

A Message from Dr. Jerry Horner

Not long ago a professing Christian who was engaged in a questionable activity demanded of me, "Show me in the Bible where it says I can't do this." Sometimes it's easy to decide between right and wrong, because God has given specific statements regarding conduct, such as those in the Ten Commandments. However, there are many questions about right and wrong that are not specifically covered by the Ten Commandments. You see, the Bible is not a rule book of minute laws. It's a guide book, filled with great principles. For example, the Bible nowhere says that you should not abuse your body with heroin or cocaine, or that you should not zoom through a school zone at 100 mph. If God had made the Bible a rule book rather than a guide book, people would always find loopholes in the laws, but you can't find loopholes in the great principles of the Bible. Paul's first letter to the Corinthians gives six positive principles that will help determine if something is right or wrong.

The first is the principle of expediency. "All things are lawful for me, but all things are not expedient" (1 Cor. 6:12). Perhaps you will have a better understanding of this statement if I offer this translation: "But all things don't help me on my way." The word "expedient" is the root of the word "expedition," a journey somewhere. Sometimes the question is not so much, "Is it allowable?" It should be, "Is it the best thing to do?" "Does this help me or hinder me in my Christian walk?" There are some things that may not really be wrong in and of themselves, but in my situation they may slow me down. For example, there is nothing wrong with a hundred pound bar bell, but it's not expedient to carry it on your shoulder if you're running a hundred yard dash. There may be something in your life that is wrong simply because it's a waste of time, a drag anchor that keeps you from arriving at the place God wants you to be. Every activity, every television program, every book, every movie, should pass this test: "Am I a better person and a stronger person for having done this?"

The second principle is that of <u>enslavement</u>. "All things are lawful for me, but I will not be brought under the power of any" (1 Cor. 6:12). That statement means not to be enslaved by anything. People who say that they are free to do something become enslaved to the very thing they claim to have the freedom to do. You may be free to do drugs, or to indulge in some other habit, and you soon find yourself to be a slave, unable to break that habit. Some people say, "I'm free to do what I want to do." That's the reason they are slaves. You see, Jesus sets us free, not to do what we want to do, but to do what we ought to do. A person may be free to sin, but only in Jesus does he become free not to sin. Jesus gives us that pure liberty in which we become free to do what we ought rather than what we want.

The third principle is that of <u>example</u>. Many people claim that what they do doesn't hurt them. If that's your way of thinking, then you better read 1 Corinthians 8:1, which says that you may have the freedom to do something, but you need to consider the influence it might have on others. If what you do causes somebody else to stumble, then it's wrong. If you don't believe that, then you need to read Romans 14:13-15. As Christians, we are not to judge other people; we are to judge ourselves and see to it that we do nothing that would cause anybody else to

stumble. Underscore Romans 14:21, where you find that the question is not, "Will it hurt me?" The question is, "Will it hurt somebody else?" What about your example? If what you do drags somebody else down and causes somebody else to sin, then you have better leave it alone.

The fourth principle is that of edification. "All things are lawful for me, but not all things edify" (1 Cor. 10:23). To edify means to build up. An edifice is a building, and by your life you are either building or tearing down. Everything that you do as a Christian should have a positive influence; otherwise, it will have a negative influence. That principle applies even to your words. If your words are not positive words to encourage, then they are idle words that discourage. And what about self-edification? Why read something or watch something or do something that leaves you depressed, frightened, defeated? You can argue long and loud that there is no harm in it, but ask these questions: "Has it edified me? Has it built others up? Has it made me and others stronger and better?"

The fifth principle is that of exaltation. "Therefore, whether you eat or drink, or whatever you do, do all to the glory of God" (1 Cor. 10:31). Does it exalt the Lord? If it does, then you can do it. If it doesn't, you have no business doing it. Would you do it if Jesus were with you? You should not do anything that you cannot do to the glory of God. In the old days, when boys and girls went on a date, a chaperone went with them. Well, I want to remind you that if you are a Christian, you have a chaperone that goes with you wherever you go. His name is the Holy Spirit. You can't say to Him, "Now, Holy Spirit, I'm going in here, and you can wait for me outside," or "Holy Spirit, close your eyes while I do this," or "Holy Spirit, stop up your ears while I have this conversation." "Do you not know that your body is the temple of the Holy Spirit, who is in you, whom you have from the Lord, and you are not your own? For you were bought at a price; therefore, glorify God in your body and in your spirit, which are God's" (1 Cor. 6:19-20).

