LORD'S DAY DEVOTION AND QUESTIONS

The Book of Jonah demonstrates how God cares for lost sinners—that they should repent of their sins and place their faith in him. The way God shows his concern for them is by sending them prophets to preach a message of repentance and forgiveness. The same is true today. However, in Jonah chapter 1, the prophet Jonah showed little to no concern for Israel's enemy, the Ninevites. In fact, when the Lord commissioned Jonah to preach in Nineveh, he ran the other way (Jonah 1:3). Although Jonah was reluctant and unfaithful to his calling, you and I have the greater Jonah who faithfully and willingly preached to his enemies the good news of the Kingdom of God—the Lord Jesus Christ. Unlike Jonah, Jesus even died for his enemies (Romans 5:7-8). In Jonah 1, we look forward to what the Lord Jesus would do for his people by examining Jonah's disobedience. What a faithful, merciful, and loving Savior you and I have in the Lord Jesus, the greater Jonah.

Commenting on Jonah 1:12, Richard Philips writes:

Jonah's "death" in the deep also looks forward in redemptive history, finding its ultimate meaning in the death of Jesus Christ. It was Jesus who compared his own death to that of Jonah: "For just as Jonah was three days and three nights in the belly of the great fish, so will the Son of Man be three days and three nights in the heart of the earth" (Matt. 12:40). There are major differences between Jonah and Jesus, of course. Jonah is guilty of his own sin, having refused God's will. Jesus bore only the sins of others, in obedience to the will of the Father. Yet Jonah is a type of Christ; he is an Old Testament figure who represents at least one aspect of Jesus and his saving work. Jacques Ellul explains the connection: "If it is true that the sacrifice of a man who takes his condemnation can save others around him, then this is far more true when the one sacrificed is the Son of God. (Jonah & Micah, Reformed Expository Commentary, 60–61)

- 1. Read verse 3. According to the sermon, what is the significance of the repeated phrases, "the presence of the Lord" and "went down"? How do they relate to apostasy (see Genesis 4:16, 38:1)? What did Jesus do that Jonah refused to do (see Romans 5:7-8)?
- 2. As soon as Jonah got into the boat to flee the presence of the Lord, he went down into it and fell asleep (v. 5). How do Jonah's actions reveal his unloving character toward the sailors? Can you relate to his actions? As opposed to Jonah, what did Jesus do to show he loved people (see Mark 4:35-41)?
- 3. According to the sermon, in verse 13, why did the sailors keep rowing after finding out Jonah served the true and living God and provided the answer to their plight? Did they believe Jonah? How does this relate to our testimony before unbelievers?
- 4. What was Jonah's motive in asking the sailors to throw him overboard? Was it out of compassion for them or selfishness? How does Jonah being thrown overboard represent the person and work of Christ? How are Jesus and Jonah alike at this point in the chapter? How are they different?
- 5. Although the book of Jonah actually happened in history, who does Jonah represent and why? Who do the sailors represent?
