A Message from Dr. Jerry Horner

When I was recently in Vietnam, a Christian businessman asked me a strange question. He asked, "Do all eligible voters in America vote?" I almost responded by answering, "No, but a lot of non-eligible voter's vote," but I answered, "No, they don't." Then he proceeded to tell me that everyone in Vietnam who is eligible to vote does so, because it was required and the police make certain that there was 100% participation in the elections. He added that there was actually no choice of candidates, because the Communist party is the only party and there is only one slate of candidates. In other words, the outcome of the election is assured, because there is no opposition. That's the way it was in the old USSR, before the collapse of communism. Many years ago I was in the Soviet Union during election time. The whole process was a joke, because there was only one candidate for each office, and voters were simply doing what the state forced them to do.

While we might consider the communistic system a mockery, it is more shameful for people in our country, who do have choices, not to exercise their privilege and fulfill their responsibility. I believe that failure to vote is even more shameful for Christians, whom God expects to be exemplary citizens. Thomas Jefferson wrote, "Can the liberties of a nation be secure, when we have removed the conviction that these liberties are the gift of God?" Yet, in the presidential election of 2012, approximately 25,000,000 eligible Christian voters did not vote. To me, that statistic is disgraceful. What right do we have to pray for God to bless our country if we don't care enough about our country to have a part in choosing its leadership?

I am tired of hearing Christian friends say that they are going to stand on principle and not vote at all, since they don't approve of either candidate. I suppose they think its righteous and noble to take such a stand, but I've got news for you. Not voting is a sign of apathy, not principle, and your decision to stay home on election day deserves no applause. I have more news for you. When you vote, you are not merely voting for a personality; you are voting for principles. Regardless of how adorable or detestable a candidate may be, that candidate is representing a platform that clearly states what the party intends to do. It does not matter what you think of Trump or Clinton or any other candidate as a person, but it matters a great deal what laws will be enacted and what judges will be appointed, depending on the outcome of the election. If you really care about principles, you would read the party platforms and then prayerfully cast your ballot. The platforms are readily available on the Internet, and if you are in doubt about which one more nearly approaches your principles, I challenge you to read them, because they are as different as night and day and as far apart as evil and good.

God exhorted the people living in exile in Babylon: "Seek the welfare of the city where I have caused you to be carried away captive, and pray to the Lord on its behalf; for in its welfare you will find your welfare" (Jer. 29:7). While there is no command to vote here, one way to insure the welfare of a country is to choose excellent leaders. So by way of a contemporary application of this exhortation, I believe that Christians today have a similar obligation to vote in a way that will "seek the welfare" of the United States.

Who knows what is to come? The future is unknown to us, but is certain to God.

