A Missional Church

"And I heard the voice of the Lord saying, 'Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?' Then I said, 'Here I am! Send me'." (Isaiah 6:8)

Last month we began looking at what it means to be a missional church. This is a focus for us as we explore what it means to be obedient, in this time and place, to the commission that Jesus gave to go and make disciples of all nations. Our vision needs to be rooted in obedient surrender to not only the Lord's grace in our lives but also in His purpose for us.

So, what is a missional church? Alan Hirsch, a leading thinker in missions today, defines a missional church as follows: "A working definition of missional church is that it is a community of God's people that defines itself, and organizes its life around, its real purpose of being an agent of God's mission to the world. In other words, the Church's true and authentic organizing principle is mission. When the church is in mission, it is the true Church. The Church itself is not only a product of that mission but is obligated and destined to extend it by whatever means possible. The mission of God flows directly through every believer and every

community of faith that adheres to Jesus. To obstruct this is to block God's purposes in and through his people."

I love that statement "The mission of God flows directly through every believer and every community of faith that adheres to Jesus." Isaiah finally got that when he heard the calling of God asking, "Whom shall I send and who will go for us?" And Isaiah answered, "Here am I, send me." Isaiah understood that the mission of God was to flow directly through him.

Do we understand that? Do we get it? God wants His mission of renewing Greensboro and Eatonton and the Lake Oconee area through us, His people. He wants to heal relationships, restore marriages and families, and bring people to Himself. He wants to forgive them and reconcile them to Himself through us, His people. We exist as a sent people, "Organizing our life around our real purpose of being an agent of God's mission to the world."

What does this mean practically for us, as individuals and as a church? First, we need to ask ourselves are we living gospel-centered lives? Isaiah only became "missional" after he experienced the power of the gospel in his life. It was only after he was confronted with the glory of God, his own and his people's sinfulness, and the wonder of God's restoring grace and forgiveness, that he was liberated to hear the call of God and respond. Apart from the gospel, we will always be self-centered and self-absorbed. Apart from the gospel constantly renewing us, we will only be concerned with building bigger ministries, bigger churches, bigger reputations, but not necessarily building the kingdom of God.

Second, we need to evaluate everything we do in terms of our real purpose of being an agent of God's mission to the world. That means all our teaching, all our fellowship, and all our ministries must be done with at least an eye towards their missional purpose. Mission is not simply to be a department of our ministry, but our ministry is to be understood from a missional perspective. In other words, this requires a particular way of thinking about everything we do. It affects the questions we ask, the decisions we make, and how we do what we do. In a short article such as this, there is no way to answer every question or to be completely comprehensive in handling our subject matter. But hopefully, this will challenge some of our thinking and encourage us to be, both as individuals and as a church, all we can be for the glory of God. Let us have our lives count as we seek to serve our magnificent Savior.

Women's Ministry





Sheds of Hope

Three of the sheds recently built by the LOPC Sheds of HOPE team were sent to Sevierville, TN, in the aftermath of a wildfire outbreak that burned nearly 2,500 acres and incinerated 219 homes. This is the area just west of Dollywood, a popular theme park, and short distance from the Great Smoky Mountain National Park, the nation's most visited national park with more than 14 million visitors each year. Further to the west in Seymour, another fire consumed another 700 acres and burned more structures.
