

Message from Brother M.R.

When Jesus would teach He would always speak in parables, stories of the world around us and how it reflected the great truths of their creator. So for us to better understand His teaching requires us to study the way of life in the days of Jesus and just how their culture lived and played. That reality has caused me to consider the stories Jesus would have told if he were here today. How many of those stories would deal with the internet and television? Better yet how many of those stories would deal with sports such as baseball and of course football. I wonder how He would address the great rivalry that exist in this area between the football programs of Auburn, Alabama and Georgia. Certainly, He would have addressed them often as most of His parables dealt with the peoples passions.

To prove this point look at how many times the Bible speaks of running and the world of archery. The marathon and archery were popular sporting events in Biblical times. As a matter of fact archery terms were very wide spread throughout both the Old and New Testament, as God would reference both the bow and arrow on many occasions. Being a lifelong archer myself, I have always loved to read those illustrations that used archery as they had special meaning to me. This really is no surprise as the bow and arrow were weapons of great military power as well. The English would rule the world because of the invention of the English Longbow. They had in this bow a weapon that gave them great military advantage. It would shoot farther so they could strike their enemies at greater distance. This along with the fact the string on the Longbow could be made smaller in diameter proved to be the edge they needed to expand their kingdom. The English arrow with its small knock grove could not be fired back at the English while the English archers could return the enemies arrows with ease. To this very day that technology is still in use. The Russian ammunition is just slightly larger than our standard round. Thus they can pick up our ammunition and fire it from their weapons but we can't fire theirs. Even the architecture of old reflects the influence of the bow and arrow, as the windows of the buildings get narrower as they go out. This was to enable the archers to shoot out without the archers from the ground being able to shoot in

I had studied the Bible for many years before attending seminary, and felt confident that I had discovered the very best of the archery text, but I was mistaken. It was actually my second year of seminary when my Greek studies had moved from the alphabet and sentence structure, to the study of powerful New Testament words, that I discovered the most widely used archery term of all. Sin! Hamartia is the Greek word we translate to mean, the failure which is Sin! Literally translated it means, "to miss the mark", or "to take a wrong turn". It was a common word used to describe a failure to complete a desired act. It was the system used to keep score in an archery tournament. The archers would train all their lives, and being people just like we are today, it would not take long before everyone wanted to know who was the best. So rules were set, and the targets were made just as we see them to this very day. The center circle we call the bulls eye was "the mark". The first ring around the bulls eye counted as a sin of one. The second ring would count two sins, and so it went to the fifth ring at the outer limit of the target. Now each archer would strive to do his very best. Their life of experience and practice would be called upon as men then, like men today, didn't like to lose. At the end of the tournament the archer with the least Sin would win. All had strived for perfection, which would mean a score of zero, but that would never be the case. Regardless of how hard they tried, all had sinned and fallen short of perfection. No matter how hard the archers tried, by the end of the day, at least one arrow would fall just short, and miss the mark. Perfection was an ideal, but not an expectation, as everyone knew the nature of an arrow to so easily get off course.

Now do you see the reason why God would inspire Paul to write "All have sinned and fallen short of the glory of God"? Our lives are like arrows launched at birth off course, deflected by the fall, into what we know as Sin. Off course from the beginning we live our lives making bad choices that deflect us even farther from the narrow gate for which God has called us. So what then is the hope of hitting the mark for which God created us? Christ Jesus is just that hope! For through His sacrifice on behalf of mankind, we have the promise of the forgiveness of Sin. Through Him our lives can be redirected and put back on course, so that we might hit the mark.

Message from Brother M.R.

Oh what a beautiful picture is painted through the promise of God's grace. Early in my faith I really believed that Sin was the choice to do that which is wrong. And though that is true it is not the whole truth as every act that does not come from faith is also sin. (Romans 14:23) The real truth of this picture is that even the archers who tried their very best, sinned. Our best shot is never going to be good enough to hit the mark for the mark is perfection. Like the arrow that is blown off course by the least of winds we are hopeless to change the course of our momentum. Each second that passes leaves us further and further from the mark. Once deflected the arrow is lost, traveling further and further off course every second it travels. The entire life of the flight is lived in sin from that very first deflection, doomed to miss the mark. Though the arrow is without hope we are not. For God has entered on our behalf to remove our sin and put us on course to hit the mark. Though I continue to make mistakes, I no longer live in sin (off course to where I would miss the mark) because of Jesus and what He did to save me when I could not save myself.

Perhaps the best part of this whole story is it's ability to help us all understand what Sin actually is. To stop and realize that we are all in need of a Savior.
