It would also give us freedom to take on new missionaries, RUF workers, and church planters.

HAPPY HEARTS



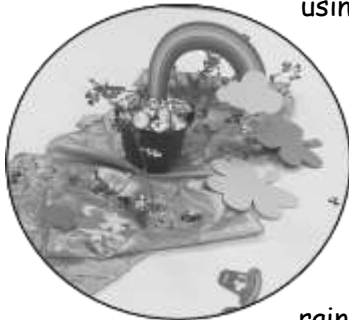

His mom has a degree in theology and has worked as a Chaplain for a women's prison. He admitted not all were success stories, some were, and in some cases they just prayed God would grow the seeds they had planted in the prisoners' lives. They were cute telling the story of their romance. Each had their own twist to the details involved. But that is very normal. At any rate, it seems within four weeks he was pretty sure he had found the right girl and all he had to do was convince her to wait for him. He was leaving to go to new locations with the USAF. That too is normal. The couple and their children have lived in many different places and traveled a large portion of the world. He has been deployed twice. Chris is a T-6 Pilot Instructor at the Columbus Air Force Base. All of us appreciate Chris and his family having served in our military and helping to keep our country safe. We are hoping they have planted their feet in our town and especially at Main Street Presbyterian. Chris was involved in a PCA church before coming to Columbus, so they began their search for a church home by visiting PCA congregations. They actually began in Starkville at Grace Presbyterian

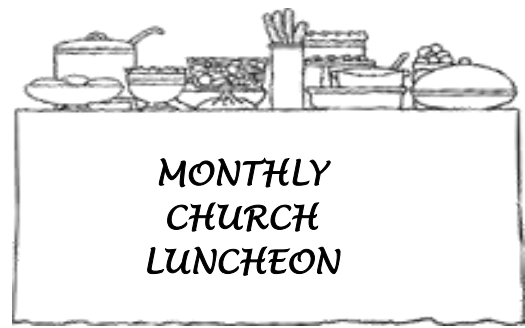
The last meeting for this semester will be May 3rd.

Faith Promise Pledge:

Where Will It Come From?

A devotional by Paul Kooistra

Before we ask where money for a faith pledge will come from, we need to consider what a faith pledge is. It is not first and foremost faith in what God will give me, but **it is faith that God will enable me to give**. It is more important that you pray for a giving heart than that you pray for added income. Giving is a gift of the Holy Spirit (Romans 12:8), and experience teaches us that the gift of giving is an uncommon gift.

Paul challenges the Corinthians, *just as you excel in everything— in faith, in speech, in knowledge, in complete earnestness and in your love for us—see that you also excel in this grace of giving* (II Corinthians 8:7). Increased giving starts, not with increased income, but with the grace of God enlarging our hearts with the joy of giving.

Some seem to argue that the money given in a faith promise pledge commitment can be expected from some unusual and unexpected source. God can provide for us any way He chooses, and often He delights in reminding us of that fact in dramatic ways.

Recently I met an energetic young couple who had gone to the mission field. As they prayed for funds, God began to provide, and eventually all they lacked was 700 dollars. One day a beautiful cockatoo landed in their backyard.

Amazed, they caged it and advertised for the owner. Receiving no response, they sold it to a pet store for exactly 700 dollars. *The last money we needed fell out of the sky!* they exclaimed, *literally*. Some might consider them *lucky*. Not so. God may astound some of us as we pray for

an increased gift of giving, but we should never sit back and enjoy the windfall.

Others have enjoyed generating creative sources of income. One man made an investment and dedicated all the proceeds to his faith promise. A woman with a special recipe made and sold Vidalia onion relish. A housewife did word processing, while some teenagers engaged in extra lawn work and babysitting. Possibly God will provide a second job for a few hours a week or an idea for making and marketing crafts or baked goods. We can ask the Creator for a little sanctified creativity. The results may be amazing.

No doubt, the greatest source of money for *faith promise* comes from what may be called *lifestyle giving*. Such giving is rooted in a resolution to make our stewardship a major priority in our lives. Lifestyle giving begins with better management of our finances. Think how much you might save if you put the brakes on impulse spending. Even shopping for groceries with a list and sticking to the list can save money for giving. Shopping at sales, watching the newspaper for coupons, or finding low-budget menus all can become adventures in depending on God. I know a family who was able to give several hundred dollars by halving the amount spent on Christmas presents one year.

Lifestyle giving can also grow out of living more simply. Taking a less expensive vacation, driving an older car, or wearing our clothes for several seasons can also be the source of substantial funds for giving. We can pray and ask God to show us things we can do without. Proverbs 8:12 in the old King James translation says, *I, wisdom, dwell with prudence and find out knowledge of witty inventions*. Prudence is not simply an old fashioned girl's name. It is a virtue of thrift and simplicity that will honor our

Father and serve us well. God will use it to lead us to new insights in wise and joyful living.

Maybe the most challenging aspect of lifestyle giving involves what we are willing to give up. The Macedonians had graduated to the level of sacrificial giving. This kind of giving takes a great deal of faith and a great deal of prayer.

