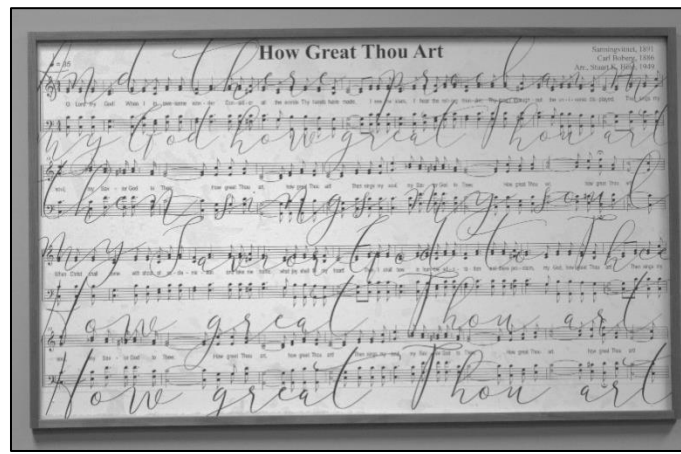
“I Believe”

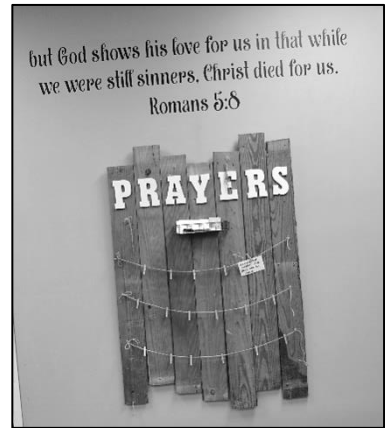
Creed comes from the Latin “credo” which means “I believe”. It is a statement of faith universally agreed upon by orthodox Christians. The Nicene Creed was formulated in 325 AD by a gathering of 318 bishops. These men were responding to heretical teaching about the identity and nature of Jesus Christ. The creed answers one of the most fundamental questions of the Christian faith. A question Jesus himself asked his disciples in Matthew 16:13, “Who do people say that the Son of Man is?”

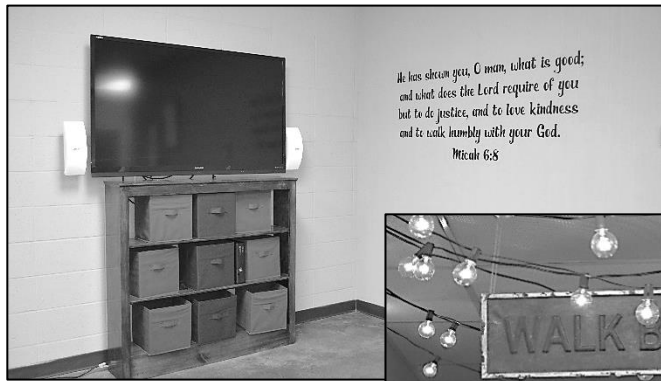
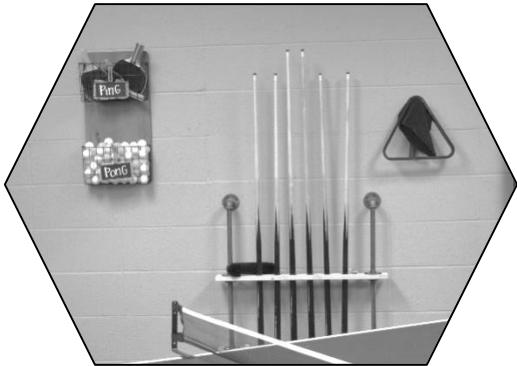

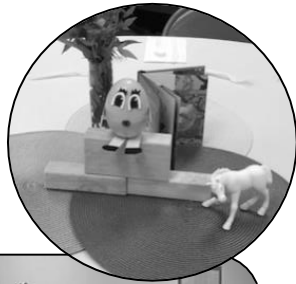

Friends of MMI,

We trust everyone has had a blessed Summer. We realize this is a busy time of year as school starts. We have been incredibly blessed in our MMI ministries this Summer. This is the change of station time of year and every one of our churches has seen fresh faces come and familiar faces move on. As God has blessed us richly by giving us more than we can ask or imagine, we need to continually thank Him for the work He is doing around the world. As you know, MMI is a work of the Southeast Alabama Presbytery of the PCA. But we are getting more partners who are working with expanding this ministry—and other Presbyteries are getting on board. We thank all of you.

If you or your church want to make an immediate impact, we are in the throes of raising funds for Matt Stanghelle (see below) to go to Norway. There is a small NATO installation in Stavanger and a community with a lot of oil industry workers and bi-lingual Norwegians. This would be the First Presbyterian Church of Norway (both by name and work)!

This update will focus on our European works—in a month or so I'll update you on our works in the Pacific and inside the US works.

From Pastor Toby Dubose--Trinity Reformed Church of Landstuhl---

26 August we will install 4 new deacons and 1 new RE (totals = 5 deacons, 4 RE's, 1 TE).

The week of 31 July, we started a new officer training class for 2 RE's and 1 deacon.

