

LORD'S DAY DEVOTION AND QUESTIONS

We live in a culture that prides itself on the latest trends and experiences. We are seen as out of touch and uncool if we do not embrace them. The things of yesterday are soon discarded and forgotten, only to be replaced by other things that will soon be discarded and forgotten. We are told to forget and focus on what is in front of us. The past does not matter, just the future.

On the one hand, it's appropriate to forget the past. We want to forget painful and difficult seasons in our lives. On the other hand, however, it's appropriate to remember the past. Anniversaries, birthdays, and other events are all crucial dates we must remember. We would not be who we are if it were not for the past.

That is what Paul wants us to do in Ephesians 2:11-22. He wants us to remember what we were like apart from God's saving grace in Christ. His description of our past life is not pretty. We were separated from God and without hope (Eph. 2:12). We also lacked fellowship with God's people. Only by remembering our past can we fully appreciate our bright future in Christ.

Commenting on verse 12, Constantine Campbell writes:

Paul's "remember" may well encourage a re-remembering, "to remember their past in a new way" (cf. Rom 12:2). Now that they are in Christ, these believers are able to reflect back on their previous existence with new eyes. And they are only able to grasp the privileges of their new status in Christ by first appreciating how far from those privileges they once stood.

- 1. What is the status of believers God has brought into the covenant community (see vv. 11-12)? What was their previous status apart from Christ (see v. 19)? What do each of these terms mean?
- 2. Read Westminster Confession of Faith Chapter 19.1-4. In verse 15, when Paul says God has abolished "the law of commandments expressed in ordinances," what aspect of God's law does he have in mind?
- 3. How does Paul describe the saving work of Christ in verses 14-16? How does Christ's work impact your relationships with other brothers and sisters in Christ?
- 4. How does Paul describe the church in verses 21-22? How do the tabernacle and temple in the Old Testament point forward to the church? How is God building the church (see v. 20)?



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