Finally, there is giving from abundance. God blesses His people. The people of Israel sang, *Then the land will yield its harvest, and God, our God will bless us* (Psalm 67:6). Have you not experienced this? God allows us to save money, earn interest, and succeed in our occupations, all so we can give. As our wealth grows, our giving ought to grow faster.

Prayer:

***Father,
You are the source of all that I have. As I consider my faith promise, I ask first, that you provide me with a giving heart. Begin to show me how much you want me to give and also where you want me to give from. Make me willing to work harder, to live more simply, and even to sacrifice. Amen.***

Questions:

1. How have you decided what to give in the past?
2. How would you like to change your giving priorities in the future?
3. How can you increase your giving through faith promise?

1,000+ Families in Kasiya Malawi Receive Maize from ABC

When we arrived in Kasiya - some 70 km from the ABC campus in Lilongwe — there were well over 1,200 people sitting on the ground waiting for us — probably closer to 1,500 if you counted all the babies tied to their mother's backs! When I saw the size of the crowd I, too, was a bit concerned that we wouldn't be able to help everyone.



The pastor and the local school Principal — Often Gadabu, an ABC graduate (Class of 2002) — explained how bad things had become in Kasiya. The severe drought had delayed rains for months; most people ran out of maize weeks ago, and were forced to pick, cook and eat green leaves from unripened pumpkins and bean stalks. No meat, no maize, and not even enough money to buy salt to cook with the greens.

All of us from ABC — including our Vice Chancellor, Dr. Madimbo, and my son-in-law Brandon Cozzolino — had heard stories about how unruly the crowds had become at other maize distribution points, so we were a bit worried — I even brought two police officer buddies of mine in the van with me in case things went sideways — but the people in Kasiya could not have been more gracious, grateful and cooperative. They queued up in three long lines leading to the three large

trucks piled high with bags of maize — and then patiently waited their turn. It was the calmest and most orderly happening I have ever seen in my 27 years in Malawi.



I was surprised at how elderly many of the people were — very old — which meant they were completely unable to haul off the 100 lb. bags of maize on their head like the younger women did — with a baby strapped to their back! — so we would find a couple young men to carry the sack to a tree where the old people would redistribute the maize into smaller, more manageable-sized bags.

There was one very old gentlemen leaning on a cane near the big lorries, staring at all the activity, but he was not in line, so I told him that if he would stand in line he would be given a bag. Without looking away from the stacks of maize on the big trucks he said, “I’m not in line because I do not have a ticket ... but I am hungry.” Yes, we had extra bags, so we carried one over and placed it next to him. He was so happy — he couldn't budge the 100 lb. sack — but was tremendously grateful!



The Pastor and Principal had handed out 990 tickets early in the week — keeping 10 bags of maize in case extra people showed up — but after all 990 people had collected their maize there were 30 bags left over ... BUT 150 people still in line! So our ABC staff gathered the remaining people into groups of 5, and gave each group a bag to divide. They were so thankful. Many of them who had come without a ticket brought a small bowl, and had been begging earlier, “Can we just have enough corn to cook a meal tonight.”

So they were completely thrilled when they were able to take home enough maize to feed their family for a week!

We praise the Lord for your gifts that made it possible to help these warm and wonderful people in Kasiya. You cannot imagine how happy and grateful they were. Those of us here in Malawi feel so blessed to have been witness to your generosity. Thank you for listening to the suffering of these good and humble people.

I also want to say a big thank you to our African Bible College Vice Chancellor, Dr. Maggie Madimbo. Like Esther whom God placed in the king's palace at just the right time to help her people, God has surely placed Dr. Madimbo here at ABC at this time in order to respond to the needs of these people. And thank you to our ABC faculty who were brave enough to get involved — and work diligently with our graduates to access, transport and distribute the maize. Trust me, logistics in Africa is never easy. In fact one of our graduates — Macronix — had to go out to Kasiya and sleep with the trucks the night before the distribution to make all the maize was all still there in the morning!

Churches and people often want to help in a crisis like this, but don't know how, or with whom. ABC, its staff, and its graduates are “sitting on GO” in Malawi, Uganda, and Liberia, ready to help when there is a need. Thank you for partnering with us in this effort.

May God bless you just as you have been a blessing to my people in Malawi.

This year begins the seventh year of RCH's presence in Cameroon, and as I reflect on that, I am overwhelmed by what God has done in the lives of so many people in Cameroon and the United States. What began in one small house and spread to the front porch of another house in two villages is now housed in two concrete learning centers equipped with full kitchens, running water, and toilets. What began with three volunteers and 23 children now has 15 volunteers and cares for more than 90 orphans and abandoned children. I thank God for allowing all of us to be a small part of what He is doing to change lives there and here.

I have been fortunate to make several trips to Cameroon. All of them have enriched my life, strengthened my commitment to RCH, opened my eyes to additional opportunities to spread the Gospel, and continue to demonstrate how blessed those of us who live in the United States are. George Mbutwe never fails to thank us for our visits and to comment on how they are so encouraged and strengthened by them, when it is really the opposite. To see the living conditions, the struggles for basic needs, and all the other hardships in everyday life that they face, yet they continue to smile, give thanks to all RCH supporters, and praise God for all things is very, very humbling.

It makes some, no all, of my complaints pale in comparison and encourages and strengthens me in my very "comfortable" daily life.
