

## A Message from Dr. Jerry Horner

Our country is supposed to be a "government of the people, by the people, for the people," including Christians, and each citizen bears the responsibility to vote to keep the government in check. Christians especially are to be the salt and light of our society, and we cannot effectively function as such if we fail to fulfill the responsibilities of citizenship. A non-vote by a Christian is a vote for secular control of our government. It's a sad commentary that more than 25,000,000 Christians who were registered to vote did not vote in the 2012 presidential election. Who knows what the outcome would have been if only a third of that number had voted? It is within the power of Christian voters to shift this country back in the direction of its biblical foundation by voting for candidates who regard the sanctity of life, marriage, family, and biblical moral principles. I truly believe that bad officials are elected by good citizens who don't care enough to vote.

Abraham Lincoln said, "Elections belong to the people. It's their decision. If they decide to turn their back on the fire and burn their behinds, then they will just have to sit on their blisters." Franklin D. Roosevelt said, "Nobody will ever deprive the American people of the right to vote except the American people themselves, and the only way they could do this is by not voting." If a Christian doesn't vote, he has no right to complain when he sees things happening in our nation that violate his faith and values.

I have heard many of my fellow believers declare that they are not going to vote in the upcoming election, because they don't approve of any of the candidates. If that is your attitude, then I want to remind you that this election is not primarily about the personalities involved, but about the platforms they represent. Forget the personalities long enough to consider only the issues. Do you know what the candidates represent? Some people argue that once the officials are elected, they are not bound by the platform of their party. That may be true, but statistics show that officials follow the party platform at least 85% of the time.

With that sobering thought in mind, I challenge every American, particularly every Christian American citizen, to read the Democratic and Republican platforms. You will discover that they are as different as night and day and as far apart as evil and good. One is the most blatantly anti-biblical and thoroughly socialistic platform in American history, one that Karl Marx would happily endorse. The other strongly reflects biblical principles on every major issue. Remember that when you vote for a candidate from a certain party, you vote for everything that party stands for. I urge you to vote, but before you do, research the party platforms and cast your vote prayerfully. Then if you can't conscientiously vote any announced candidate, write in your own choice. At least you will be exercising your right and speaking your voice.

One of my goals in student ministry is to equip parents with the necessary tools and knowledge to reinforce what we teach here in the student ministry at home.

After all, I only a have an hour or two with your student each week at most, while you care for them every hour of every day till they're at least 18 (and beyond). I'd like to tackle an issue that's becoming more prevalent these days across the church spectrum. It's a thought that seems to be rooted in logic but is flawed at its base. I sat around tables a few weeks ago with other student pastor's from the Columbus & Phenix City area, all from different backgrounds, different church dynamics, and varying experience and age. We meet together monthly in a group called One Accord. This student pastor group exists for accountability, interaction, fellowship, encouragement, and cooperative event planning. Each month we discuss topics that are evident in our lives and churches. we collaborate how to better work together to advance His Kingdom, and to pick each other's brains for new ideas of how to reach young adults for Christ. This particular meeting, as our discussion grew, a common thread appeared, the question was asked; "Are any of you having trouble with parental support of your ministry?" I lead this group and it's one of my functions to develop the discussion so I quickly dug into the question; "Do you mean getting parents involved as volunteers in your ministry?" The guy responded; "Well yes, that too, but more specifically that parents these days just don't seem to be encouraging their students to attend regular worship or student ministry events anymore, everything else is more important, and I feel as if I'm battling for the souls of these students alone!" It was as if a collective nail had been hit on the head as student pastor after student pastor nodded in agreement and vocalized their experience with this same issue in their church. Story after story was exchanged of how a student had fallen away into sin or apathy and once the student pastor had

tried to usher them back they encountered a unconcerned student and parents who didn't seem to be near as concerned as he was. This led to other questions for many of these student pastor's such as; "Am I serving in the-right place/church, am I really good at what I do, is God calling me elsewhere or to do something else?" These student pastors had internalized the defeat they felt from losing a student to the world and many times the enemy had seized upon the opportunity to bring doubt into their lives and many had even doubted their very calling. As I listened to others in our roundtable discussion my mind went to a lunch meeting I had with a now former student pastor from a large and thriving church in Columbus. He was a member of our group, and very passionate about reaching students for Christ. Though young, he was a leader in our group that others respected and listened to. A while back I had noticed that God was leading Him through a fast, and while not wanting to pry into his reasons. I wanted to let him know that I was praying for him. Several weeks after his lengthy fast had ended he text me and asked if I could go to lunch with him. We met and immediately the problem was apparent; he felt that his ministry was at a crossroads, the students just weren't as passionate anymore, he had personal doubts about his abilities/talents, and parents just didn't seem to care anymore. I already eluded to the outcome, he felt God was calling him to do something else, and he decided to get a secular teaching job and eventually go back to school. I encouraged him, I prayed with him, and I continue to follow up with him. Now back to the meeting, I eventually chimed in and agreed that I had seen varying degrees of this phenomenon in all three churches I've served in, and honestly I do see it here at Lakewood. In fact, if I am being REAL honest, it's rampant here at

