

This month our country celebrates its 238th birthday, relatively young in the history of nations. America was founded on certain basic God-given principles and presuppositions. No other country ever had such a Christian beginning as ours. In 1620 the Pilgrim Fathers arrived on these shores with a specific purpose. As the Mayflower lay at anchor, they gathered in the cabin of the ship and wrote a document called the Mayflower Compact. The document begins with the words, "In ye name of God, Amen." Later it states the purpose of their coming: "For the glory of God and the advancement of the Christian faith."

The preamble of the Declaration of Independence includes the statement, "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are endowed by their Creator with certain inalienable rights." The fact that God has granted us certain inalienable rights is so obvious that it is beyond argument. Since God gave the rights and not the government, the government cannot take them away. The Declaration of Independence was a declaration of independence from England, but at the same time it was a declaration of dependence upon God.

There are revisionists in our country who want to rewrite history, leaving out some of the aspects of our national heritage. However, no one can change the fact that our nation was born in the heat of a spiritual revival. Of the 55 men who signed the Declaration of Independence, 52 were deeply committed Christians and the other three believed in the Bible as the divine truth, the God of Scripture, and His personal intervention. Immediately after adopting the Declaration of Independence, the Continental Congress voted to purchase and import 20,000 copies of the Bible for the people of this nation.

Patrick Henry, who is called the firebrand of the American Revolution, is remembered for his words, ="Give me liberty or give me death." However, the few textbooks that still quote those words fail to include the context in which they were spoken. Here is what Henry said: "An appeal to arms and the God of hosts is all that is left us. But we shall not fight our battle alone. There is a just God that presides over the destinies of nations. The battle, sir, is not to the strong alone. Is life so dear, or peace so sweet, as to be purchased at the price of chains and slavery? Forbid it almighty God. I know not what course others may take, but as for me, give me liberty or give me death!" The next year Patrick Henry wrote, "It cannot be emphasized too strongly or too often that this great nation was founded not by religionists, but by Christians; not on religion, but on the Gospel of Jesus Christ." In a speech to the General Assembly of Virginia in 1778, James Madison, the architect of our constitution and the fourth president of the United States, said, "We have staked the whole future of American civilization, not upon the power of government, far from it. We have staked the future of all our political institutions upon the capacity of each and all of us to govern ourselves, to sustain ourselves, according to the Ten Commandments of God."

In George Washington's first inaugural address, he declared as his "first official Act, my fervent supplications to that Almighty Being who rules over the Universe, who presides in the Councils of Nations, and whose providential aids can supply every human defect, that his benediction may consecrate to the liberties and happiness of the People of the United States, a Government instituted by themselves for these essential purposes." Toward the end of his address, he said, "We ought to be no less persuaded that the propitious smiles of Heaven can never be expected on a nation with disregard to the eternal rules of order and right which Heaven itself has ordained." I wonder how the ACLU would have reacted to these words if they had been present.

In 1782 the United States Congress passed this resolution: "The Congress of the United States recommends and approves the Holy Bible for use in all schools." In 1963 the Supreme Court ruled that Bible reading was outlawed as unconstitutional in the public school system. I wonder if the Congress of 1782 were aware that they were defying the constitution.

In December of 1820, the great statesman Daniel Webster made a speech commemorating the 200th anniversary of the Plymouth colony. In describing the beginnings of our nation, he said, "Let us not forget the religious character of our origin. Our fathers were brought hither by their high veneration for the Christian religion. They journeyed by its light, and labored in its hope. They sought to incorporate and infuse its influence through all of their institutions, civil, political, or literary."

John Jay, the first Chief Justice of the United States, held views far different from the present Supreme Court. Here is what he wrote in 1797: "Providence has given to our people the choice of their rulers, and it is their duty, as well as the privilege and interest of our Christian nation to select and prefer Christians for their rulers."

The sixth president of the United States, John Quincy Adams, said in a speech on July 4, 1821, "The highest glory of the American Revolution was this: it connected in one indissoluble bond the principles of civil government with the principles of Christianity." Anybody who claims that our founding fathers believed in the separation of God from government is lying!

On June 8, 1845, President Andrew Jackson said, "The Bible is the rock on which this republic rests." That wasn't a preacher talking. It was a president.

In his farewell address to the citizens of Springfield, Illinois, Abraham Lincoln requested fervent prayer that "the great God that assisted Washington shall be with me." Later he said, "I believe the Bible is the best gift God has ever given to men. All the good from the Savior of the world is communicated to us through this book."

In a speech delivered on May 7, 1911, in Denver, Colorado, Woodrow Wilson, the 28th president of the United States, spoke these words: "The Bible is the one supreme source of revelation of the meaning of life, the nature of God and spiritual nature and needs of men. It is the only guide of life which really leads the spirit in the way of peace and salvation. America was born a Christian nation. America was born to exemplify that devotion to the elements of righteousness, which are derived from the revelations of Holy Scriptures. Part of the destiny of Americans lies in their daily perusal of this great book of revelations. That if they would see America free and pure they will make their own spirits free and pure by this baptism of the Holy Spirit."

