Learning to Lament

Why, O LORD, do you stand far away? Why do you hide yourself in times of trouble? (Psalm 10:1)

How long, O LORD? Will you forget me forever? How long will you hide your face from me? How long must I take counsel in my soul and have sorrow in my heart all the day? How long shall my enemy be exalted over me? (Psalm 13:1-2)

Now, be honest. Have you ever felt this way? At times, we should feel this way. If you look at the world honestly, and think Christianly about the world, I will say you should. These are, after all, inspired Scriptures. God has chosen to put them there for a reason. Thus, we ignore them at our peril.

I have been thinking about writing a pastoral letter to you after the horrible attack upon Israel by the terrorist organization Hamas and the atrocities that have been brought to our attention. The attack was evil, and a terrible injustice has been committed. After prayer and reflection, I thought it best just to write up this short piece highlighting just one aspect of a Christian's response to events in the world.

I am not qualified to speak on all the issues related to the history of the struggles in the middle east. Nor do I believe that these current events have significance prophetically. The issues of prophecy and the Israel of the Bible are deeply important, and we will be taking up some of these in connection with a Sunday School class that Mike Palombo will be leading on December 3. Providentially, this topic goes hand-in-hand with what our adult class is currently studying in *God's Big Picture*, and, thus, we will be addressing it. I encourage you to mark your calendars and attend that class on December 3rd.

For now, I simply want to highlight one aspect of a Christian's response, and that is the topic of lament. Lament is extremely important, and I am afraid too often neglected in our discipleship. One of the reasons I believe we avoid lament is that it is uncomfortable. We would rather focus on the positive, be optimistic, be hopeful. But when we bypass lament, I am afraid we can miss the true power of hope. We are to cultivate hope in our lives, but we need to cultivate a true hope, and not a panacea or a false power of positive thinking. And in this way, lament is a discipline we need to practice.

See, it is too easy for us to miss God's Big Picture. We need to remember that we were created for God's kingdom. We were built to live under God's rule and reign and to experience perfect union, communion, love, purpose, and security. These are all found only in God's reign or kingdom. This is another way of saying that we were created to live in Eden. Since the Fall and our first parents' expulsion from the Garden, we all long and work feverishly to get back into the Garden. But we still live outside Eden, outside the experience of shalom, and although with the first advent of Jesus the kingdom has been inaugurated and is present among us, it is certainly not yet complete or consummated. That is why theologians say that we live in the tension of the "Already and Not Yet." And practically, this is why Jesus taught us to pray, and we pray every Lord's Day in the liturgy, "Thy kingdom come..."

So, what is my pastoral advice to you? Please do not bypass lament. Feel the pain of waiting for the consummation of the kingdom. Feel the longing for Jesus' triumphant return when He will put all things to rights. Resist the urge to try to connect all the dots to have some sort of certainty and security. Pray with King David, "How long, O LORD?" And realize that although the world is broken and can be very ugly, that the gospel is true, Jesus has been raised from the dead, is ascended, and ruling from heaven, and will return one day to put everything to rights. The more we are realistic about the nature of this world, the more that hope explodes in our hearts and lives.

So, maybe the most practical thing I can ask you to consider is to take a break from the news (I know we need to be aware of what is going on, but we need to be on guard against obsession), take out your Bible and maybe even a journal, write out some of your own prayers of lament, feel the weight of the world's darkness and let it drive you to a powerful hope that cries out to the Lord, Thy Kingdom Come!

Inquirers' Class




Friday, November 17 (6 - 9 pm)


Women's Ministry

Thursday, Nov 16 @ 1pm




