Sermon Text: Romans 7:1-6 (ESV) Sermon Title: The New Way of the Spirit

7 Or do you not know, brothers—for I am speaking to those who know the law—that the law is binding on a person only as long as he lives? For a married woman is bound by law to her husband while he lives, but if her husband dies she is released from the law of marriage. Accordingly, she will be called an adulteress if she lives with another man while her husband is alive. But if her husband dies, she is free from that law, and if she marries another man she is not an adulteress.

⁴ Likewise, my brothers, you also have died to the law through the body of Christ, so that you may belong to another, to him who has been raised from the dead, in order that we may bear fruit for God. ⁵ For while we were living in the flesh, our sinful passions, aroused by the law, were at work in our members to bear fruit for death. ⁶ But now we are released from the law, having died to that which held us captive, so that we serve in the new way of the Spirit and not in the old way of the written code.

The life-shaping story for the people of God in the Old Testament was the exodus. The story of how Israel was liberated from bondage in Egypt, their bondage to slavery, their deliverance from one realm to another. Romans 6 tells the story of a new and greater exodus, a gospel exodus, whereas the people of God are delivered from the realm of sin to the realm of grace.

Now, what comes next in the story of the exodus? The people of God are brought to Mount Sinai where they receive the law, making them a privileged nation, different from every other nation, a sign that they belong to God. Paul is alluding to this foundational story and applying to the

Christians at Rome. Which means when we come to chapter 7, we are faced with the question, what about the law?

Paul is writing to a people, who through their union with Christ, have left behind the land of slavery, and have entered upon a new freedom. Paul is giving the church at Rome a new perspective on the place of the law, and the believer's relationship to the law.

What do we learn in Romans 7:1-6 about the place of the law? How does the Holy Spirit teach us about our relationship to the law?
