PRINCIPAL'S CORNER

Dear Parents,

I hope that you have had a chance to enjoy the beautiful autumn weather we have had so far. As the weather cools and we are indoors more, this is typically the time of year that we see illnesses increase. In addition to masks and cleaning, we have recently added two additional layers of protection against illnesses that I would like to share with you.

<u>First</u>, we have recently purchased *air purifiers for every classroom*, including the office, library, kitchen and bubbler room, with funds available from the state to reimburse Covid expenses. The air purifiers are well rated and are appropriate for the size of each room. As the weather becomes colder and children are outside less, the air purifiers will provide a complete exchange of air at regular intervals.

<u>Second</u>, I am pleased to announce that, in an effort to reduce absences naturally occurring from COVID-19 protocols, *HCA will begin offering the COVID-19 testing program* funded by the state of Massachusetts. This program is not intended to replace our <u>current Covid Protocols</u>, but to help families who have school-related illness or exposure.

The testing program involves three components.

- **1. Symptomatic testing** for students who show symptoms of COVID-19 <u>at school.</u>
- 2. COVID safety checks, or pooled testing, to prevent the spread of the virus undetected among students who are not showing symptoms. We will only use this option after 4 specified school breaks: after Thanksgiving break, after Christmas break, after February break, and after April break.
- **3. Test and Stay** for students who have been exposed to a positive case of COVID-19 while in school, but are not showing symptoms.

Each of these is a quick, non-invasive nasal swab that is collected under the supervision of a school nurse. HCA has been assigned a team of nurses who are on-call as needed. Unlike COVID-19 tests of the past, these are not uncomfortable and they are easy for students to do themselves.

Students only participate with permission from a parent or guardian. It is important to us that you are fully informed regarding the process and that we can answer any questions that you might have in advance of asking you to sign the consent form. Below we describe each of the three parts of the testing program, how they are conducted, and what they are used for.

Symptomatic testing is used when a student develops symptoms of COVID-19 during the school day. <u>Students should not come to school if they are feeling sick while at home</u>. This is a PCR test, and we will typically receive the results of this test within 24 hours. The student will need to await results at home, but they will be able to test before they leave school.(continued on page 3)

Routine COVID safety checks, or pooled testing, minimize disruption to learning by helping us catch potential spread of the virus before it starts. Samples are collected at school after designated school breaks (see above). Each student will provide two samples, one for pooled testing and one individual test. The first samples will be tested in groups of 5-10. Once the samples get to the lab, all the samples in the pooled group are tested for COVID-19 together. In almost all cases, it will take less than 24 hours to receive safety check results. Students can continue to come to school while awaiting safety check results. If a safety check test is positive, the lab will automatically process the second swab for each individual sample of that cluster to determine which student(s) in the group produced the positive test. Positive students and their close contacts will be notified.

Test and Stay allows students who have had close contact with a person who tested positive for COVID-19 while at school* to stay in school if he/she is not showing symptoms. Instead of needing to quarantine and miss school, asymptomatic students will take a daily rapid test upon arrival to school. If a student develops symptoms while at home, he/she should stay home and seek a PCR test from a healthcare provider. Students who remain asymptomatic will participate in Test and Stay for at least five school days, or until the quarantine period for a close contact has ended.

*This program is not for close contacts who are exposed to Covid-19 outside of school. If your child is exposed outside of school, they must follow the quarantine and testing protocols currently in place.

If a student tests positive for COVID-19, they must isolate at home for the CDC-recommended ten days since symptoms appeared or ten days since the positive test before returning to school. The student must also be without a fever for 24 hours. To participate in the program, you must sign this digital consent form on behalf of your student. There is no charge for participating. I do hope that you will find the additional conveniences it provides helpful to your family. We will continue to pray for health, safety, and enjoyment of the wonderful seasons God has blessed us with.

Since the garden was constructed in 2010, hundreds of students, staff, family members and community friends have visited, worked in it, enjoyed the harvest, and eaten its produce. The end result has been a deeper appreciation for God's interconnected creation, deeper links to our integrated curriculum, as well as the joy of participating in the process of food production from seed to table! We've all enjoyed the beauty of the flowers as well as the creatures who share the garden with us!

Unfortunately, the raised-bed wooden boxes have seen better days. This gives us the opportunity to think creatively, and use the more advanced garden knowledge we've gained over the years. We are now planning a complete garden revamp. We are still in the very initial stages of design and are ready to form a Garden Team who will provide the oversight and leadership necessary to take on this exciting project. 
How you can help:

As the seasons begin to change, there are many notable changes in our Preschool Classroom as well. Preschoolers have grown accustomed to our daily routine; are becoming more independent in their self-help skills; are regularly eager to learn new songs and stories about their big God who loves them; and bring joy and excitement to each day together.

Fifth Grade from Ms. Legro: Festival of Lights & a Lesson Learned the Hard Way

The Learning Retention Pyramid suggests that the key to learning mastery is the ability to take information that has been learned and teach others accurately. Our fifth grade students are eager learners. As their teacher, it has been so fun to see them take the information they learned about







Indian culture and teach others during our Mini Asia Day. They did an amazing job transforming our classroom by whitewashing walls, creating rangoli art, and making an Indian sweet called Khoya Burfi to celebrate Diwali, the Hindu Festival of Lights.

During the month of November, we will turn our attention to Israel. We will learn about Jewish culture and celebrate Hanukkah, the Jewish Festival of Lights. From balancing greens (nitrogenrich sources) and browns (carbon-rich sources) to what we can and cannot compost and why, we have been getting our hands dirty learning about composting as part of our Food For Life program. Words from Mr. Hayward:

Hello parents, grandparents, guardians, and students:

May you experience all the blessing, encouragement, and hope the Lord has already prepared for you and yours this Holiday Season. During Term 2 we continue our survey through all of Scripture by introducing the principle genres of the Bible. There are a lot of them - law, poetry, wisdom, narrative, prophecy, parable, riddle. Each literary form needs to be approached somewhat differently, just as no one "hears" a legal statute in quite the same way as one hears a favorite Christmas carol. The particular genre making up the largest portion of the Bible is narrative, or story, or as I always insist on saying (and your kids are probably tired of hearing it), history. HCA as a whole focuses on Israel plus one other Middle Eastern country during Term 2 (remember it's our "Cultures" year); Mr. Hayward's Bible class will trace Israel's long history as recorded in Scripture - the primary source (in addition to extensive archeological contributions) of her ancient story.
