A Message from Andrew Spires

LEAD PASTOR

Recently, a group of pastors and lay leaders took a vision trip to the state of Vermont. The purpose of this trip was to develop a future partnership between the Baptist Churches of New England and the **Russell Baptist Association. We were hosted** by Russ Rathier, the state of Vermont's Associational missionary. He seemed to be the prototypical New Englander with a thick Vermonter accent, though I'm sure our Southern accents were not lost on him either. Vermont is the sixth smallest state by land mass with only 9,000+ square miles. It is the second least populated state with only slightly more people than the state of Wyoming. We traveled from one corner of that small state to the other. We saw farms, fields, maple trees, and quaint small towns. Many of these towns only had one to two thousand residents and were nestled into the shadow of mountainous terrain. The state was beautiful with many streams, rivers, hills, mountains, and the overall glory of God's creation. In each small town, in the town square, stood an old church, some were still open and others were closed. We heard many of the churches that were still open were no longer preaching the true Gospel but some form of universalism.

We also visited many small Baptist churches, all with congregations that were less than one hundred in membership. Most churches are in the range of fifteen to thirty active members. We were told that a church of one hundred would be considered a megachurch in their region. This meant many, if not most pastors are bi-vocational holding multiple jobs to make ends meet in an area of the country where there's a greater cost of living. More concerning than numbers was a quote from the missionary; "We are at least three generations removed from families being in church!" He explained that not only were the grandkids unchurched, but their parents were unchurched, and even their grandparents had never darkened the church's door. He shared a story where a child asked a local pastor why they always placed a "t" on the tops of their buildings. The child was so unchurched that he was unaware of what the cross stood for. Could you imagine that America could ever get to this point? Think about that in our context in the South. Here, we observe many churches with aging membership rolls. Many churches with lower attendance numbers in weekly worship. Many with fewer conversions, and fewer baptisms. Many with shrinking budgets and a weakened impact for the sake of the Gospel. We bemoan the station of the Southern church which for generations was filled with so many "Cultural Christians" that it was hard to tell if the church we observed was really filled with the redeemed. Those days gave us false hope that most were on the right path. Yet today, for the most part, those who want to be the Church are there, as the tide turns against truly following Christ all across our country.

Yet, there is hope! In Vermont, we saw these small congregations filled with hearty believers who had not given up on their towns or their state. The remnant God has preserved was serving and serving their communities well. We saw their outreach programs as Christians across several denominations had banded together to meet the physical needs of a community that was ravaged by a flood last year. We saw a homeless outreach that grew into a church plant where people worshiped in a beautiful old church and a vibrant congregation was housed. continued... We visited a Christian college that was planted in one of the darkest and most liberal areas of our country which has been effective in raising a new generation of biblically sound preachers and teachers that will stem the tide of Gospel-ignorance. Later this summer, some of our folks here at Lakewood will join others from around our community to go and work on student housing for the college with our Builders for Christ team. God is certainly at work. God's people are at work. Let us be a people who pray for them and who go to serve alongside the Vermonters as they strive for the Kingdom's sake. May we also grow in our concern and readiness for this area of the country. May we all be ready to stand against what is surely coming. May God give us a burden for the lost here, there, and everywhere. God bless,

Graduation Sunday


When: Sunday, May 19th @ 10:30am.

A Message from David Stephens

CHILDREN'S PASTOR

I have three boys 16, 14, and now 12. Wow, how time flies. I can remember when they were still in diapers. As my wife and I work to keep God in the center of our home and in the parenting of our boys, it's a difficult task to navigate. On one hand you have the demasculinization of men, and all men are shown as being weak. While on the other hand you have what seems to be the opposite, a very strong man masculinity. I own and shoot guns. I wish I had more opportunity to become a better outdoorsman. I regularly hit the gym and lift weights. I attempt to fix stuff, and usually with a few YouTube videos, I can. If I can get to the part on my old truck, I'll definitely change it out myself. I attempt to engage my boys as often as possible in these activities. On the other side of this dynamic, the media tells of a male patriarchy system that needs to be totally taken down. Men are either not existent in the story line, or they are shown as weak, unintelligent and feminine. So what do we do? We have these opposite forces that are impacting the world our boys are growing up in. We have to go back to the very beginning. Prior to sin entering the world God gave Adam a job. I believe we are made to be keepers of the garden. We have this realm of influence we are required to watch over, protect, and cultivate. As a keeper of the garden we protect it from threats. As a keeper of the garden there are species that will not survive, but with you around protecting them they will bloom and thrive. This is our role. When we are at our best, we use whatever strength, ability, gifting, talents, to be keepers of the garden. When we do this well, everybody around us flourishes. For those who are married; I believe I'm at my best when my wife feels secure. This is when she is the most attracted to me. This is masculine. As a keeper of the garden you can help people around you feel secure with your words and

with whatever ability or resources you have at your disposal. Just don't bring insecurity. You can have the masculine things, but if you bring insecurity your wife will resent those things. Our job is to be keepers of the garden protecting the vulnerable. We must not betray our role. Men in their physical prime are to be protectors of people, not threatening to people. How backwards is our world? We need to be teaching our boys to be keepers of the garden, and they must be able to use their strength to bring peace, security, and encouragement to all who are around them. They need to be taught to be protectors of the vulnerable. This heart in practice will look very different than what culture presents. We must work to teach our boys what is means to be a Godly man. A man seeking after the heart of God, learning how to be a protector/ keeper of the garden is very masculine and very attractive.