His Word promises us that He alone is in control, and that He sets kings upon their thrones and moves their hearts as He wills. This certainly has been a contentious year with all the turmoil of the looming presidential election. As you are reading this, you're most likely preparing to go and vote in a week or so. Most Christians are unsettled, to say the least, about the presidential choices we have this year. Many will choose to vote strictly along party lines, and others will stay home and not vote at all. While we don't vet know the outcome, God does, and whether your candidate wins or not, God is still in control. Things may get tougher, and no matter who wins, Christians are likely to face deeper persecution here in the United States and worldwide. It's estimated that globally over 100 million Christians live under daily persecution for their faith by their governments or terrorist regimes. In 2015, it is estimated that over 7,000 Christians died for their faith in Christ alone, and that doesn't count the believers oppressed, displaced, and murdered by ISIS in Iraq, and Syria, or by the radical communist dictatorship in North Korea. In those countries it is simply impossible to get accurate numbers. All that said, this world is becoming more and more toxic for Christians, but we are challenged to not shrink back from the challenge. The 1st century church was no different with the exception that things were actually worse for Christians then than now. When a person became a follower of Christ they often lost their jobs, their friends, and even their families disowned them. As you know, many were hunted down and arrested, some were killed for sport, some thrown to the dogs, many crucified, and others burned as human candles and ISIS has revived many of these abhorrent practices adding to them beheadings and public boiling of Christians. As mentioned earlier, Christians are not called to shrink back, we can't take our ball and go home, and we can no longer be the silent majority, it is time to take a stand! The modern day church is somewhat to blame for the timidity of believers today as we've taught an easy-believe-ism that says come to Jesus and He'll make everything alright. While well intentioned this theology has perpetuated the myth that Christians don't have to live their faith out loud and can simply attend their "holy huddles" each week then go home feeling better about themselves more informed than before. However, let us ask ourselves these questions; Is that what Jesus suffered and died for? Did Jesus leave heaven, bear insult, ridicule, shame, and ultimately endure a horrid death to have followers who give less than their all? Followers who hide their faith instead of wearing His name (Christian-follower of Christ) as a badge of honor? Or followers who live in society but never affect it? I love the words of 1 Peter 4:16-17; "However, if you suffer as a Christian, do not be ashamed, but praise God that you bear that name. For it is time for judgment to begin with God's household; and if it begins with us, what will the outcome be for those who do not obey the gospel of God?" Can we truly say that we praise God for allowing us to bear His name? I would never try and tell any of you how to vote as I believe each person needs to vote their own conscience and prayerfully consider their choice, but I do know one thing, God will still be in charge on November 9th just as He's always been! Let us be reminded of the truth found in Hebrews 4:14-16 which says; "Therefore, since we have a great high priest who has ascended into heaven, Jesus the Son of God, let us hold firmly to the faith we profess. For we do not have a high priest who is unable to empathize with our weaknesses, but we have one who has been tempted in every way, just as we are—yet he did not sin. Let us then approach God's throne of grace with confidence, so that we may receive mercy and find grace to help us in our time of need." Our country is in a time of need, we need revival, and we are looking for a king like Josiah (2 Kings 22, 23) to return the nation to God, but no matter who wins we aren't going to get that kind of leader this year. So what can we do? We pray, to that High Priest named Jesus, we thank Him for His mercy and grace, we pray in agreement with God's will to be done, we hold firm to our faith, not timidly but boldly, and we become more like Josiah. We start tearing down the idols in our own lives, we repent of false doctrines that taught idleness and only an academic pursuit of God, and commit to changing our world. I will never forget the day that I received my shoebox. I still remember every gift in it. I've kept the box to this day. It was so lovely. The cardboard shoebox was beautifully and meticulously wrapped in green wrapping paper that had little children on it opening gifts by a Christmas tree. Then I opened it! The most exciting gifts were a Barbie doll and a stationery kit. I loved Barbies—and then I got a real one! She was so beautiful."I loved Barbies—and then I got a real one!" I felt I must be really special to have my own stationery kit. It had pink leopard print on top and inside there was a little notebook, five different colored markers, a stamp, a glittery sticker sheet, and a pink pen. There was something about the colors, and something about the fact that it opened like a book with a little zipper that made it so special. I didn't want to use it. I've only used about four or five stickers out of 50 in there and I've only used one notebook sheet. Almost everything in the kit is intact. One thing in the box I'll never forget was a picture of a girl and her letter—Heather Roberts from Enon, Ohio. I admired her picture with her blue eyes and her blonde hair. We started writing letters and today, nearly 20 years later, we're friends. It's such a blessing to be pen pals with the girl who sent me the box. "That box was a seed of friendship planted years ago."Years later I moved to America and I realized how much tension there is between the Middle East and the U.S. That box was a seed of friendship planted years ago. Even though we lived in completely different parts of the world, Heather and I had the unity of Christ when our countries had disagreements, especially after 9/11. The box is a sign of peace in a time of war. A year after I received my box I accepted Jesus at a camp. But only when I got to the States and was sending a box myself did I get what happened.
