LORD'S DAY DEVOTION AND QUESTIONS

God uses many different means to sanctify us throughout our lives. We believe and trust that he is our heavenly Father who knows what is best, and the means that he chooses to use are those that he knows will accomplish his will for our lives. Sometimes the means he uses are mysterious and challenging, but they always serve to accomplish his purposes. In Genesis 32, Jacob prayed that the Lord would deliver him from the danger he faced from his brother Esau, and the way the Lord answered his prayer was completely unexpected. Instead of wrestling with Esau and crippling him in order to protect Jacob, God wrestled with Jacob and touched his hip, wrenching it out of its socket. While God's answer to Jacob's prayer was surprising and mysterious, it accomplished God's perfect will for Jacob's life. John Currid, in his commentary on Genesis, writes:

God fights with Jacob to show him that the blessings of God come only through the gracious provision of God, and not from anything else. They do not come from human strength or cunning. So, as Jacob goes to meet Esau, he carries in his very flesh the sign that God provides, and that Jacob need not rely on his own wily ways. We, of course, ought to learn from the example of Jacob. To live our lives as Christians we must depend on God. We cannot rely on our own ways, means and strength. And if we do not depend on him, God may bring us to a point, as he did Jacob, where he shows our self-sufficiency to be insufficient. As Martin Luther remarked, "And so we have this noble chapter, in which you see the marvelous dealing of God with his saints for our comfort and example, so that we may daily ask ourselves if he is also at work with us and be prepared for it."

- 1. Read Genesis 32:1-21. What did Jacob fear? What do you learn from Jacob's prayer to the Lord about how to pray?
- 2. How does God's wrestling with Jacob in Genesis 32:22-32 provide an illustration of God's work of sanctification in our lives? Consider especially how Westminster Confession of Faith 13.2-3 describes sanctification:
 - "This sanctification, although imperfect in this life, is effected in every part of man's nature. Some remnants of corruption still persist in every part, and so there arises a continual and irreconcilable war—the flesh warring against the Spirit, and the Spirit against the flesh. Although in this war the remaining corruption may strongly prevail for a time, yet, through the continual supply of strength from the sanctifying Spirit of Christ, the regenerate nature overcomes, and so the saints grow in grace, perfecting holiness in the fear of God."
- 3. Read 2 Corinthians 12:1-10. What was God teaching Paul through his experience? What has God used in your own life to teach you more about himself and salvation by grace?
- 4. What is significant about the fact that God asked Jacob for his name in Genesis 32:27? Why did God change his name? How does this further reveal how God sanctifies his people?
