LORD'S DAY DEVOTION AND QUESTIONS


The description of Jesus' crucifixion in the gospels can be difficult to read because of the pain and suffering Jesus experienced. He is our Lord, the one whom we love above all, and he was brutalized and killed by sinful men. There is an additional aspect to his suffering that adds to our sadness of what he experienced: Jesus was humiliated during his crucifixion. He was mocked and ridiculed by the Roman soldiers, by the crowds in Jerusalem, by the religious leaders, and even by the two thieves crucified with him. What we see in the gospels is that on the cross, Jesus not only bore the guilt of our sin, but also the shame of it. Burk Parsons writes in Tabletalk Magazine:

Jesus Christ redeemed us not only from his wrath and hell in the future but from having to wallow in the mire of guilt and shame in the present. Jesus promised us not only eternal life in the future, but abundant life that begins in the present. Jesus lived and died not only for the guilt of our sin but for the shame of our sin. He endured the cross, despising its shame, so that we would not have to wallow in shame. Our Lord calls us to bring our shame to him, whereas Satan wants us to bear the constant weight of our shame and wallow in it for the rest of our lives. But if we live each day bearing the shame of yesterday, and we are worried about the shame of tomorrow, we will never experience the joys of abundant life in Christ today. Therefore, let us lift our weary eyes from gazing upon our shame and fix our eyes on Christ, the author and finisher of our faith.

- 1. Review last Sunday's sermon text from John 19:16-22. How does John present Jesus as our Priest and Sacrifice? How does he present Jesus as our King?
- 2. Read John 19:23-24. Why did the soldiers cast lots for Jesus' clothes? How does what they did reveal God's sovereign providence?
- 3. Read Psalm 22. How is Jesus' suffering prophesied in this psalm? How does Jesus' suffering reveal that he took away both our guilt and our shame on the cross?
- 4. Why is it important for us to understand that Jesus bore both the guilt and shame of our sins on the cross? In what ways can shame both help and hinder us in the Christian life? How would you counsel a Christian who was struggling with the shame of their sins?
- 5. Why did Jesus create the lasting bond between John and his mother, Mary? How does it reveal his care for his mother and his obedience to the law (especially the fifth commandment)?