Youth & Younger Single Adults

As many of you know that June was a very busy month for us in the student & younger singles ministry and summer has just begun. Thank you for your prayers and support for the Belize mission trip, it was a complete success. We are currently looking at ways that we can assist in getting as many English & Spanish NIV bibles together as they have a desperate need for God's Word there with surprisingly few copies in most churches. Sometimes, the pastor of the church is the only person with a physical copy of the Word in the church or village. Pray that God will provide thousands of bibles so that the gospel of Jesus Christ can continue to be preached.

On Sunday nights I have been teaching a parenting help class that I've entitled "Great Expectations". This four part series is designed to come alongside our parents & grandparents and assist them by enriching the relationship with their young adult, and to become the spiritual leaders in the home that God has called them to be. Below you will see an excerpt from part 2 of these sessions, we will finish the series on Sunday night July 6th from 5:30-7:00 in the Youth Room. We can clearly see that the culture has failed our students and that we as parents and grandparents are called by God to lead our students into spiritual maturity. We also can see through history how we got to this point and we can't simply sit back and wish for the past, instead we must actively engage and make changes in our homes. The main question is how do we do this? First, let me say that it will take lasting commitment, a commitment that doesn't waiver with the busyness of life that is sure to come. We must declare our independence from what is average in today's American home and actively seek to portray Christ in our daily lives. (continued)

Societal view...

I.Life needs to be convenient. Abortion, religion, sex, entertainment are available to me for my comfort, my enjoyment, and my fulfillment. 2. There are plenty of ways to know God, all roads, all religions lead to Him, some people are just on different paths. Don't judge me. 3. There are no moral absolutes and to be against something is intolerance and hatred (Homosexuality, abortion, political affiliation, etc.). 4. Parents are to give their students the best of everything or they will be unfulfilled in life or be found lacking compared to their peers. 5. When it comes to kids the primary measure of success is beauty, power, wealth, and fame. 6. As long as I'm busy doing things for my kids everything is o.k. (games, hobbies, practices, etc).

Biblical Christ-centered world view...

I. Life is not about me, we exist to serve others. My entire life revolves around and is focused on what I'm doing to advance the gospel of Christ. I exist to bring glory to God. 2. There's only One Way, One Truth, and One Life found in Jesus Christ alone. I should show this to everyone else by the way I love and serve others. 3.God's Word is absolute and is to be the basis of my world view. I should apply its truths' to all areas of my life. In basic terms, if God's Word says it's wrong, then it's wrong. If there's no teaching or there's liberty then I ask two questions; is it necessary, and will it cause another to stumble. To be against something is not hatred it is conviction, we can be against something without ugliness or violence and can love the person and still be against the sinful action. 4. Parents who give their students the best of everything are robbing their kids of work ethic, real life experience, and are setting up a false world view for their students. To build a well-rounded student you must give them increasing areas of responsibility that are balanced with trust, reward, and consequence. 5. The primary measure of success as a parent is to live out your faith in front of your child, so much so that they emulate your walk, they desire what you have, and they will hold you in high esteem. 6. I can be busy doing many things but only what's done for eternity will last. My schedule and my student's schedule will be skewed towards service, worship, and family growth projects.

1. Be involved in your student's lives. Don't take no for an answer. Know their; friends, their relationships (BF, GF), their coaches and teammates, their schedule, their hobbies, who they talk to, text, social media, computer, etc. Not nosy but involved. 2. Show your walk. You can't expect your child to do something you are not. Let them see you pray, read God's Word, do missions, serve others, and see you putting a priority on worship. You are the example setter. 3. Show your love! If you don't express your love and acceptance to them someone else will. Students, more so than adults, naturally gravitate towards acceptance. If they don't feel unconditional love at home the will seek it elsewhere. Dad's play with your children, show affection, and vocalize your love for them. This doesn't mean we abdicate our leadership and accept sin in their lives but we do love them in spite of their failures. Have an open-door policy, they can come to you about anything, and nothing will change your love for them. Help remove the fear factor. 4. Discipline the right way. Discipline should be love-based. If you're angry, take a break before the penalty phase kicks in. Reinforce love afterwards. Balance punishment with infraction. 5. Teach teamwork within the family, chores should be based around this idea. Instill the importance of commitment and giving/ keeping ones word. Show excellence, anything worth doing is worth doing right and to the best of our ability. Share a skill you possess. Build up self-esteem, compliment instead of tearing down. Create positive friendships between your students and their peers and with other trusted adults. 6. Set your student's schedule (and your own). Help them choose one sport, one hobby, one extra-curricular. When we are overloaded in our schedule the family structure breaks down and we have the opportunity to get testier. At home, plan family time; it can be a family outing, dinner around the table, watching a movie together, or a family bible study. Spend at least 30 minutes per day of face-to-face time with your kids. 7. Put the phone down, turn the game off, laptop/tablet off, limit TV time. See what really happened in your student's day, invest. Talk about your day, be REAL, and talk about your struggles and the challenges in daily life. Have a conversation don't give lectures.
