mighty power. We want him to bring people to saving faith. We want Christ to return and establish his visible reign. Our greatest desire is to be with Christ in glory, and in this prayer we are asking the Lord to bring that reality about in greater measure now until that time when Christ will fully establish his Kingdom at his return.

In his book, *The Majesty on High: Introduction to the Kingdom of God in the New Testament*, S.M. Baugh has a wonderful definition of what the Kingdom of God is that we should consider. While some of the language might sound a bit technical, the overall tone is encouraging and full of hope. He writes:

The kingdom of God proper is the fully eschatological new heavens and new earth inhabited by the redeemed, resurrected saints in glory and incorruptibility where the triune God triumphantly rules supreme in the presence of his people forever. As the new creation, then, the kingdom of God will encompass all created reality at the end of this age extending to all eternity. But the exciting thing about the kingdom of God is that this new creation reality has already been definitively inaugurated with the incarnation, the cross-work, the ascension, and the glorification to all rule and authority in this age and in the world to come by Jesus, the Messiah.

- 1. For review from last Sunday, what does it mean to "hallow" God's name? Why is this the first petition given by Jesus in teaching us to pray?
- 2. Read Philippians 3:17-21 and Ephesians 1:13-14. What do these passages say about our current status in relation to heavenly glory? What does this mean for where our main allegiance should be?
- 3. What sins in particular are you currently struggling with? Take a moment to pray and ask the Lord to rule and reign over your soul, and ask him to weaken the influence those particular sins have in your life.
- 4. Consider the third point of the sermon and the longing we have for Christ to return. How does our longing for Christ's return help, not hinder, our witness in this life?
- 5. In preparation for next Sunday, what do you think it means to pray, "Thy will be done"? Why might this be a challenging prayer for some Christians? How is it a comforting prayer?