We have 3 men who I would like to have licensed to preach by the presbytery. Two are RE's and one is a deacon. 2 of the men have been taking classes toward MDiv's at RTS and the other has been an RE for almost 2 years at Trinity and has filled the pulpit for me a few times.

From Pastor Steve Walton—Covenant Fellowship Church of Stuttgart—

We had 78 in attendance at morning worship on 05 August, and not everyone was there. (The facility where they meet holds just over 80.)

We just purchased some translation equipment and plan to use it beginning 19 August. We have a young man in the congregation, Sven, who is eager to do simultaneous translation of the sermons, and with the new equipment, we will be able to provide translation into German for up to 17 people via wireless headsets.

From Pastor Phil Gelston—Christ Church of Wiesbaden—

Please pray for God to raise up elders and deacons to assist in leading our church. Also, we need teachers for the women's and children's ministries.

Though many people have moved away, we have some good news to share with you. **First, worship attendance has been consistent throughout the summer.** Normally attendance dips during the summer months but this year has been different. New people visit every Sunday and many return. **Second, we have a good number of remaining leaders who will be able to help recruit and train the new leaders God provides.**

Third, our pool of worship musicians has never been so great. There have been Sundays in the past where I was the only one present who could lead music instrumentally. Now we have a much deeper bench of musicians who play a variety of instruments. **Fourth, our German bible study group has been well attended** over the last few months. Launching this German language study was a big step for us and I am encouraged that it continues to thrive.

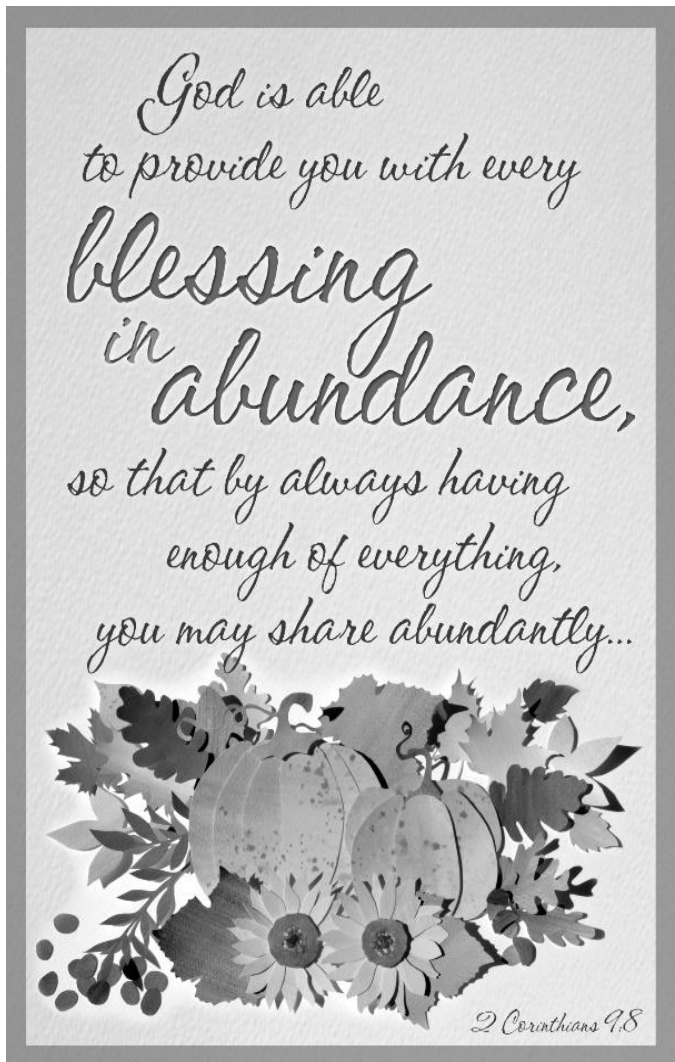
From Pastor John Orlando—New Life Church, Vicenza, Italy (Philadelphia Metro West Presbytery)

The congregation voted unanimously to become New Life Church of Vicenza, a mission church of the Presbyterian Church in America (PCA), with me as the pastor. The congregation has about 10 households (married, married with kids, and singles adults) consisting of about 15 adults and 8 children ranging in age from new born to 7 years old.

The Philadelphia Metro West Presbytery has voted to approve Pastor Orlando's change of call from Aviano to Vicenza and has agreed to take the church as a mission work of that Presbytery.

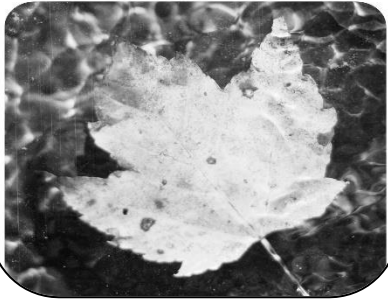
From Pastor Matt Stanghelle—Montgomery, Al—Raising funds for Stavanger, Norway

We've been gaining support from individuals and have a few solid commitments from churches. We also have about 10 churches that are strong potentials (I need to do follow up work here). We've sold most of our retirement and are living off the proceeds of the sale of our house. That's a little bit scary, but it's also really, really liberating! So, the summer has been very good.


