PRINCIPAL'S CORNER

It was such a joy to celebrate 30 years with so many who have been a part of the HCA family through the years! The 30th Celebration is a milestone that causes us to both look back at all that God has done, and look forward to a future with God leading the way. One development that we sincerely hope is in our future is a high school. We have experienced a resurgence of interest within the last year that has me wondering what God is up to! Previously when interest in a high school for HCA would emerge, I would question whether we had the right people, time, and resources to make it happen. I was too keenly aware that such an endeavor would require a person or group to lead the charge, a high school administrator, additional space, specialized staffing, etc. With the increase in interest, however, I realized that this is a process that God may be initiating. If it is, He will provide all that is needed in due time.

In January I held a focus group meeting to gauge the current interest in starting a high school and find out a little more about what parents envisioned. It was a good meeting with good conversation, but the steps to move forward were still unclear.

However, important conversations have taken place since then that reminded me that God is at work. These conversations have been striking for their timing and their content. One conversation was with a former HCA staff member who moved out of state several years ago, but has since been developing a high school curriculum that is consistent with HCA's philosophy, framework, and culture. She has had opportunities to put elements in place, make corrections, and refine. This fall, she will be piloting her curriculum with Canopy, a high school learning center in Virgina that is, like HCA, a member of Redemptive Education. We are both excited to continue the conversation about how this curriculum may be used at a high school for HCA!

This was an unexpected, but major element that shows the work God has been doing behind the scenes to lay the ground work while we were unaware. I wonder what else God has been preparing for us? Will you join me in seeking God for His timing and being watchful for His provision? Please let me know if this is on your heart as well and perhaps we can join together in prayer for a high school.

Kindergarten Update from Mrs. Coombs:

The end of the school year brings many emotions for teachers and students. Just as our Kindergarteners have grown and transformed, so will our latest area of study: the caterpillar! I can't believe that this is our last full month of academic work this school year. It's been a whirlwind of activities, events, and learning. Thank you for all the help you've given to your children and to our school this year. May the Lord continue to bless you!

This past week we celebrated HCA's 30th Anniversary. It was great seeing students outside of the classroom, in a more laid back setting. Thank you for volunteering and for supporting the event with your presence and your funds.

I am proud to say that six Fifth Graders (almost 50% of our class!) participated in the Seussical performance. I attended the opening show on Thursday, May 2nd. It was a blast! Our Fifth Graders performed beautifully. I was impressed with the amount of effort they put into memorizing their lines. Thank you for encouraging and supporting them!

As we wrap up the school year, there's a lot that we are trying to complete. There are some upcoming math events that I'd like to share:

- Grades 5-6 Multiplication Facts Party: 5th and 6th graders have been promised a pizza
 party if they are able to master their 1-12 multiplication facts. Each student has access
 to <u>Mathfactlab.com</u> for multiplication fact practice. I'll test students on May 13th. The
 party will be held on May 15th during lunch. Students need to score at least 90% within
 the allotted time to join the party. Students who are not interested can opt out of the
 test.
- 2. HCA middle school math competition: Yesterday and today I hosted an HCA math competition. Students have been competing individually and in teams of two. For the team competition, the first place prize is a cash prize of \$50 (\$25 for each student), the second place prize is \$30 (\$15 for each student), and the third place prize is \$20 (\$10 for each student). I paired up younger with older students to make the competition fair. Congrats to everyone who participated.
- 3. Math Competition (outside of HCA): There's an annual math competition for Elementary and Middle School students in Massachusetts. I plan to attend the competition with HCA students who are interested in participating. Grade 5 students can compete in the Elementary school competition. Students in grades 6-8 compete in the Middle School competition.

We have a packed schedule ahead. I'll continue to encourage our students to finish hard. Have a wonderful month!
