










































### **Natural Law Theory**




## Evangelism


Cannot reason someone into the kingdom of God ~ that's just false:

- However, God uses various means, including reason and arguments, which He then works upon to bring about repentance and faith.
































# Animism What is it?

- One of the oldest religious systems.
- Is extremely varied, lacking a unified system of beliefs and practices.
- Differs drastically between cultures globally.

### Animism Spirits

In most animistic societies, there are at least two types of spirits:

- Nature spirits
- Ancestor spirits

Could be more, e.g.:

- Kitchen spirits
- Spirits living in the threshold of a house

# Animism Nature Spirits

- Have human form and personality.
- Inhabit animals, plants, rocks, streams, etc.
- May speak a human language.
- \* Have an order or hierarchy.
- ❖ The destruction of their dwelling may cause their destruction.
- Household spirits generally behave similarly.

#### Animism Ancestor Spirits

- Departed family members.
- Not necessarily your direct genetic ancestor.
- Childless departed relatives may still be ancestor spirits.
- Ancestor spirits usually retain their family and social status.
- Generally respected by the tribe/clan.
- ❖ Often an ancestor spirit is treated as permanently departed or gone when there remain no more living family members who remember them (or a similar mechanism).


"3 And this is eternal life, that they know you, the only true God, and Jesus Christ whom you have sent."

❖ If Christianity is true, then only via a personal relationship with God can one have eternal life and salvation.




## Application

- Animists tend to be individuals who believe in an impersonal god.
- To communicate with the upper God, one needs to placate the man of God, who influences the intermediary spirits or ancestors.
- Thus, the man of God and ancestors are the mediators between God and man.

Introduction

- African Religion functions more on a communal basis.
- \* Beliefs are held by the whole community.
- \* It is not a matter of an individual's beliefs.
- Has NO scriptures or holy books.
- Is very pragmatic and realistic.

Introduction

- God is an infinite, immaterial, all-powerful, spiritual and unknowable being.
- Africans may communicate with Him directly or via intermediaries.
- ❖ Often in humility Africans would consult those of higher standing socially and religiously to communicate with God, ancestors and spirits.
- This may entail giving gifts, offerings, or making sacrifices.




John Mbiti: "The idea of intermediaries fits well with the African view of the universe, which holds that the invisible world has its own life and population. The life of this invisible world is in some ways higher than that of man, but God is still higher. In order to reach God effectively it may be useful to approach him by first approaching those who are lower than he is but higher than the ordinary person. The notion of intermediaries also helps people to feel protected from the greatness of God which may otherwise crush the individual."

John Mbiti: "It is generally believed all over Africa that the universe was created. The creator of the universe is God."

- Generally believed that a spiritual life force flows throughout all things.
- This higher power, lifeforce, or Supreme Being is often considered far too removed from the current lives of people to be directly interacted with.

#### Disagree:


- That other gods could exist (Isa 45:5).
- That God can be impersonal (Rev 21:1-7).



## Prime Reality

Traditional African Religion VS Christianity

- Importantly, God is immaterial, infinite, eternal, and personal in Christianity.
- Christianity is actively aware of this fact and what it entails.
- Especially, God is omnipresent, omniscient, and omnibenevolent.
- God is everywhere, knows everything and everyone, and is all-loving.
- In contrast to the more impersonal nature of the god in TAR.





- The Universe has both a physical as well as a spiritual component.
- Physical phenomena also have a potential direct spiritual explanation.
- There is a distinction between the 'Ultimate' and the 'Immediate'.

Traditional African Religion

- The animist views the "formal" religions ~ Christianity, Islam, Hinduism, etc. ~ important for ultimate issues, such as:
  - "Who is God?"
  - "What is humanity's problem?"
  - > "What happens after death?"
- \* However, these religions are **irrelevant** when it comes to addressing the immediate **practical** issues of everyday life.






Traditional African Religion

- There is no limit to the universe.
- Although it had a beginning, there is no end to the universe.
- There are great rhythms to existence, minor rhythms (living things ~ men or animals, life and death, etc.) & major rhythms (days and nights, seasons, etc.) that have no end.
- Circle or Cycle of life!




# The Nature of Reality

### Disagree:

- That there is a force or power or energy in the universe which can be tapped by those who know how to do so, and then used for good or evil towards other people.
- Not found in scripture nor taught throughout church history.
- Completely foreign to Christianity.



