Missions Conference Keynote Speaker Rev. Ed Norton

Ed is a graduate of Mississippi State University and Reformed Theological Seminary. He served on the staff of First Presbyterian Church, Jackson, Mississippi. Additionally, he was the church planter for Highlands Presbyterian Church, Madison, Mississippi. Currently, Ed is an Associate Minister with Independent Presbyterian Church in Memphis, Tennessee. He has been on the staff of IPC Memphis for twenty-four years. His

responsibilities are local and global church planting, as well as ministering in one of the age group demographics of IPC Memphis.

He has trained and been certified as a "Gospel Coach" with Church Multiplication Ministries.

His extra-curricular activities are that he is the Founder and Coordinator of The United Kingdom Partnership (UKP). The UKP seeks to connect U.S.A. funding resources with church planting opportunities in the U.K. He will be sharing a presentation about the UKP during the conference. He also serves on the boards of Third Millennium Ministries and the Thirdmill Seminary.

One of the joys of his life was serving in the Mississippi Air National Guard for twenty-four years. He honorably discharged and retired as a Lieutenant Colonel.

A GOSPEL TREASURE

There is one of those "reality" shows on TV called "Gold Rush." If you haven't seen it, a group of people leave their homes, travel to the Alaskan wilderness and spend the summer season mining for gold. They work night and day, risking and spending millions of dollars, doing dangerous and often boring work, sifting through thousands of tons of dirt to discover just a few ounces of gold. Their equipment breaks, they get sick, they get hurt, they get tired and lonely. Often, they fight and argue over how to do the job or where to dig. Sometimes, they get discouraged and want to give up and go home. At the end of each show, the team gathers around their pile of gold to weigh it up and measure their success.

When we think about modern day church missions, in many ways it's a lot like "Gold Rush." Our missionary leaves his home, travels to some far-off distant land for a season of time to discover new Believers. It's expensive, they work long hours and its often dangerous and boring. They meet and sift through thousands of people so they can "discover" a few souls made for heaven.

Just like those gold miners, missionaries don't make anything. God made all the gold there will ever be when He created the world and He alone made every believer. Our missionary simply digs them out of this sinful, dirty world to show all creation God's glory and His grace. True gold that shines forever because God loves to see the beauty of what He has made, and He loves for his "miners" to see it too.

Those gold miners are a team. Bulldozer operators, mechanics, engineers, geologists, women and men all working together, each one important to the effort. If one fails or doesn't do their job well, the pile of gold is smaller when they weigh it up but the gold in the ground is still there waiting to be found.

Missions are a team effort too and we are part of that team. While we may think our missionary goes off alone, in reality, we are a vital part of his success and we have a job to do. If we forget that and do our job poorly, then our missionary will struggle, and his job will be harder, more difficult and with less success so it's vital that we know our job and do it well.

While there are many ways to be a part of the mission team, let's consider a few things that we must do. In so doing, consider your part of the effort and where you can best fit in.

First, where do we dig? Dozens of missionaries approach Main Street every year seeking support. There are missions to almost every part of the world. All are important but our abilities are limited, and we turn most of them away. Main Street has a committee that prayerfully considers every request, making the difficult decision of who and where our limited funds are applied. Doing that job well requires a serious commitment to research and study, a real desire to know missionaries and their work. If you are interested in missions, this committee needs you!

Secondly, it takes time and time is money! The median family income in our town is \$34,977 per year. Based on a forty-hour week, that is \$16.81 per hour. If a family making the median income worked just one hour per week for missions this year, they would give \$875 to missions. Using the same formula, if a family making \$100,000 per year gives \$1000, then they worked 24 minutes per week for missions. How much time will you spend this year spreading the Gospel? How much will you give?

Thirdly, but most importantly, it ain't gold mining! It's not a job or a business. This is a spiritual adventure, a great mystery that no man understands, and heaven takes part in. The Apostle Peter tells us in his first book (Ch. 1, vs 11), even the angels in heaven long to see salvation at work! The goal is NOT how many Christians we discover and it's NOT about how much we can give or how hard we work. You see, we are already rich because we were "discovered" when we trusted in Christ. When we participate in

missions and see God at work today in the here and now in this wicked, sinful, very sick world, we rediscover how amazing and wonderful Jesus Christ is. We rediscover that we are His gold, refined by His precious blood and the Holy Spirit. We rediscover that we are part of something far bigger and greater than a little church in backwoods Mississippi. We are not looking for a reward, just enjoying and sharing the riches we already have! When we do so, we shine with the glory of God. So, our most important job is rejoicing and realizing just how much God loves us and the amazing result of that love.

One last thing that we must consider. As a child of God, our Father has given us an order, a very specific job that every single one of us must do. We don't have a choice about this job. We may not understand how it works in the mission process and we may not get to see what it accomplishes. We only know that God has ordered it. Considered the greatest missionary of all time, the apostle Paul wrote these words to the Ephesians in chapter six (vs 11-17), telling them to pray, "take the helmet of salvation and the sword of the spirit which is the word of God, praying at all times in the Spirit, with all prayer and supplication. To that end keep alert with all perseverance, making supplications for all the saints and also for me, that words may be given to me in opening my mouth boldly to proclaim the mystery of the gospel for which I am an ambassador in chains, that I may declare it boldly, as I ought to speak." If the Apostle Paul thought he needed prayer, don't you think our missionaries need it to?

So, pray and commit to praying this year on a regular basis for our missionaries, for your desire to understand more deeply the grace you enjoy and for those golden believers waiting to be discovered. Do it for the good of your own soul and enjoy the reward that you already have.

So, shine golden nugget, angels and heavenly creatures are looking at you!

Using biblical accounts of God's work in the world to help children understand God's character and other abstract theological truths,


Beginning Kids' Quest Volume


Grades 1-2


