Sermon Series: Romans: Gospel Partnership Sermon Text: Romans 8:31-39 (ESV) Sermon Title: Ultimate Assurance

³¹ What then shall we say to these things? If God is for us, who can be against us? ³² He who did not spare his own Son but gave him up for us all, how will he not also with him graciously give us all things? ³³ Who shall bring any charge against God's elect? It is God who justifies. ³⁴ Who is to condemn? Christ Jesus is the one who died—more than that, who was raised—who is at the right hand of God, who indeed is interceding for us. ³⁵ Who shall separate us from the love of Christ? Shall tribulation, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or danger, or sword? ³⁶ As it is written,

"For your sake we are being killed all the day long; we are regarded as sheep to be slaughtered."

³⁷ No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us. ³⁸ For I am sure that neither death nor life, nor angels nor rulers, nor things present nor things to come, nor powers, ³⁹ nor height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.

We have made it to the summit. Take in the breathtaking, majestic view. Romans 8:31-39 and the end of this incredible, profoundly theological chapter. As we have been saying Romans 8 is all about experiencing God, and the Holy Spirit as the key to experiencing God. The Holy Spirit leads us to an assurance where we can know that our ultimate salvation is secure, "That he who began a good work in you will bring it to completion at the day of Jesus Christ" (Phil. 1:6).

Romans 8 takes us on this journey, and here in this passage this morning we will be exploring how we can be ultimately secure. Paul wants the Romans (and us) to know that in an incredibly insecure world our salvation is secure.
