Week 1: Children are a Heritage

Objective: Motivate you to value the gift you have been (or someday will be) given.

When it comes to our relationship with God, there are no "do overs" or second chances, but there are new beginnings. – *Ken Davis*

<u>Background Statistics – the importance of fathers (gathered in 2012)</u>

- Fatherless children are eight times as likely to have children as teenagers, 2.5 times as likely to have
 a birth outside of marriage, 1.5 times as likely to marry as teenagers (but overall less likely to
 marry), four times more likely to need professional help for emotional or behavioral problems; and
 at least twice as likely: to suffer physical, emotional, or educational neglect; to experience health
 problems; to drop out of school; to use drugs; to get divorced; to be poor; and to spend time in jail.
- Children not living with their biological father are **100 times more likely** to suffer fatal abuse.
- Children from fatherless homes make up:

34% of US children (without biological father – 28% are w/o any male) (US Census, 2012)

90% of adolescent repeat arsonists (Psychology Today, January, 1985, p. 28)

90% of all homeless and runaway children

85% of all youths in prison (Fulton Co. GA, TX Dept. of Correction)

85% of all children who show behavior disorders (CDC)

80% of rapists with anger problems (Justice & Behavior, Vol 14, p403-26)

75% of all adolescent patients in chemical abuse centers

71% of pregnant teenagers (U.S. DOHHS press release, Friday, March 26, 1999)

71% of all high school dropouts (Nat'l Principals Assoc. Report)

70% of youths in state-operated institutions (U.S. DOJ, Sept. 1988)

63% of youth suicides (US DOHHS/Census)
