- **Q. 57.** Which is the fourth commandment?
- A. The fourth commandment is "Remember the Sabbath day, to keep it holy. Six days you shall labor, and do all your work, but the seventh day is a Sabbath to the LORD your God. On it you shall not do any work, you, or your son, or your daughter, your male servant, or your female servant, or your livestock, or the sojourner who is within your gates. For in six days the LORD made heaven and earth, the sea, and all that is in them, and rested on the seventh day. Therefore the LORD blessed the Sabbath day and made it holy."
- **Q. 58.** What is required in the fourth commandment?
- **A.** The fourth commandment requires the keeping holy to God such set times as he has appointed in his Word; expressly one whole day in seven, to be a holy Sabbath to himself.
- **Q. 59.** Which day of the seven has God appointed to be the weekly Sabbath?
- A. From the beginning of the world to the resurrection of Christ, God appointed the seventh day of the week to be the weekly Sabbath; and the first day of the week ever since, to continue to the end of the world, which is the Christian Sabbath.
- **Q. 60.** How is the Sabbath to be sanctified?
- A. The Sabbath is to be sanctified by a holy resting all that day, even from such worldly employments and recreations as are lawful on other days; and spending the whole time in the public and private exercises of God's worship, except so much as is to be taken up in the works of necessity and mercy.
- **Q. 61.** What is forbidden in the fourth commandment?
- **A.** The fourth commandment forbids the omission, or careless performance, of the duties required, and the profaning the day by idleness, or doing that which is in itself sinful, or by unnecessary thoughts, words, or works, about our worldly employments or recreations.
- **Q. 62.** What are the reasons attached to the fourth commandment?
- A. The reasons attached to the fourth commandment are, God's allowing us six days of the week for our own employments, his challenging a special propriety in the seventh, his own example, and his blessing the Sabbath day.

LORD'S DAY DEVOTION AND QUESTIONS

We see big and small changes in ourselves and in things around us every day. The seasons change, society changes, and the technology around us also changes rapidly. But when it comes to the change that takes place in a person's life when he is brought from death to life in Jesus Christ, that change is the most dramatic thing a person could ever experience in this life. The Bible explains that when a person is regenerated, he is transformed and brought out of the kingdom of Satan and into the Kingdom of Christ. The old has passed away, the new has come. William VanDoodewaard, in his commentary on 2 Peter, writes:

The change that takes place as a sinner is saved by the divine power of God, and set apart to a new, growing life of holiness in communion with God, reflects another profound reality. Not only have we become partakers in the divine nature, we have also 'escaped from the corruption that is in the world because of sinful desire' (1:4). An amazing deliverance has taken place. We were once spiritually dead in our sins. We were walking in the ways of a fallen world, following Satan's lead, pursuing our own passions as children of wrath. God, in his rich mercy, because of his great love, provided escape. By his divine power he has given everything for our salvation in Christ. "Amazing love, how can it be?"

- 1. For review, read 2 Peter 1:1-2. What is the significance of Peter identifying himself as a "servant" of Christ? Why does he also identify himself as an "apostle" of Christ?
- 2. Read 2 Peter 1:3 and Philippians 3:7-11. How has God displayed his divine power in saving us through Christ?
- 3. Read 2 Peter 1:3 again and 2 Timothy 3:14-17. How does the Bible enable us to know God? How does this knowledge benefit us? What promises do you find most encouraging for yourself in Scripture?
- 4. Read 2 Peter 1:4. How do we become "partakers of the divine nature" through regeneration, sanctification, and glorification? Compare this passage with 2 Corinthians 3:18. How does this encourage you in your life and pursuit of godliness?
