LORD'S DAY DEVOTION AND QUESTIONS

There is a pattern of the themes of seeing and blindness within the book of Mark. Various characters and stories emphasize seeing and not seeing aspects of who Jesus is and what he is doing as he approaches Jerusalem, where he will be arrested and crucified. Mark's purpose in this is to help us understand and see Jesus clearly. In this section we see the goodness, beauty, love, and humility of Jesus' character as he takes the time to hear, to heal, and to honor Bartimaeus when he cries out for Jesus in his need and for mercy.

Mark's scene then shifts, and as Jesus enters Jerusalem on a colt in fulfillment of Old Testament prophecies, it is the crowd who sees Jesus, yet does not see him clearly. Their unseeing expectation and cry, "Save us," is self-serving more than God-honoring. They seek a national deliverance resulting in prosperity and ease, but what Jesus brings and offers is much more – and nothing less than the forgiveness of sin, the promise of an everlasting triumph over sin, death, and suffering for all who put their faith in him.

Furthermore, Isaiah 42:16 promises that God does not leave us and forsake those of us who once were blind but now see, as we now wait for Jesus' return. "I will lead the blind in a way that they do not know, in paths that they have not known I will guide them. I will turn the darkness before them into light, the rough places into level ground. These are the things I do, and I do not forsake them."

- 1. In Mark 10, Bartimaeus is contrasted to the disciples' previous request to Jesus. What is so different about these two mindsets and how they think about Jesus?
- 2. Jesus asked Bartimaeus, "What do you want me to do for you?" What things should we be praying about, but seem so obvious that we might neglect to pray about them?
- 3. In what ways (from this passage or elsewhere in the New Testament) does Jesus embody and exemplify goodness?
- 4. What does it seem that the crowd expects of Jesus in Mark 11:10 when they say, "Blessed is the coming kingdom of our father David"? How does their expectation differ from when Bartimaeus says, "Son of David, have mercy on me!"?
- 5. If those who were closest to Jesus were so blind, isn't it possible that we are too? How do we overcome that and gain better sight? Bartimaeus recognized his own blindness. In praying and looking at Jesus, in what ways am I maybe not fully "seeing Jesus" for who he is? Are there people I trust who can help me identify areas of my blindness?
- 6. In what ways do I feel like I do deeply recognize and appreciate and "see" Jesus? What do I see and appreciate about him that I want others to also see and experience?
- 7. What are some things that Jesus promises which we don't receive now in this age, but that we have to wait and trust him for in the age to come, after he returns to conquer sin and death?
