

June is here and with it will come the first really hot weather of the summer. I can remember June for a lot of different reasons but none so clear as the hay fields. As a young high school student growing up in Southern Illinois among the farming community I can still remember the smell of fresh cut hay. In the Midwest the word hay meant clover and one encounter with clover hay will leave a lasting impression on you. You see we worked in a crew that would put up the farmer's hay for 12 cents a bale meaning each of us were paid 3 cents for every bale of hay that made it to the hay barn. On our best days we could put up 2000 bale if everything worked just right. That was \$60.00 a day and we thought we were getting rich. The clover leaf dries into a delicate paper like consistency that easily breaks up into a small cloud of dust when baled into the square bales we worked with back then. The stem of the clover on the other hand would become quite hard making it heavy, prickly and dusty all at the same time. Now bring along some really hot weather and that is the recipe for long term memories. I can remember my 1st day on the hay crew like it was only yesterday as every newcomer goes through the same introduction to the barn loft. Now I know all about all the wonderful visions you might have of a roll in the hay of a barn loft but trust me it was nothing like that. It was super hot up there and the more hay you put in the less the air could get through to help you. The hay bales were coming up a conveyor belt and they made sure they were coming back to back. Soon it would grow dark in the loft from the cloud of clover dust that would cling to a sweaty teenager like moss on the north side of a tree. I can recall thinking that I would not last another minute up there but I was determined to prove my worth. After the first few minutes I remember being surprised by the fact that I wasn't already dead. The next thing I remember was the sound of the conveyor running empty as the bales stopped coming and then it happened. It was glorious and life changing all at the same time. It was the farmer's daughter! She had realized what they were doing to me and she had come to my rescue. My eyes were fixed on the most beautiful thing I had ever seen in my life. I stood at the top of the conveyor speechless overcome with delight at the site of that ice cold watermelon coming up that conveyor right into my waiting arms. It wasn't the most sanitary conditions but never have I eaten anything as good as that. The funny thing about this story is that the farmer's daughter was named Dawn, so I can honestly say I was saved once by dawns arrival. Well boys will be boys and the Devil we remain true to himself as well so the next time he trys to work or worry you to death and the world just seems as dark as it can be you just hold on to this one great truth. Dawn is coming and nothing is sweeter than being rescued.

## A Message from Dr. Jerry Horner

Over the past 25 years or so I have made annual, and oftentimes semi-annual ministry trips to Asia, during which time I have preached and taught extensively in most of the countries in that part of the world. I have just returned from one such trip, on which I spent the last few days in Shanghai, China, a sprawling city of 25 million people. In 1953, shortly after they took control of the country, the communists expelled all missionaries, and in 1966 Chairman Mao banned all religious groups. In 1979 the government once again allowed approved religions, which consist of Protestant Christianity, Buddhism, Taoism, and modified Catholicism, that is, independent of Rome. All registered churches are subject to government supervision, and the government can censor and control churches as it deems necessary and appropriate. Church meetings, activities, and publications are monitored. Churches must be indigenous, with no foreign mission activity or outside influences. There are to be no networks or denominations, presbyteries, or other such groups. Every church is to exist under the leadership of the municipal and provincial council. The government can even require pastors to submit sermons in advance for review and approval.

Because of all these restrictions, there are many thousands of illegal underground churches, meeting in apartments, rented hotel rooms, and other such places. On Sunday I preached at an international church, which the government allows, because only foreigners attend. However, I taught Chinese Christians many hours in other meetings that were held in private rooms at restaurants owned by Christians.

There is much persecution against these unregistered churches, particularly in provinces away from major cities, where there are not many foreign tourists or residents. For example, in the past two years in Zhejiang province, where Christians make up 15% of the population, more than 200 churches have been demolished and 2,000 crosses removed. Pastors and other church leaders have been imprisoned, and some have been martyred. But in the face of such persecution, the Chinese Christians refuse to give in. One of their popular sayings is, "The greater the persecution, the greater the revival."

The battle the Chinese Christians are enduring may seem like an ant on an elephant, but statistics show that their motto is true. When the communists took over the country in 1949, there were an estimated half million Christians in China. Reliable sources estimate that today there may be as many as 175 million, and the number increases by several million each year. Those who are knowledgeable of such figures say that by 2030 there will be more than 275 million Christians in China, making it the country with the largest Christian population in the world.

I can testify from experience that the stereotype of the church in China as consisting of the elderly and infirmed is completely false. Not only in China, but in all of Asia, including the Muslim countries, millions of young people are responding to the gospel. In fact, most of the churches where I have ministered have a majority of young, well-educated, active professionals. The vibrant enthusiasm of Asian Christians, thriving in the midst of opposition, makes typical Christianity in America seem drearily lethargic. ## A Message from Andrew Spires

It is summer missions time! We are just a few days away from hitting the open road and the friendly skies to go serve in Boston and Belize this summer. We started preparing for these two service opportunities last October and now it's almost time. Again, just a quick breakdown of what we'll be doing in both places. In Boston (June 9th-17th), we'll be working with four North American Mission Board church planters who are in various stages of "planting" their churches. One church meets in a school building on Sunday afternoon and shares a meal together each week before worship, one meets in a dance studio that must be setup before and torn down immediately after each Sunday morning worship service, another meets in church member's homes and is currently looking for a space to meet regularly by the Fall, and the final one actually has their own building. Some of these churches wouldn't seem very much like church to us in the traditional sense. They don't have a nice complex, they don't have great musicians, but they are passionately pursing God in a part of this country that truly needs it. Second, we'll be headed down to build on our previous work in the Central-American country of Belize (June 25th-July 1st). We are taking 70+ people, which represents the largest foreign mission team I've ever led. I am so excited about all the pieces God has put in place to set us on a course for success on this mission. I truly believe this will be a special trip as we have a great mixture of returners and first-timers. Once again, we'll have the skilled servants to work on construction projects and on the medical team (including dentistry), and lots of able bodied children's workers who are ready to witness to the children of Belize through VBS. Once we've completed the work in Boston & Belize we're not done yet, we have reserved Southside Park here in Phenix City for what we're calling our Pop-Up VBS July 10th-12th. Our students and young adults will be bringing a Lakewood-stlye VBS program to kids who could not normally attend our regular VBS here in June. That's local missions, stateside missions, and foreign missions all in the same summer and you can be involved too! I know many of you have supported our Belize and Boston fundraisers, and we all want to shout thank you, thank you, thank you! We couldn't go and serve without your love, prayers, and financial support. However, we will need adult volunteers who can serve in our Pop-Up VBS in July, especially those who will have already served here in our LBC VBS in June and will already be familiar with the materials. If you're interested please let me know. If you haven't been involved with supporting our summer missions efforts as of yet, there is a list of needed items we are still collecting for our mission trips listed below.. Please pray for our 50+ people going to Boston and 70+ going to Belize, and we look forward to sharing what God did in and through us once we get back.

We are in the process of collecting the following items for our summer mission plans; crayons, coloring books, markers, hair ties/bows, jump ropes, Frisbees, soccer balls, kick balls, basketballs/nets, footballs, bubbles, stickers, small bibles, wiffle balls & bats, glue sticks, sidewalk chalk, powdered Powerade/Gatorade mix, hard candy, balloons, kites, hand pumps w/needle, ibuprofen, children's Tylenol, chewable vitamins, antibiotic cream, hydrocortisone cream, diaper rash cream, Band-aids, toothbrushes, toothpaste, and floss. If you can donate any of these items please drop them by the church office by June 4th.
