

LORD'S DAY DEVOTION AND QUESTIONS

In our study of Genesis, we have seen that Moses did not hesitate to record Judah's many sins. Judah was the one who came up with the idea of selling Joseph into slavery (Genesis 37). Judah was also happily conforming to the ways of the Canaanites, befriending them and even being sexually immoral with a cult prostitute (whom he did not know was actually Tamar, his daughter-in-law). And yet, by Genesis 44, we see that the Holy Spirit had transformed Judah into a true believer. Judah revealed his true faith by offering himself in the place of his brother, Benjamin. Kent Hughes, in his commentary on Genesis, writes:

As God would have it, Judah's willingness to suffer as a substitute for his brother foreshadowed the substitutionary, vicarious atonement of his ultimate Son, Jesus Christ, the Lion of the tribe of Judah. We must never underestimate the transforming grace of God. Just as God was with Joseph and his brothers across those two almost silent decades, so he is with all his children. Transformation is concomitant with the gospel. In fact, it fairly detonates at conversion. The Greek of 2 Corinthians 5:17 reads, "If any man in Christ, new creation," indicating an explosive transformation. Boom—new creation! And that is the universal experience of every believer. At the same time, conversion introduces a process of ongoing transformation until he appears, because "we know that when he appears we will be like him, because we shall see him as he is. And everyone who thus hopes in him purifies himself as he is pure" (1 John 3:2, 3).

- 1. Read Genesis 43:1-14. How was this situation also a test for Jacob's faith in the Lord? What was God teaching Jacob through these trials?
- 2. Read 43:15 44:17. What were Joseph's goals in testing his brothers? What evidence is there in the passage that Joseph was not testing them out of spite but out of love and compassion?
- 3. Read James 1:12-15 and 1 Peter 1:6-7. What is the difference between tempting and testing? Why does Satan tempt us? Why does God test us?
- 4. How does understanding God's purpose in testing each of his people encourage and strength your faith? How does it help develop patience and perseverance during times of suffering?
- 5. How does Judah foreshadow Christ at the end of Genesis 44? Read John 15:13 and spend some time praying and thanking the Lord for his sacrificial love, asking him to increase the love that you have in your heart for others.
