Catechism:

1. What is the chief end of man?

Man’s chief end is to glorify God, and to enjoy Him forever.

(Psalm 73:25-28; Romans 11:36; 1 Corinthians 10:31)

2. What rule has God given to direct us how we may glorify and enjoy Him?

The word of God, namely the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments, is the only rule to direct us how we may glorify and enjoy Him.

3. Are the Scriptures trustworthy in all that they affirm?

The Scriptures of both the Old and New Testaments, being God-breathed, are infallible and inerrant in all their parts and are, therefore, trustworthy in all that they affirm concerning history, science, doctrine, ethics, religious practice, or any other topic.

(John 10:35; 1 Thessalonians 2:13; 2 Timothy 3:15-17)

4. What do the Scriptures teach?

The Scriptures teach what man is to believe concerning God, and what duty God requires of man.

(Micah 6:8; 2 Timothy 1:13; 3:16)

Catechism:

60. What is the fourth commandment?

The fourth commandment is, “Remember the Sabbath day, to keep it holy. Six days you shall labor and do all your work, but the seventh day is the Sabbath of the Lord your God. In it you shall do no work: you, nor your son, nor your daughter, nor your male servant, nor your female servant, nor your cattle, nor your stranger who is within your gates. For in six days the Lord made the heavens and the earth, the sea and all that is in them, and rested the seventh day. Therefore, the Lord blessed the Sabbath day and hallowed it.”
(Exodus 20:8-11)

61. What is required in the fourth commandment?

The fourth commandment requires the keeping holy to God such set times as He has appointed in His word; expressly one whole day in seven is to be a holy Sabbath to Himself.
(Leviticus 19:30; Deuteronomy 5:12-14)

62. Which day of the seven has God appointed to be the weekly Sabbath?

From the beginning of the world to the resurrection of Christ, God appointed the seventh day of the week to be the weekly Sabbath; and the first day of the week ever since, to continue to the end of the world, which is the Christian Sabbath.
(Genesis 2:2-3; Acts 20:7; 1 Corinthians 16:1-2; Revelation 1:10)

Catechism:

1. What is your only comfort in life and in death?

That I am not my own, but belong—body and soul, in life in death—to my faithful Savior Jesus Christ. He has fully paid for all my sins with His precious blood, and has set me free from the tyranny of the devil. He also watches over me in such a way that not a hair can fall from my head without the will of my Father in heaven; in fact, all things must work together for my salvation. Because I belong to Him, Christ, by His holy Spirit, assures me of eternal life and makes me whole-heartedly willing and ready from now on to live for Him.

(1 Corinthians 6:19, 20; Romans 14:7-9; 1 Corinthians 3:23; Titus 2:14; 1 Peter 1:18, 19; 1 John 1:7-9; 2:2; John 8:34-36; Hebrews 2:14, 15; 1 John 3:1-11; John 6:39, 40; 10:27-30; 2 Thessalonians 3:3; 1 Peter 1:5; Matthew 10:29-31; Luke 21:16-18; Romans 8:28; 8:15, 16; 2 Corinthians 1:21, 22; 5:5; Ephesians 1:13, 14; Romans 8:1-17)

2. What must you know to live and die in the joy of this comfort?

Three things: first, how great my sin and misery are; second, how I am set free from all my sins and misery; third, how I am to thank God for such deliverance.

(Romans 3:9, 10; 1 John 1:10; John 17:3; Acts 4:12; 10:43; Matthew 5:16; Romans 6:13; Ephesians 5:8-10; 2 Timothy 2:15; 1 Peter 2:9, 10)

3. How do you come to know your misery?

The law of God tells me.

(Romans 3:20 7:7-25)

Catechism:

52. What do you believe concerning “the Holy Spirit”?

First, He, as well as the Father and the Son, is eternal God; second, He has been given to me personally, so that, by true faith, He makes me share in Christ and all His blessings, comforts me, and remains with me forever.

(Genesis 1:1,2; Matthew 28:19; Acts 5:3,4; 1 Corinthians 6:19; 2 Corinthians 1:21,22; Galatians 4:6; 3:14; John 15:26; Acts 9:31; John 14:16,17; 1 Peter 4:14)

53. What do you believe concerning the “Holy Catholic Church”?

I believe that the Son of God through His Spirit and Word, out of the entire human race, from the beginning of the world to its end, gathers, protects, and preserves for Himself a community chosen for eternal life and united in true faith. And of this community I am and always will be a living member.

54. What do you understand by “the communion of saints”?

First, that believers one and all, as members of this community, share in Christ and in all His treasures and gifts; second, that each member should consider it his duty to use his gifts readily and cheerfully for the service and enrichment of the other members.
