LORD'S DAY DEVOTION AND QUESTIONS

The book of Exodus begins with the word "And" in the Hebrew manuscripts. Some Bible translations omit this word perhaps because of proper grammar and style. However, that word reveals something significant: the story of Exodus is a continuation of THE story, namely how God will bring the promised Savior into the world to save his people from their sins. Your life and my life are part of this grand story that encompasses all of creation. Though what is recorded in Exodus happened thousands of years ago, we are directly connected to the events because we are part of the family of God, redeemed and adopted by Christ, the promised Savior. Anthony Selvaggio, in his book, From Bondage to Liberty: The Gospel According to Moses, writes:

God's delivering of his people from bondage in Egypt is the most significant redemptive event of the Old Testament. The exodus creates a paradigm, a type, of the redemptive work of God, and it reveals the basic status of humanity. Due to the fall, humanity is in bondage to sin, much like the Israelites were in bondage to the Egyptians. We are, apart from Christ, in slavery to sin whether we are aware of it or not. The only way to move from bondage to liberation is for God to intervene. God did that in the exodus by using a human mediator—Moses. In the New Testament, of course, we learn that God orchestrates the ultimate deliverance from bondage to sin through the mediatorial work of his son—Jesus Christ. Jesus secured the exodus of his people who were formerly captives to sin. He did this through the cross.

- 1. Based on what you know about the book of Exodus, what connections do you see between the whole book of Exodus and Christ? Why is it important for us to keep our focus on Christ as we study Exodus?
- 2. Read Exodus 1:1-7. What is the significance of the fact that verse 7 repeats how much Israel had multiplied and how strong they had become? How does this reveal God's covenant faithfulness?
- 3. Read Exodus 1:8-14. Why did Pharaoh oppress the Israelites? What was he afraid of? How does his oppression tie in to the pattern we see in Scripture of the opposition we face as Christians in a hostile world?
- 4. Read Exodus 1:15-22. How does Pharaoh's decree to kill the male children in Israel reveal how Satan was trying to stop the promised Messiah from accomplishing his mission of crushing the serpent's head? Why did God deal well with the Hebrew midwives? How does this reveal his "fatherly kindness" toward us?
