SCAMMERS AMONG US

As reformed Christians, we are all familiar with the concept of the total depravity of man. None of us would ever doubt the validity of this teaching. Therefore, the plethora of phone, mail, and internet scams and the reality of internet viruses and the everpresent danger of having our financial information exploited should come as no surprise. Most of us are accustomed to using our phones, pads, and laptops to do everything from buying fast food to securing loans. The power to do such transactions in a moment is an incredible convenience. Unfortunately, the modern highwaymen, the scammers, the hackers, information brokers, and other predators lay in wait to take advantage of you. Recently, scammers targeted members of our church. Thankfully, to my knowledge, no harm was done. The targeted members recognized a scam in progress and were able to protect themselves. I am not qualified to take you through all the possible cons you should be aware of, and even if I were, there is not enough room in our newsletter for such a complete treatment of the subject. However, I would like to give you a few suggestions for recognizing and some tools for responding to a few of the technology-based scams currently happening in our area.

Phone Scams

Phone scammers are becoming more theatrical and more resourceful. Scammers gleaned phone numbers and names from our church bulletins, allowing them to call individuals and identify themselves as Pastor Todd in need of their financial assistance. Thankfully, those individuals knew Todd well enough to know it was not him. In a similar con, my mother was targeted by a scammer pretending to be my son. The scammer pretended to be her grandson calling on a line with a lot of background noise (to help disguise his voice), asking her to send bail money. While it upset and confused her, thankfully, she immediately called me, rather than respond directly to the scammer. I used some of the tools listed later in this article to report the con. There were no repeat attempts.

Email Scams

You probably have had your fill of email scams and recognize most of them, like the email from the foreign

person of means needing you to help him transfer money into the United States by using your financial information. Really? I have often wondered how many people fall for that one. Maybe you received a notification you had won a prize, but they need your credit card to bill you for the shipping costs. Recently the church office received an email that looked like a bill from Microsoft. The email stated that our account had been charged the annual fee for a particular software we use. If we felt the need to dispute the charge, there were instructions to call a specific phone number. There were several immediate giveaways about this scam. First, the software we were being charged for is free and part of the Windows 10 operating system. Second, although the email stated it was from Microsoft, the actual email was a personal Gmail account. Third, the phone number had periods between each digit to make it harder for scanning software to find it in the email. The goal of this ingenious email was to get someone to call and dispute the non-existent charge. Through such a conversation, the scammer hoped to fish for more useful information.

Software Invasion

There are many viruses, data-miners, trackers, ransomware, and other malicious and invasive software out there. Some of them are delivered by email, a link on a text or social media, or may ride piggy-back when you download free software. These range in severity from annoying adware to full-fledged ransomware. Your virus protection will shield you from most of these, but some will attempt to trick you into clicking on "OK," thus circumventing your virus protection.

The Huh? Factor

I think one of the keys to protecting yourself from all of these scams is to be suspicious and develop what I call "The Huh? Factor." If the phone call, text, email, or promise of clicking here sounds a little odd, stop, and say to yourself, "Huh?" Ask yourself, "Why would your pastor be calling to ask for financial help from you?" Why would your grandson call you from prison on a phone number that is half a continent from where he lives? Why would Microsoft charge me for free software? If you can make yourself stop and think instead of responding, you will probably realize things don't add up. I don't happen to know any wealthy princes who would need my credit information to help him move his fortune to America. Maybe you do.

Click-Not

Stop clicking! The email promising more information if you click "HERE" may be delivering a package you don't want. When the free software (that may well be an authentic bit of software) has the option for custom or recommended installation, look at the custom selection. It may allow you to de-select an additional piece of software or an add-on you don't want. (Even respectable software companies are guilty of this. Anyone else tired of Bing adding itself to your toolbar?)

GOOGLE IT!

One of the great benefits of the internet (besides the incredible ability to pass along pictures of cats) is access to the total sum of all human knowledge. OK, that may be an exaggeration. However, you can find out almost anything you want to by typing it into a search engine. If you are not sure Windows Defender is free or not, then ask the internet. Type that number that called you into a search window. Maybe someone else has had a call from that number.

Report It!

There is help. The Federal Trade Commission website has a link for researching possible scams and for reporting them.

Go to <u>https://www.consumer.ftc.gov/features/scam-</u> alerts. Todd searched there and found an article there about the Pastor Scam, which is very common. You can also go to AARP.ORG for scam information. If you get unwanted or scam calls on your phone, you should download the MS No Call app from your app store. The app lets you quickly report scams and unwanted calls. Using that app significantly reduced the number of unwanted calls I was getting after I started using it.

Nothing New Under the Sun

In Ecclesiastes, the writer declared there was nothing new under the sun. We may think the technological predators discussed above are something new, but they are not. There have always been liars, thieves, conmen, and scammers. They have always been there. There is nothing new about any of this. Don't throw away your phone or computer or give up using the benefits of technology. As in all other things, we must be smart, keep our eyes open, and use a little healthy suspicion.

JESUS STRONG AND KIND

A tender and simple hymn Jesus, Strong and Kind, written by Colin Buchanan, is a beautiful song for the children of God to sing together. It reminds us of our Savior's love for us. As soon as I heard it, I was thinking about how to share it and use it with my own children and the children here at Main Street. At our reopening of Sunday School on September 13, our Preschool through 6th Grade children began learning it.

It is a wonderfully simple song-simple enough for a 4-year-old to sing and remember. But it is not just a song for children. It is a song for God's children of all ages. It is a stirring reminder of the riches available to us in Jesus, as seen in the words.

Verses 1 to 3 speak of different experiences, showing how Jesus meets those needs: feeling thirsty but Jesus being our satisfaction; feeling weak but Jesus being our strength; feeling afraid and Jesus being our shield. In these verses we sing about how we should come to Jesus. The repeated chorus at the end of each verse builds on that reason, inviting us to take Jesus at His word, For the Lord is good and faithful, He will keep us day and night, Jesus, strong and kind ... For these reasons, come to Jesus.

For 3/4s of the song, the lyrics center around coming to Jesus. The fourth and final verse flips that around though and speaks of being lost but instead of coming to Him, this verse states that "He will come to me."

What makes a song like this such a blessing and source of hope on life's journey? It is because it simply but meaningfully points us to Jesus. It is a song of encouragement to us, the weak and broken, that Jesus came to seek and save the lost.


