LORD'S DAY DEVOTION AND QUESTIONS

Psalm 23 is a well-known passage in the Bible. God's people have been turning to it for thousands of years to find comfort and assurance during seasons of trial and difficulty. The passage describes how God cares for his people, and it points to Christ, who is our Chief Shepherd. Martin Luther writes:

The pasture with which Christ feeds his sheep is the dear gospel by which our souls are fed and strengthened, preserved from error, comforted in all temptations and sorrows, protected against the devil's wile and power and finally saved from all need. But his sheep are not all equally strong; in part they are still lost, scattered all about, wounded, sick, young and weak. He does not reject them for that reason but gives more attention to them and also cares for them more diligently than he does for the others who have no faults. As the prophet Ezekiel says...he seeks the lost, brings back the strayed, binds up the crippled, strengthens the sick. And the young lambs that have just been born, Isaiah says, he will gather in his arms and carry them so that they may not grow tired and will gently lead those who are with young. All of this, Christ our dear Shepherd effects through the office of preaching and the holy sacraments.

- 1. Why do you think God's people are drawn to this psalm in particular as a source of comfort and assurance? Are there times in your life when you have turned to it intentionally?
- 2. Read verses 1-2. What do these verses say of God's provision? What do they reveal about his faithfulness?
- 3. Read verses 3-4. How do these verses describe the way God restores and guides us?
- 4. Read verses 5-6. How do these verses describe how God pursues us?
- 5. Read Ezekiel 34:11-24 and John 10:11-18. How do both of these passages shed more light on the ways in which Christ is our Shepherd?
- 6. What did you learn in the sermon today that you want to prayerfully apply this week?



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
