- Q. 49. Which is the second commandment?
- A. The second commandment is "You shall not make for yourself a carved image, or any likeness of anything that is in heaven above, or that is in the earth beneath, or that is in the water under the earth. You shall not bow down to them or serve them, for I the LORD your God am a jealous God, visiting the iniquity of the fathers on the children to the third and the fourth generation of those who hate me, but showing steadfast love to thousands of those who love me and keep my commandments."
- **Q. 50.** What is required in the second commandment?
- **A.** The second commandment requires the receiving, observing, and keeping pure and entire all such religious worship and ordinances as God has appointed in his Word.

- **A.** The reasons attached to the second commandment are: God's sovereignty over us, his ownership in us, and the zeal he has for his own worship.

LORD'S DAY DEVOTION AND QUESTIONS

The first question of the Westminster Shorter Catechism teaches us the main purpose of our existence as creatures: we are to glorify God and enjoy him forever. What we learn at the very beginning of this catechism and throughout Scripture is that God is glorious, and he is therefore worthy of glory. Exodus 14 is especially clear on this point: God is worthy of all glory. Philip Ryken, in his commentary on Exodus, helps us see how God's actions in Exodus 14 led to his receiving glory and praise:

The crossing of the Red Sea brought glory to God by convincing the Israelites to believe in God, which may have been the greatest miracle of all. The Israelites must have had some faith already, because they were willing at least to follow God between two great walls of water. Indeed, Hebrews says, "By faith the people passed through the Red Sea as on dry land" (11:29a). But they made an even firmer faith commitment when it was all over. Exodus 14 ends on this triumphant note: "And when the Israelites saw the great power the LORD displayed against the Egyptians, the people feared the LORD and put their trust in him and in Moses his servant" (v. 31).

God was fulfilling his grand purpose of saving a people for his glory. For that to happen, his people had to trust him and worship him. Notice the order here: God did not wait for his people to trust in him before he would save them. If he had waited for that to happen, they never would have been saved! Instead God took the initiative. First the people saw their salvation (just as Moses had promised, Exodus 14:13); then they feared and believed. This is the pattern and the purpose of salvation. First God delivers us from danger, saving us when we cannot save ourselves. Then we respond in faith, trusting God and worshiping him.

- 1. Read Exodus 14. Why did God maneuver his people along the route he chose? What was his purpose? How does Pharaoh's response reveal the pride and arrogance of fallen man?
- 2. How was God glorified for his power in Exodus 14? What other places in Scripture is God's power demonstrated by his ability to control the seas? What does this reveal about God as Creator?
- 3. How was God glorified for his judgment in Exodus 14? Why are we sometimes uncomfortable talking about God's justice and righteousness in his judgment? Why is understanding God's righteous judgment crucial for understanding what Christ accomplished on the cross for you?
- 4. How was God glorified for his grace in Exodus 14? How is his grace especially highlighted by the response of Israel as they saw the Egyptians pursuing them?
- 5. How does Israel's salvation through the Red Sea point to Christ?



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
