HOW ABOUT THOSE "SMALL" USHERS? Using Little Kids to Do Big Jobs in Church

"The ushers, tall and small, will now collect our tithes and offerings." That's what Worship Leader Jon Haines says each Sunday as we begin our weekly offering in worship. Two adults and two children then proceed to receive the offering, working the pews, row by row.

Using children as ushers is not about a manpower shortage. It is about giving our children an active role in the life and work of our church. "The kids are cute," said Pastor **Dan Morrison**, "but there is a serious reason for putting them to work."

Children's Ministry Director **Laura Haines** came up with the idea.

"Sometimes we say to kids, "You're just kids! You can't serve! You need to sit there and listen and learn from other people," Haines observed. "But all of us like to be where we are needed and feel included. The children need to feel needed and included, too. One way to do that is to let them be ushers."

Thus far, child ushers have included: Annie Laurie Bramer; Isaac and Oliver Brobst; Naomi Crawford; A.J., Gracie, and Jack Gerardi; Karineh and Dafne Goretti; Annaliese, Briella, and Jaiden Haines; Liam and Lucas Herwig; Mia Morrison; and Maelina, Micah, and Myra Waring.

But ushering is just the beginning. Children also monitor the soundboard, run the slideshow, and operate the internet broadcast. **Jon Haines**, who oversees these ministries, set a rule that a kid has to be at least 10 years old before they can operate one of the computerized functions. And thus far helping with the technology have been **Isaac**

"If we teach our kids the servanthood lifestyle early on, they will continue to look for places to serve in the future," said **Laura Haines**. "Our kids are cared for most of the time, and so they can't see the opportunites to serve others. Letting them serve, rather than being served all the time, helps them see where they can help."

Pastor **Morrison** noted, "An added benefit of having ushers "tall and small" is that our chidren get to know Head Usher **Bert Holmes!**"

NEW SUNDAY MORNING SCHEDULE ON TAP Plan Will Bring Two Services Closer

HVPC again will have two worship services on Sunday mornings. But this time it won't be one contemporary and one traditional. It will be one Portuguese and one English. The new schedule will begin on September 10, 2023, the first Sunday after Labor Day.

Last summer, HVPC had four services: two English services in the morning, plus one English and one Portuguese service in the evening. But by the beginning of the 2022 Advent season, we had two services – English in the morning and Portuguese in the evening.

In June, after a couple months of study by an ad hoc committee chaired by Elder **Debra Jack**, Session decided to put both services in the morning.

Portuguese worship will begin at 9:00 a.m. and English worship at 11:15 a.m. Between the two services, Sunday school classes for all ages in both English and Portuguese will happen.

The Session had three goals in making this change. First, this schedule will help grow our church as people prefer morning worship.

Second, with both services in the morning the whole HVPC congregation will see each other more and can collaborate on Sunday school.

And third, the new schedule will allow **Pastor Sousa** and **Pastor Morrison** to launch evening services in Collegeville, where they believe the new Fellowship Presbyterian Church will be planted.

"I was so happy to see the unity," **Deb Jack** said of the ad hoc committee formed to figure out the Sunday morning schedule. That team consisted of **Ariadne Azevedo**, **Liliana Coelho**, **Jordan Goretti**, **Laura Haines**, **Bert Holmes**, **Dan Morrison**, **Jay** and **Pat Sarajian**, **Matt Schaper**, and **Bruno Sousa**. "People were willing to set aside their own desires and work for the good of all."

The change, of course, won't be easy and there is plenty of work that must be done to get ready, particularly by staff responsible for Sunday school

and music.

While there are many reasons for the change, Pastor Sousa pointed to the cultural pluses. "Our Brazilian adults will develop their English and be united with a real American culture in church. And our children will sharpen their Biblical knowledge in English," he said. "But it will be a noisy church," Sousa observed with a laugh. "We Brazilians are much more informal in everything, and now we will step into the well-organized and quiet American congregation."

"It will be busy, for sure," said **Pastor Morrison**, "but it will be a lot of fun!"


Cheryl Waring was received as a member in worship on March 26. Her grandson **William Waring** is working for Saladworks in Huntingdon Valley this summer.

THE HILLTOP HERALD HVPC's First Newsletter Ran 300 Issues



People love to know what is going on! That's why a church newsletter is always appreciated.

The earliest newsletter in the HVPC archives is the inaugural issue of *The Hilltop Herald* which hit the newsstands on January 3, 1946.

This one-page, one-sided sheet was published by the HVPC Sunday School and appeared every two weeks. The newsletter was mimeographed on printed letterhead and mailed to all members.

At the time, Sunday School attendance hovered around 80 students of all ages. All the classes had a coordinated lesson plan and *The Hilltop Herald* announced assigned Bible readings for the coming weeks so students could prepare for their lessons.

For February 10, 1946, students were to have read the entire Book of Numbers.

Sunday School was a competitive affair in those days. Honors for perfect attendance – for classes, families, and individuals – were regularly reported. Banners were hung in winning classes and perfect attendance pins awarded to scholars. The pressure to help one's class win was so great that one boy who showed up to church without his Bible raced home to get it, as attendance without a Bible didn't count!

In addition to upcoming reading assignments and statistics on attendance and giving, the newsletter reported bits of personal news, like weddings, birthdays, army enlistments, and visits from out-oftown guests. Oldtimers will recognize many names: Aemisseger, Anderson, Flack, Ivins, Pletcher, Shelmire, Wunderlich, and more.

While the newsletter was the official organ of the Sunday School department, it also ran notes about the larger work of the church. We learn about guest missionary speakers, building improvements, and the search for a new pastor.

The last numbered edition of *The Hilltop Herald* was no. 222 in December 1960. By that time, in the pastorate of **Leonard Clayton**, the newsletter had grown to eight pages, with a sermon-like message from the pastor on the cover.

The latest number of *The Hilltop Herald* in our archives is from June 1967, which would have been the 300th edition of the publication started in 1946.
