LORD'S DAY DEVOTION AND QUESTIONS

When Jacob gathered his sons around him to bless them, some of the blessings sounded more like curses. This is because Reuben, Simeon, and Levi had all sinned against their father and against the Lord, and Jacob was expressing the consequences his sons would face. While Jacob's words toward some of his sons were harsh, he pointed all of his sons toward the grace and salvation that they would find in the promised Savior that would come from Judah's line. They all needed God's saving grace, especially for what they did in selling Joseph into slavery and deceiving their father into believing Joseph had been killed. Jacob rightly pointed them to the grace that comes by faith alone in Christ alone.

God's Word through Jacob was fulfilled centuries later when Christ was born. Through his obedient life and atoning death, Christ paid the penalty for the sins of his people and secured for them eternal life. Christ is the Lion of the Tribe of Judah, who conquered sin and protects his people, ensuring that we will dwell with him forever in his Kingdom. Iain Duguid, in his commentary on Genesis, writes:

In due time, the Promised One will come again. Next time, Jesus will not come riding into Jerusalem humbly on a donkey; rather, he will come on the clouds in glorious triumph to consummate his marriage to his bride, the church. He will not come to bring blessing simply to the physical descendants of Jacob, but also to all those who are his spiritual heirs in faith. Are you waiting patiently for that return, looking with longing faith to Christ as your only hope of acceptance and blessing before God? As you and I trust in Christ, we become part of the redeemed community of God's people. We still wrestle with ongoing sin and its bitter fruit, but now we start to give Jesus the obedience that belongs to him, as the Holy Spirit works change in our hearts. In the face of the ugliness of our sin, we find comfort in the beauty of his holiness. As we endure difficult circumstances in life, we look forward to the fullness of his kingdom. We long for the day when his people from every tribe, nation, and language will gather around the throne, singing praises to the Lion of Judah, slain for them.

- 1. Read Genesis 49:8-9. What do these images of Judah's promised descendant mean? What do they reveal about Christ?
- 2. Read Genesis 49:10. How does this verse connect with 2 Samuel 7 and the covenant promise of an eternal King from David's royal line? How did Christ fulfill this covenant promise?
- 3. Read Genesis 49:11-12. How were these verses fulfilled in John 2:1-11? Why is it significant that Christ's ministry was marked by an abundance of wine, and how might meditating upon that truth help increase your joy in him?
- 4. Read Revelation 5. Why is Christ described as both a Lion and a Lamb? How do both of these images and what they represent comfort and encourage you in your fight against the world, the flesh, and the devil?
