Sermon Series: Romans: Gospel Partnership Sermon Text: Romans 6:6-11 (ESV) Sermon Title: Ultimate Liberation

<sup>6</sup> We know that our old self was crucified with him in order that the body of sin might be brought to nothing, so that we would no longer be enslaved to sin. <sup>7</sup> For one who has died has been set free from sin. <sup>8</sup> Now if we have died with Christ, we believe that we will also live with him. <sup>9</sup> We know that Christ, being raised from the dead, will never die again; death no longer has dominion over him. <sup>10</sup> For the death he died he died to sin, once for all, but the life he lives he lives to God. <sup>11</sup> So you also must consider yourselves dead to sin and alive to God in Christ Jesus.

In Romans 6-8 Paul is retelling the story of the exodus where God heard the cries of his people and delivered them from bondage in Egypt. The gospel is a new exodus, only instead of being a political liberation it is the ultimate liberation, freedom from sin, corruption, and death. The Christian is truly free, being united to Jesus Christ in his death and resurrection.

So, Paul, here in vv.6-11 is elaborating on this theme, exploring how we can live in light of our ultimate liberation. In this passage Paul does so in three ways:

- I. There Is Something to Know (vv.6-7)
- II. There Is Something to Believe (vv.8-10)
- III. There Is Something to Consider (v.11)

May we be gripped by who we really are in Christ, and may this govern how we live in the world. In Christ, we truly are people who have died to the realm of sin, who are no longer under its ruling power, and who are alive to God in Him.

## Reflection