LBC among what I'd consider our good, and faithful families. Please don't read into this as I don't say that to point any fingers, or to call anyone out, but instead as a challenge, as a call to action, and as a plea for help! I think often this is unintentional, that in the busyness of life, as we're pulled in so many different directions, sometimes it is hard to achieve a singular spiritual focus. Let me say; I know that no one loves your student more than you do, no one sacrifices more time or finances for their betterment than you, and that each and every parent wants the best for their child. I also know that all of you want your children and grandchildren to love Christ as you do, more than you do, and you want them to live eternally with Christ in heaven. However, it is the meanwhile, the time in between their salvation decision for Christ as Savior & Lord and eternity that I'm writing about. What should they invest in, better said...how should you lead them to invest in Jesus Christ right now? I have had many parents over the years say something like this; "I don't wanna cram Jesus down my students' throat because they will reject Him and I'll lose them forever!" This is very logical, and I believe, an honest statement. None of us should attempt to force Jesus on our child because the decision to follow Jesus has to be their own or it will be worthless as time passes. Unfortunately, many well-intentioned Christian parents seem to wish to expose their student/s to enough Jesus in the hopes that it will rub off on them and eventually stick, but digging a little deeper exposes the flaws into that train of thought. The studies and polling show that the vast majority of all people who come to know Christ make that choice between 4-19 years of age. The numbers starkly decrease over time and age and once over forty are minuscule at best. A closer look at the numbers also tell us that majority of people develop morals, character attributes, and service mindset during their teenage years. So, translate that to the child rearing years for parents, if your student is not passionately in love with Christ during their teenage years the law of averages says most never will be!?! Going further, if the numbers are true, you also know (just ask some of our grandparents) you'll never have more influence over your students' life that you do right now. If you're hoping that you'll be able to interject "religion" into your adult child's life later on the numbers just don't back it up as they listen to us less as they age

not more. Still going deeper, I'd like to ask those of you who are currently practicing this "wait and see" form of parental guidance if you are consistent with it over your entire parenting spectrum? Do you require your student to go to school? Do you make sure they go and get to ball practice? Do you make sure they do homework? Does your child have a curfew, a bedtime? Do you put limits on where they go, what they do, and who they are around? I sure hope so, I know I do! Then why is it okay to lead them in life but not in eternal things? You may say; "they have to get up for school, it is best for their future!" I'd say; I completely agree, but also invest in something ultimately more important than even school as we know only what is done for Him lasts forever. Our student ministry is full, we look forward to more room for expansion in the new building but we have lots of students who are here every time the doors are open, we have visitors on a weekly basis, we have new students making decisions for Christ and getting baptized, but still I'm watching some of our most solid students slowly slip away. I'm not asking you to do something I'm not willing to do; just ask your student, I don't leave them alone, I text them, I send them letters, I lovingly attack them in public, I show up at their schools and embarrass them, all to encourage them to get back in church, but I need your help, I need you to fight alongside me. Growing up, I was that kid who was in church every time the door was open, church was not open for discussion in my home. I used the exact words: "You're cramming Jesus down my throat," to attempt to manipulate my parents, I resented and rebelled, I ran hard after this world, I used my knowledge of Scripture to argue a foolish defense of my ways, I sowed and I have reaped, but my foundation was secure! There was for me and will always be a yanking back point for those who belong to Him as nothing or no one can snatch us from His hand! I know you sacrifice for your student in so many areas of life, but join with me in sacrificing for the most important area, that being the cause of Christ! Every situation is unique and comes with unique challenges and troubles, but we serve a God who is never surprised. He holds all of the answers, He holds us all in His hands, we as parents are guardians by command of the next generation of believers, and I want to join with you to impart His truths' to His children.
