Sermon Series: Romans: Gospel Partnership Sermon Text: Romans 8:1-4 (ESV) Sermon Title: The Gift of Freedom

There is therefore now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus. ² For the law of the Spirit of life has set you free in Christ Jesus from the law of sin and death. ³ For God has done what the law, weakened by the flesh, could not do. By sending his own Son in the likeness of sinful flesh and for sin, he condemned sin in the flesh, ⁴ in order that the righteous requirement of the law might be fulfilled in us, who walk not according to the flesh but according to the Spirit.

Romans 8 is probably one of the most profound chapters in all of the Bible. It is like climbing Mount Everest. For the next several weeks, we will be making this climb as the apostle Paul lays out for us his argument concerning how the Christian can experience God. He is concerned that we not simply believe in God as an abstraction, but that we actually experience Him and His presence. Jesus worded it that we actually learn to abide in Him.

And the key to experiencing God is the Holy Spirit. Romans 8 is all about the Holy Spirit. Throughout this chapter Paul, will unfold how the Holy Spirit indwells the believer and unites the believer to God. Paul spends the chapter building up to a crescendo which he reaches in vv.38-39, where he assures the follower of Jesus that nothing in all the universe can separate him or her from the love of God. Hopefully, you will be able to be with us as we climb the mountain and explore the riches of what it looks like to actually experience God.

This morning, we begin with the first four verses of Romans 8, beginning with the powerful promise "There is therefore now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus." Imagine if we understood and lived on the basis of this promise. We will learn in these opening verses:

- I. The Assurance of a Reality
- II. Based on a Reason
- III. Designed for a Purpose

Reflection

"Human comparison is a poison we drink for all the wrong reasons, and it always kills. It kills relationships. It kills friendships. It kills memories. And it kills us from the inside out. The secret to enjoying God's fatherhood is not in pretending that we deserve it, which always leads to unhealthy, ego-driven self-loathing, but instead to remember who we are and how deeply God loves us in Jesus. The Father's love for Jesus means that I don't have to pretend that I'm worthy. I am loved because of Jesus" (Mike Khandjian, *A Sometimes Stumbling Life*).