The sixth principle is that of <u>evangelism</u>. "Give no offense, either to the Jews or to the Greeks of to the church of God. Just as I also please all me in all things, not seeking my own profit, but the profit of many, that they may be saved" (1 Cor. 10:32-33). What Paul was saying is that he didn't want to do anything that would hinder his witness for Jesus Christ to people and keep them from coming to Christ. We are to live in such a manner that we would not be ashamed to witness for Jesus when people have seen the way we live. How can we tell people a dirty joke or use foul language and then witness to them? How can we worry and worry and then tell people to trust the Lord? How can we be cranky to people and then witness to them?

We are the only Bible the careless world will read; We are the sinner's gospel, we are the scoffer's creed; We are the Lord's last message, given in deed and word; What if the type is crooked? What if the print is blurred?

What if our hands are busy with work other than his?
What if our feet are walking where sin's allurement is?
What if our tongues are speaking of things his lips would spurn?
How can we hope to help him and hasten his return?

Psalm 90 is a psalm of Moses, and it may be the oldest psalm in the bible. It is titled; "A prayer of Moses the man of God." It compares and contrasts the eternality and strength of God with the short lifespan and relative weakness of man to affect his outcome. God is portrayed as our dwelling place, from everlasting to everlasting. A thousand years are but a day in His sight. While men are dust that return to dust, who are swept away in the sleep of death. Nothing remains hidden from God's sight, even our most secret sins are plain for Him to see. The most familiar verse is verse 12; "Teach us to number our days, that we may gain a heart of wisdom." This is more than a proverb from God's humble servant, it is a reflection by the man of God as he thinks about his time here on the earth. Moses realistic view of our weakness is the birthplace of the wisdom of God. As humans, we are always in a hurry, always looking at tomorrow, even when tomorrow isn't even promised to us.

May is graduation month, a time where high school and college seniors are recognized for their achievements. It is also a time where those graduates look forward, towards tomorrow and attempt to map out their lives. In my experience, so many have big plans for their lives as they exit high school or college, but soon find that "life" seems to change that course? It is hard to convince them that they need to number their days. Harder still to convince them to live differently than the rest of the world. And even harder to convince them to rest and wait upon the Lord for His plan for their life. Yet, all of our days are in full view of the Lord. Our short-lived lives, and relative frailty, are some of the damaging effects of sin and the curse. Those grads, who are mostly 17-25 years old, likely have many more days ahead of them, but those whom God has allowed to live long lives on this earth have learned that every single day is a gift of grace from God.

Some may read Psalm 90 and feel depressed about the human condition. However, there are some immense truths to understand from the humble man of God named Moses. First, God is our dwelling place, our fixed point, our home. We can always return to Him, and we don't have to wonder if we can find Him. He doesn't change like shifting shadows and He doesn't change His mind about us. Second, nothing is beyond His view and nothing is beyond His control. He sees all, and knows all, and is working all things towards His intended conclusion. Therefore, His control gives me peace in the storms of this life. Third, His unfailing love towards us is one of His defining attributes, and His compassion carries us along all the days of our lives. I can depend on His love, and that His desire to help and not harm me. Fourth, God alone, is the source of true joy, He is our song, He brings us happiness in Him. I don't have to look for joy in other things that won't last, I can go straight to the source. Finally, God's favor rests upon His people, establishing us in Him, and ordaining the very days of our lives to glorify Him. Only what is established by God will last, so I don't wear myself out chasing after things that will rot.

In closing, reflect on Ephesians 5:15-16; "Be very careful, then, how you live—not as unwise but as wise. Making the most of every opportunity, because the days are evil." A true heart of wisdom comes only from knowing God, and resting in His ability, His plans, and His purposes, all the days of your life.
