SERMON NOTES

"Christ Is Risen!" Matthew 27:62 - 28:10

1. Jesus' resurrection was unstoppable.

Because Jesus is God. (John 10:17-18)
Because his resurrection was part of God's eternal plan. (John 17:1-5, 24)
Because his resurrection was prophesied. (Acts 2:24-31)
2. Jesus' resurrection is good news that the whole world must hear about.
The announcement: "he has risen, as he said" (v. 6)
The proof: "comesee" (v. 6)
The commission: "go and tell" (v. 7; Matthew 28:18-20)
3. Jesus' resurrection proves that by faith in him, we are forgiven and adopted into his family.
"go and tell <i>my brothers</i> " (v. 10; Romans 4:5; Hebrews 2:11)
Westminster Confession of Faith Ch. 12: "All those that are justified, God permitted, in and for his only Son Jesus Christ, to make partakers of the grace of adoption, by which they are taken into the number, and enjoy the liberties and privileges of the children of God, have his name put upon them, receive the Spirit of adoption, have access to the throne of grace with boldness, are enabled to cry, Abba, Father, are pitied, protected, provided for, and chastened by him as by a father: yet never cast off, but sealed to the day of redemption; and inherit the promises, as heirs of everlasting salvation."

LORD'S DAY DEVOTION AND QUESTIONS

Jesus' resurrection was the first stage of his exaltation. After undergoing humiliation throughout his life as he obeyed the law and suffered the curse of sin for us, he was raised in glory. He was not just resuscitated by the power of God, but he was raised in a glorified body. This is why the Apostle Paul describes Jesus' resurrection as the "firstfruits" (1 Corinthians 15:20-22). The idea of firstfruits is from the Old Testament, wherein God commanded Israel to bring the first and best portions of their harvest as offerings in worship. The firstfruits represented the whole harvest, because everything belongs to God. In the same way, Christ was the first to be raised in glory, and his resurrection represents the whole resurrection harvest—it points to the day when his whole Church will be raised in glory. J.I. Packer, in his book titled *Concise Theology*, explains the theological significance of Jesus' resurrection when he writes:

Christianity rests on the certainty of Jesus' resurrection as a space-time occurrence in history. All four Gospels highlight it, focusing on the empty tomb and resurrection appearances, and Acts insists on it. Paul regarded the resurrection as indisputable proof that the message about Jesus as Judge and Savior is true. Jesus' resurrection demonstrated his victory over death, vindicated him as righteous, and indicated his divine identity. It led on to his ascension and enthronement and his present heavenly reign. It guarantees the believer's present forgiveness and justification and is the basis of resurrection life in Christ for the believer here and now.

- 1. Read Acts 2:22-36. How does Peter compare David and Jesus? Why does Peter say that it was not possible for Jesus "to be held by" death (verse 24)? What does this reveal about God's power, and how can you draw comfort from this truth?
- 2. Read 1 Corinthians 15:50-58. How does Paul describe the future physical resurrection of believers? What conclusion does he draw in verse 58 about how this truth should affect our attitudes and actions in this life?
- 3. Why is it significant that Jesus referred to his disciples as his "brothers" in Matthew 28:10? What does this reveal about his grace toward his people?
- 4. Read Westminster Confession of Faith chapter 32. How does knowing that all Christians will "be raised, by [Christ's] Spirit, to honor, and brought into conformity with Christ's own glorious body" encourage you? How might you encourage fellow Christians with this doctrine?
