LORD'S DAY DEVOTION AND QUESTIONS

Interest in the end times (eschatology) has seemed to fluctuate over the history of the church. During the time of the Apostle Paul it appeared that many Christians were very interested in attempting to discern when the Lord Jesus would return. This interest was evidenced by some Christians even selling their possessions and quitting their jobs in anticipation of the imminent return of Jesus. At other times in church history, theologians and pastors refrained from teaching on the end times because they thought it was too complicated and confusing for ordinary Christians to understand.

But the Apostle Paul didn't shrink away from teaching and preaching about the return of Jesus. The remedy for faltering faith is the hopeful expectation of Jesus' return. This anticipation enables believers to endure hardship and persecution and grief because we know that at Jesus' return sin will be dealt with, death and suffering and pain will be destroyed, and perfect justice will be administered.

At this point in church history, Christians tend to be overly interested in the details of the end times. We sometimes forget that the Holy Spirit inspired Paul to write about the return of Jesus so that we would find our assurance and comfort in Jesus himself, and not get bogged down in trying to discern the details surrounding his return.

- 1. Read 1 Thessalonians 4:13-18. Why is Paul writing about the return of Jesus (see especially vv. 13 & 18)? In light of this, what should our focus be regarding our study of the return of Jesus?
- 2. What are some particular ways that vv. 14-17 give you hope and encouragement?
- 3. List the details about Jesus' return that Paul provides in vv. 14-17. Look up Westminster Confession of Faith chapter 33 and compare it with the list you made. Are there any similarities or differences? What are they?
- 4. How is v. 16 especially comforting and encouraging? How does this verse connect to Jesus' promise in John 14:3?
- 5. In v. 18 Pauls tells us to "encourage one another with these words." How can you encourage others with Paul's teaching on the return of Jesus?
