It seems that I just wrote my September Connections last week and now it is October. Since I first arrived it seems as though my weeks feel more like days, and my months feel more like weeks, while my years feel more like months.

Time does fly when you're having fun. Fall is in the air and our staff meetings are all about Homecoming and the Holidays. Yes, we are talking about Christmas and this year is shaping up to be another month long celebration of music and singing. October sets the stage for God's plan to bring real change in the world all around us. The colors and cool mornings along with the early evening darkness all signal the reality that we have indeed come a long way in our trip around the Sun. The Earth has stayed its course like all of creation without ever asking once why or for how long. I have always loved October because this is a time to be outdoors enjoying God's creation. This is the time of year I love to be in the northern woods of Wisconsin with a trailer filled with well trained English Setters. For this is the home of the Ruffed Grouse and Woodcock. My fascination with Bird dogs has always been something more than an means to an end.

Something much deeper and spiritual as I see in them the drive and passion of knowing their purpose and place in God's creation. The English Setter is actually a pointing dog and they point birds from the first few weeks of life until they die. They live to catch the scent of a bird as it has the power to literally freeze them in a trance beyond their comprehension, never asking why but merely spellbound by the knowledge that this moment is the very reason they exist. I have often picked up my dogs and moved them while on point, and as long as they have the scent they will not break from their point. How I wish I could have that single minded drive for nothing but the kingdom that my Setters had for birds. I once saw a poster that I like very much as it had this simple prayer at the bottom. "Lord please allow me to be half the man my dog thinks I am". My dog "Lucky" was big for a field trail Setter and he could run like the wind and he taught me what it means to be loval. If he knew what I wanted he did it. I remember his first trip to the grouse woods of Wisconsin like it were only yesterday. He was not prepared for the tactics of the Ruffed Grouse as he had been raised and trained on Bob White quail. Now quail are gentlemen and they hide and hold well when pointed by dogs but the Grouse is just as likely to dance in circles around a pointing dog trying to get him to move. The Grouse enjoy this game as they can fly like the wind and

will do so the first instant the dog moves. Lucky knew his purpose and just what I wanted him to do but he could not hold once the bird circled and he lost his scent. Soon he came along side with his tail hanging low, his joy and drive were missing because he could sense my disappointment in him. That day he taught me that his joy in the hunt was my joy and the pride I showed him when he did well. Then and there I prayed that I could find such joy in my Masters success. You see the birds were the reason we came there but they were never the reason we came back. No, it was the day long walks through the north woods to places where you could imagine that no one had ever been before you. To the places where the grouse would simply fly a few feet up a tree fascinated by the first person he had ever seen. It was the partnership between men and dogs to accomplish together what neither could do on their own. It was about getting out in creation far enough and long enough to escape time and one's schedule to learn from creation the important lessons about their creator. For God's invisible qualities, His eternal power and Divine nature can be clearly seen and understood in all He has made. (Romans 1:20) Perhaps that is what I really like so much about October. It is a time to stop and get outside in the beautiful weather, a time to look at creation in all its glory, a time to listen to what creation has to say about its creator.



Looking Unto Jesus Dr. Jerry Horner

I am writing this article from the beautiful city of Singapore, where the British military suffered what Winston Churchill called "the worst disaster and largest capitulation in British history" when the city fell to the Japanese on February 15, 1942. Singapore, often called "the Gibraltar of the East," was thought to be an impregnable island fortress, with huge guns emplaced in strategic locations along its coastline to fend off naval attacks. Most military authorities felt that it would be impossible for an enemy to conquer the island.

However, there was a major flaw in the plans that brought this feeling of security. The British, expecting an attack from the sea, had their big guns pointed in that direction. The Japanese, conscious that British defenses were focused on the sea, attacked from Singapore's back door, the Malay Peninsula. One and a half hours after the attack on Pearl Harbor, Japanese troops landed in the northern part of the peninsula, and swiftly moved toward Singapore. By February 8 they were fighting their way into the city and a massacre began.

Like the defenders of Singapore, sometimes we experience the perils of looking the wrong way. The Bible tells us that we are always to be "looking unto Jesus, the author and finisher of our faith" (Heb. 12:2). This is the only time in the New Testament that the word "looking unto" is found. It literally means "looking away from and looking unto." The word "unto" indicates motion toward an object with the purpose of reaching it. In other words, we are to look away from anything or anyone else and focus all our attention on Christ and zero in on Him.

The Bible often warns us of the dangers in getting our eyes off the mark and looking in the wrong direction. For example, there is the backward look. The one who puts his hand to the plough and looks back is not fit for the Kingdom of God (Luke 9:62). It was the backward look that caused Israel's failure to enter the promised land and to wander in the wilderness (Psalm 78:41). Lot's wife perished when she looked back (Gen. 19:26). Sometimes we dwell on the past so much that we never move forward. It's very difficult to drive forward when you're looking in the rear-view mirror. "Let your eyes look straight ahead and your eyelids look right before you" (Prov. 4:25).

The Bible tells us not to be "dismayed" (Isa. 41:10). That word literally means "to look around." God is telling us that we are not to focus on the circumstances surrounding us, but to look to Him. Peter took his eyes off Jesus and looked around, and "when he saw the wind" he sank. Ten of Israel's spies took their eyes off the Lord and looked around to see walled cities, giants, and all kinds of difficulties. Only two looked in the right direction.

Don't allow circumstances to hold your vision to the extent that you cannot see the faithfulness of the Lord to deliver you.

Paul spoke of those who are so near-sighted that they only see what is immediately before their eyes (2 Cor. 10:7). Some people have such a short range of vision that they their horizon is limited, and they have no comprehension or expectation of the possibilities that God may have in store. They look only at the present, not realizing that God "is able to do exceedingly abundantly above all that we ask or think" (Eph. 3:20).

The wrong direction for many people is the selfish look. The Bible admonishes, "Let each of you look out not only for his own interests, but also for the interests of others" (Phil. 2:4). The look that focuses on self will limit us and make us small and self-centered. In contrast, looking unto Christ will lead a person to "esteem others better than himself" (Phil. 2:3).

Look in the right direction, and that's unto Jesus.

Turn your eyes upon Jesus,

Look full in His wonderful face, And the things of earth will grown strangely dim, In the light of His glory and grace.

The student and singles ministries will attempt a new service project during the month of October — one that will hopefully be of benefit to our L.O.A.F. food closet, called "No Tricks, Just Treating Others Well". During the last week of October we will strategically pass out paper shopping bags, generously donated by Publix, to local neighborhoods with a note attached explaining our LOAF ministry and the service it provides to the community each Thursday. We are asking each home to donate at least three canned goods or staple boxed foods to fill our pantry before the holiday seasons of Thanksgiving and Christmas, which are two of our highest volume months. Our LOAF ministry goes out of its way each Thursday, but especially during the holidays, to meet needs and provide extra food to those less fortunate. We will pass these bags out on Sunday night October 25th and then return on Wednesday night October 28th to pick them up. Our goal is to pass out at least 400 bags and our hope is that this will yield around 1,200 canned goods and boxed foods. If you'd like to be involved, we can use some help with transportation, if you are willing to help drive
