1. Comfort in Death



Q. 1. What is your only comfort in life and death?

A. That I am not my own, but belong—body and soul, in life and in death—to my faithful Savior Jesus Christ. He has fully paid for all my sins with his precious blood, and has set me free from the tyranny of the devil. He also watches over me in such a way that not a hair can fall from my head without the will of my Father in heaven: in fact, all things must work together for my salvation. LORD'S DAY DEVOTION AND QUESTIONS

The book of Genesis describes how God created the world and gave life to Adam and Eve. It goes on to explain how Adam and Eve disobeyed God and brought themselves and the whole human race under the curse of sin and death. By God's grace, this was not the end for humanity. In Genesis 3:15, God promised that he would send a Savior who would triumph over sin and death, and thereby give his people eternal life. The rest of Genesis, and the rest of the Bible, progressively reveals more details about the promised Savior and how he accomplished salvation and secured eternal life for his people. Even though Genesis ends with the deaths of Jacob and Joseph, both of these godly men were looking forward in faith to the promised Savior, Jesus Christ. Jacob and Joseph died in faith knowing that they would be with him in glory. Richard Phillips, in his commentary on Genesis, writes:

In death, Jacob was consoled by his hope of eternal life together with all of God's people (including the soul of his beloved Rachel) and by his title deed to the world to come. His death account concludes with an encouragement for us to embrace the same hope: Jacob "breathed his last and was gathered to his people" (Genesis 49:33). Jacob died in expectation of joining the people of heaven. He died, and he was gathered to them. Here, the Bible assures us that the gospel is more than a comforting story to help us through the trials of life and the passage of death. The gospel message of Jesus is a comfort, of course. But it is also true! Matthew Henry writes, "His separated soul went to the assembly of the souls of the faithful, which, after they are delivered from the burden of the flesh, are in joy and felicity." Henry adds, "If God's people be our people, death will gather us to them." It is because our hope is true that believers such as the apostle Paul could live so courageously, being sure that "neither death nor life, … nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Romans 8:38-39).

- 1. Spend a few minutes thinking about our study of Genesis and what you learned. What are 2-3 ideas, doctrines, or details that have been particularly impactful for you?
- 2. Read Genesis 49:29 50:14 and 50:22-26. Why did both Jacob and Joseph give such detailed instructions about where they were to be buried? How did this reveal their trust in the Lord's covenant faithfulness, especially in light of Hebrews 11:22?
- 3. Read Acts 2:24, Romans 6:9, and John 11:25-26. What do these verses say about Christ's victory over death and our assurance of eternal life?
- 4. Spend a few minutes thinking through Joseph's life and how God's providence was displayed throughout. How does God's providence comfort us in this life according to Genesis 50:20 and Romans 8:28?
- 5. How does looking to Christ's death and God's purpose in it help us trust God's providence in our own lives?
