LORD'S DAY DEVOTION AND QUESTIONS

We confess the Nicene Creed every month at our church because it is a historic creed that summarizes the essentials of our Christian faith. One of the essentials in the creed is that we believe Christ "will come again, with glory, to judge both the living and the dead." The Bible does not teach that history is cyclical; it is linear. All of history, which began at creation, is drawing to a point, which is the consummation of all things when Christ will return with glory. This was God's plan from the beginning. This reveals that God had a purpose both in creation and redemption, and the focus of that purpose was the glory of Christ through the redemption of his people. Brandon Crowe, in his book, *The Message of the General Epistles in the History of Redemption*, writes:

The return of Jesus and the salvation he will bring also points us to the uniqueness and universal greatness of Christ. Peter himself was an eyewitness of Jesus' majesty (2 Peter 1:16), which is the anticipation of the majesty that will be revealed when Jesus returns. This is the glory of the second person of the Trinity. There is no one else who has existed from all eternity as the divine Son, no one else who came to earth and lived a perfect life, no one else who has died and defeated death by rising again, and no one else who has ascended to the Father's right hand. Jesus now lives and reigns supreme in the heavenly realms with all his spiritual enemies being made a footstool for his feet (Eph. 1:20–23). Jesus has no peer in this regard. There is no other name given among men by which we must be saved (Acts 4:12) because no one else is fully God and fully man, and thus able to atone for our sins as a man and able to raise us to God as the divine Son. Jesus has a greatness that far outshines all created beings in the universe. Jesus created all things and upholds all things by the word of his power (Heb. 1:2). He is the one Judge of the living and the dead, the One to whom all men must give account (Acts 10:42; 2 Cor. 5:10; 2 Tim. 4:1). He is the One who will return to earth physically and visibly, and every eye will see him. The day of visitation will be the end of the world as we know it, when Christ will usher in his righteous and eternal kingdom.

- 4. How do the Scriptures witness to Jesus' glory according to 2 Peter 1:19-21? How might you apply this truth when it comes to how you read Scripture?
- 5. Read Heidelberg Catechism Q/A 52. How does being certain of Christ's return with glory help you live with confidence, peace, and anticipation?
