

To know Him and make Him known

The Ten Commandments are divided into two sections. The first part deals with our relationship with God, so we call those commands the vertical commands. The second part deals with our relationship to others, so we call those commands the horizontal commands. We must first be right with God before we can be right with others. It's significant that God starts the second section of the Ten Commandments with the statement that we are to honor our father and our mother, because it is a pivotal command. You see, our parents are the first people we meet. If we cannot learn to love and respect our parents, then it's obvious we cannot learn to love and respect anyone else. What God is saying is that the religion that doesn't begin at home does not begin at all, because what happens at home is the basis of everything else. If the home decays, then the church decays. If the church decays, then society decays and the state decays. The basis of all of our relationship to everybody else and everything else on planet earth, after we get right with God, is a home where we learn to honor our father and our mother.

The great evangelist Dwight L. Moody said, "I have lived over sixty years and I have learned one thing if I have learned nothing else. No man or woman who dishonors father or mother ever prospers." Proverbs I:8-9 exhorts, "My son hear the instruction of your father, and do not forsake the law of your mother; for they will be a graceful ornament on your head and chains about your neck." The chains are not chains of bondage, but chains of ornament like a gold chain. It's amazing how much smarter our parents get the older we get. When we're sixteen, we think they're really out of it, and at nineteen we feel that we've surpassed them so far they'll never catch up to us. At twenty-two they're completely out of sight back in the dark ages. Then when we get to the point where we think we know everything, our parents start to get smart again. At about age forty, we think they're just about perfect, and the older we get the smarter our parents will get.

I want to share with you an anonymous article called "The Meanest Mother." "Surely mine was the meanest mother in the world. While other kids ate candy for breakfast I had to have stuff like oatmeal, cereal, milk, eggs and toast. While others were enjoying cokes and candy for lunch, I had to eat a sandwich and fruit. I was not alone in suffering. My sister and two brothers had the same cruel mother that I had. She insisted on knowing where we were all the time. She had to know who our friends were and what we were doing, and if we said we'd be home in an hour that meant an hour or less, not more. When we were young and disobeyed, this tyrannical mother of ours would strike us with a switch. Imagine! And now you begin to see how really mean she was, but even this physical brutality was not the worse. We had to be in bed early and get up early. We never got to sleep till noon like our friends. While they slept we worked. My mother broke every child labor law there is. We were not yet sixteen when we had to wash dishes, make beds, help cook and all sorts of cruel things. Surely that meanest mother must have laid awake nights thinking up mean things for us to do. She demanded that we tell the truth even if it hurt, and sometimes it hurt like everything. By the time we were teenagers life became increasingly unbearable. Our dates were not aloud to toot the horn and bring us running as other girls' dates did. My cruel mother embarrassed us by insisting that our dates come to the door and get us. And where some of our friends got to date when they were twelve, my cruel mother refused to let us date until we were fifteen, and then only for school functions. Finally we got away from our mother, and we could do as we pleased. But by then we were helplessly warped and twisted in our behavior. We grew up taking baths and tithing to the church, and we never learned not to do such things. None of us ever had the opportunity other young people have to wreck schoolhouses or burn flags or smoke pot. Each of us went to school and learned and went to work and earned. Each of us got married once and still is. We're in a rut, still going in the same direction in which my meanest mother in the world pushed us. We're still into bathing and learning and earning and giving and living and loving and telling the truth. Mine was the meanest mother in the world." We need more mean mothers--mothers who mean business for God.

And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus." Prayer and thanksgiving are the answer to your problems and the wonderful result is the peace that only God can bring. As we see in the lives of Job ,Peter, and John God also provides, as His great love drives Him to save, restore, and bless. The trials of life remind us of how truly dependent we are upon God and how finite our abilities and resources really are, so let us practice thankfulness in the good times and the bad and we will find ourselves living in the peace of God.
