LORD'S DAY DEVOTION AND QUESTIONS

Through his judgments upon Egypt, God revealed his justice upon his enemies and his salvation upon his people. Each of the judgments pointed forward to the greater judgment that will come on the Last Day when Christ "shall come again, with glory, to judge both the living and the dead." In his book, From Bondage to Liberty: The Gospel According to Moses, Anthony Selvaggio writes:

God is long-suffering in his application of judgment. He provided Pharaoh and Egypt with ten plagues to spark repentance in them, but they refused to heed the repeated warning. God is patient. In 2 Peter 3:9 we read, "The Lord is not slow in keeping his promise, as some understand slowness. Instead he is patient with you, not wanting anyone to perish, but everyone to come to repentance." The plagues reveal that God is patiently merciful, but they also reveal that there is a point of no return: "he does not leave the guilty unpunished" (Ex. 34:7).

Thus, the plagues served simultaneously to reveal to the world that God is patient in judgment, that he is powerful, and that he can save his people. In these ten plagues is found comforting assurance for those who trust in God and horrific certainty of judgment for those who do not. Some theologians have attempted to say that the type of dynamic revealed in the plagues is reflective of an "Old Testament God" who was judgmental in comparison to the more gracious "New Testament God" revealed in the Gospels and the rest of the New Testament. But in reality, the signs and wonders performed by Jesus, and the very proclamation of the gospel itself, serve a similar ultimate purpose as the plagues. The gospel, like the plagues, serves simultaneously to assure those who trust God of his power to save, and to remind people that, while he is patient, God will ultimately bring judgment upon those who reject his Son and fail to "know the Lord."

- 1. Read Exodus 7:14 8:19. What patterns do you notice in these three plagues? How do these plagues reveal God's power as the one true God?
- 2. Read Psalm 135. How does this psalm describe God's demonstration of his power and his judgment through the plagues? Why does this lead us to praise him?
- 3. Making the connection with Revelation 16:3-4, how do the judgments upon Egypt point forward to the Final Judgment? How does this reveal God's mercy toward people today according to Acts 17:30-31?
- 4. Read Heidelberg Catechism Q/A 52. What does it mean that Christ is both the Judge of all people and the one who bore God's judgment for his people? How does maturing in your faith in Christ help you gain greater assurance and peace as you consider the judgment to come?