## Animism ~ The Nature of Knowledge.

- Since all of existence is divided between the **physical** and the **spiritual**, there are multiple ways of coming to know the world.
- Usually consulting the local Sangoma, Shaman, Witchdoctor, etc., to interact with the spirit world.
- The use of rituals, totems and other alternatives to interact with the spiritual components of the world.
- **❖** If the specific ritual has the desired effect, then that is deemed as true (*Pragmatism*).



# The Nature of Knowledge


Traditional African Religion VS Christianity

### Agree:

❖ By the order that God has created, we can know things (Rom 1-2).

#### Disagree:

- ❖ Because something worked, it is true or good (pragmatism), e.g. "mass murder solves poverty", or "sharks are aliens, thus they're dangerous". (Jer 44:15-19)
- That knowledge of the spiritual world is obtained via sangomas, shamans, witchdoctors, etc. (Deut 18:11-12)



## Animism ~ The Nature of Humanity

- Human beings are creatures animated by the ultimate life force or "breath".
- Human beings are typically composed of both the psychical (body) and immaterial form (soul).
- ❖ Distinct from the spirits (Middle Zone) and from the higher power (Upper Zone).


Traditional African Religion



John Mbiti: "Man who lives on the Earth, is the centre of the universe. He is also like the priest of the universe, linking the universe with God its Creator."

- \* Tries to create harmony with the universe.
- People may use this to do good or evil.
- There is a mystical aspect to reality which may be influenced using traditional medicine, witchcraft, magic or sorcery.

### Disagree:


Man links the universe with God, its Creator (Acts 17:24-25).

## **Animism ~ The Nature of Morality**

### Traditional African Religion



**John Mbiti:** "It is believed by African people that God gave moral order to people so they might live happily and in harmony with one another."

- This order helps people to work out among themselves what is good and evil, right and wrong, true and false.
- \* Wrong-doing is punished by the people, or by the created order, or by God.
- There is a great emphasis on the centrality of human community and this is reinforced by a strong moral order that supports it.







- Due to the pragmatic approach of Animism, they tend to view material wealth as very important.



- "To glorify God and enjoy Him fully."









## Deuteronomy 18: 10-13 (ESV)

"10 There shall not be found among you anyone who burns his son or his daughter as an offering, anyone who practices divination or tells fortunes or interprets omens, or a sorcerer <sup>11</sup> or a charmer or a medium or a necromancer or one who inquires of the dead, <sup>12</sup> for **whoever** does these things is an abomination to the Lord... 13 You shall be blameless before the Lord your God..."


Does lived experience give reliable grounds to know how to engage spirits?

- All experiences outside of scripture may, therefore, be tainted by deceitful spirits.








Christianity VS Traditional African Religion

- ❖ There is good reason to believe that those who speak to the dead are really speaking to demons (Acts 16:16-18).
- **❖** Scripture is set by Jesus to be the final authority on spiritual matters (Matt 4:1-11), and as the guide in all godliness (2 Tim 3:16).







### Colossians 1:16: (ESV)

"<sup>16</sup> For by him all things were created, in heaven and on earth, visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or rulers or authorities—all things were created through him and **for him**."



### Revelation 20:7-10 (ESV)

...Satan will be released from his prison 8 and will go out to deceive the nations... to gather them together to battle, whose number is as the sand of the sea. <sup>9</sup> They went up on the breadth of the earth and surrounded the camp of the saints and the beloved city. And fire came down from God out of heaven and devoured them. <sup>10</sup> The devil, who deceived them, was cast into the lake of fire and brimstone..."

- Notice, there is no climactic battle with God at the head of the angels.
- There is no struggle or fear that, just maybe, God will lose (2 Thess 2:8).
- God is infinite in power (a pebble vs the sea).





### Job 1:8-12 (ESV)





### Engaging TAR

- **❖** Pray!!!
- There's a person in front of you, not an idea.
- Ask a lot of questions.
- Listen!
- Go to the landmarks that scream: "God made me!" (Ask questions, and if you can ~ give the arguments.)
- If possible, build relationship with the person.
- Remember: You are an ambassador of Christ.
- ❖ Be prepared for rejection: Prepare for the worst, hope for the best, and handle whatever you get!
