A Message from Andrew Spires

Recently, two of our church members and I were privileged to travel to the nation of Togo, West Africa for a missions vision trip. A vision trip is akin to an advanced scouting team that goes to assess the conditions and needs on the ground to see how a partnership may or may not materialize in the future. Our connection to Togo is through a missionary couple named James and Jenna Roberts whom we first met when they were just young adults, both serving at Snowbird in North Carolina. At that time, these two weren't even dating, but both James and Jenna served as counselors to some of our groups at Snowbird over the years. Soon God led them together as husband and wife and after a while, called them to serve overseas in Togo. They currently have one son and a daughter on the way. It has been great to watch them grow up, grow in Christ, grow together as a couple, and respond to God's call to become full-time missionaries. It was also great to see them serving together on the mission field. We even sat in on a language course as James and Jenna are both learning French to be able to fully communicate with the Togolese people.

While it took nearly 24 hours of travel time to get to Togo, it was still one of the most unique mission experiences of my life. The country was small yet full of people. The weather was tropical, warm, and humid, as it is near the equator. Like many of the places we go, the people are desperately poor and seemingly without hope. While the Gospel has begun to make some inroads and we viewed several churches that had been planted, much of the country remains steeped in idol worship. In every single town and village we entered there was some form of an idol, a literal effigy representative of their god. Offerings were placed on or near these idols. Most of the time it was some form of animal sacrifice, food offering, or incense that was burned. The Voodoo religion originally found its roots in this area and later came to the Caribbean and Jamaica due to the evil of slavery. Voodoo is a fear-based religion where you must constantly appease the gods or they will punish and harm you. It was shocking to see how pervasive idolatry was in this country and you could almost feel the fear in many people's hearts.

It reminded me of countless scriptures we read about idol worship in the Old Testament and how even the nation of Israel struggled constantly to remove idolatry from their practice of worshipping the one true God. I was reminded of how quickly the nation of Israel turned to idolatry and the worship of the golden calf right after God miraculously delivered them from captivity in Egypt. Deuteronomy 32:16-18 gives us even more clarity on what idolatry really is when it says; "He (Israel) abandoned the God who made him and rejected the Rock his Savior. They made Him jealous with their foreign gods and angered Him with their detestable idols. They sacrificed to demons which are not God-gods they had not known, gods that recently appeared, gods your fathers did not fear. You deserted the Rock, who fathered you, you forgot the God who gave you birth." Did you understand what that verse is saying? When people sacrificed to idols it was actually demonic beings they were worshipping! This text clearly connects idolatry with demon worship. After all, let us not forget that Satan himself wanted Jesus to fall down and worship him during Christ's temptation, and if Satan wants to receive and steal worship from God, so do other demonic beings. It shouldn't surprise us that most ancient humans, across most cultures worshipped and embraced a multitude of false gods and demonic beings. It was

pervasive then but unfortunately, it is still pervasive now. Talk to many missionaries overseas today and they will often recount various occasions of supernatural demonic activity that would make your hair stand on end. They don't doubt that the enemy is real and demonic activity is just as alive today as it was in the past. Now, it may not surprise you that people in Africa are still steeped in physical and spiritual idolatry, but what about here in America? We may not have carved idols in our homes or towns but we have found many other things to worship such as the idols of money, success, knowledge, achievement, beauty, etc. Never forget, that anything we put before God is an idol and ultimately just as lifeless and worthless as a carved statue or stone.

We also just hosted our Belize missionary, Dr. Paul Whisnant, with International Servants. Dr. Paul shared a bit of his testimony in both services and challenged each of us to answer the missional call to be disciples who are making other disciples. We intentionally hosted Paul on the same day as our Annual Fall Festival so that we could hold a fundraiser for the Feed-a-Child program. It was an amazing day of in-reach and outreach, with so many people on campus. First, I want to thank each and every person who served and gave during our Fall

Festival, what a blessing your involvement and service were to the church and our community. Second, a special thanks to David Stephens and his Children's Ministry Leadership Team who did all the preparations and setup/cleanup to make this day a huge success. Finally, by God's grace and how He enabled you to give, Lakewood gave over \$13,000 to feed needy children in Belize. Add to that, another person, who is not a member of the church, and who was watching by livestream, dropped off another gift during the Fall Festival, bringing the overall total for the day to over \$18,000. Wow! All glory and praise to God! Dr. Paul came with the hopes of raising another \$5,000 to cover the October shortfall in the Feed-a-Child program and be able to feed and evangelize more kids. By God's grace, he left with nearly four times that amount. I look forward to hearing and sharing how God used your generosity to expand His Kingdom in the nation of Belize. I pray that each of us continues to reflect on how we can answer the missional call to be disciple-makers. I pray that when the Lord calls, we stand ready to answer! God bless. drew Iohn 3:30

A Message from David Stephens

CHILDREN'S PASTOR

It's the end of a tied football game. Your team has the ball, and you are yelling at the TV to put it in the end zone. In this moment, the clock determines the play. You have to trust the coach is going to call the right plays to get a touchdown. When we look at the world around us today, is this the setting we find ourselves in? Right now the current discipleship system has 7 out of 10 kids walking away from Jesus after graduation. We have the Gen X and Millennials, who are very skeptical of the church, in part do to the increase of public awareness of gross scandals within the church. It's been said what one generation tolerated the next generation embraces. This is a very haunting concept to digest. I ask myself routinely, what am I tolerating? How do we fight for the future of the next generation? We must teach Jesus as often as we can and deep-rooted repentance. We must teach a radical pursuit of God. God raised up a young person in King Josiah. In 2 Chronicles 34, what did Josiah do? He ripped sin out by the roots. He repaired and restored the worship center of the one true God, and it was costly. The culture is determined ultimately by something that is worshipped and then all the stuff that grows up around it. Are we building altars of worship to Jesus of the Bible at our center? Is the culture of our home all the things that grow out of the worship of Jesus and what he has done on our behalf? We all have work to do! What else did Josiah do? He uncovered the Word of God and when it was read aloud to him he tore his clothes in anguish and there was a great "returning" to the following of the commands of God. Our love for the word of God must be known in our walk as Christians in the secular world. Did it work, what Josiah did? The best evidence is in the

people that were discipled under Josiah's return to repentance. When the decree came out to pray only to the King, Daniel didn't say, "well, prayer is ultimately in the heart anyway". No! He opened his window and prayed publically to the one true God. Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego, were not alone in the fire. These men were raised up and discipled under Josiah's rule. We still talk about to this day in Sunday School. What Josiah did, definitely worked.

Wasn't our Fall Festival fantastic. I am truly thankful for all of the hard work that was put in by everybody involved. Please know, that your support for activities like this is not taken for granted. It really was a incredible thing to see all our people present and loving on all the new people visiting us from our community. God be Praised!
