Overview:

This briefing document summarizes the main themes and important ideas presented in a series of slides focusing on Romans 15:5-7, titled "Let Us Welcome One Another." This study aims to encourage the congregation to actively practice welcoming one another, drawing parallels to how Jesus welcomed people. The slides contrast this ideal with negative trends in contemporary culture and call for a genuine, grace-formed community rooted in love and acceptance.

Main Themes and Important Ideas:

1. Critique of Contemporary Culture:

- The slides juxtapose the call to welcome with negative cultural trends identified by past "words of the year": "BRAIN ROT" (2024), "GOBLIN MODE" (2022), "TOXIC" (2018), and "UNFRIEND" (2009).
- "The tone of our world wounds us in a thousand ways" (Ann Voskamp).

2. Jesus' Example of Welcoming:

- The core of the message rests on emulating Jesus' welcoming nature. The example from Luke 15:1-2 is used: "Now the tax collectors and sinners were all gathering around to hear Jesus. But the Pharisees and the teachers of the law muttered, 'This man welcomes sinners and eats with them.'"
- This story illustrates Jesus' radical inclusivity and willingness to associate with those marginalized and unfriended by society.
- The series emphasizes that we should "welcome one another as Christ has welcomed you" (Romans 15:7).

3. Understanding "Welcome":

- The Greek word for "welcome" (προσλαμβάνω - proslambano) is analyzed, highlighting its multifaceted meaning, "to take to oneself...", "to take as a companion or associate", "to receive kindly or hospitably", or "to admit into one's society and friendship"
- This breakdown underscores that welcoming is not passive but an active and intentional embrace of others into our lives and community.

4. The Foundation of Grace:

- The slides state, "Jesus' Family is a Grace-Formed Family."

- This is connected to the idea that "We Welcome One Another Because Jesus Christ Has Graciously Welcomed Us."
- The lyrics from "Just As I Am" ("Just as I am without one plea / but that Thy blood was shed for me / and that Thou midst me come to Thee, / O Lamb of God, I come") illustrate the unconditional welcome we receive from Christ.

5. Practical Implications and Self-Reflection:

- The series encourages personal introspection with the question: "Am I a welcoming person?"
- It suggests that our internal state is reflected externally: "Your heart is reflected in your face. A 'yes' face reflects a 'yes' heart. A 'no' face reflects a 'no' heart."
- Mother Teresa's quote, "Every time you smile, it is an act of love, a gift to that person, a beautiful thing," reinforces the importance of simple, outward expressions of welcome.

6. The Call to Be a Welcoming Church:

- The series extends the personal challenge to the collective, asking: "Are we a welcoming church?"
- A poignant question is posed: "If God wanted to send someone to a church in BCS where they would be sure to be welcomed, would he want to send them to MHC?" This directly challenges the congregation to assess their welcoming culture.

7. Distinguishing Community from a Club:

- The slides differentiate between a genuine gospel community and a mere "club" formed by self-selected individuals.
- "We often surround ourselves with the people we most want to live with, thus forming a club or clique, not a community. Anyone can form a club; it takes grace, shared vision, and hard work to form a community" (Phillip Yancey).

8. A Call to Action:

- The series concludes with a call to action, referencing the repeated commands in the New Testament to "Greet one another..." (Romans 16:16, 1 Corinthians 16:20, 2 Corinthians 13:12, 1 Peter 5:14).
- This suggests a practical application of the welcoming principle in everyday interactions within the church.

Conclusion:

The "Let Us Welcome One Another" message at Mercy Hill Church powerfully utilizes Romans 15:5-7 as a foundation for encouraging a culture of genuine welcome within the congregation. By contrasting this biblical call with perceived negative trends in contemporary society and highlighting Jesus' radical inclusivity, the slides urge members to actively embrace and accept one another. The emphasis on grace, the analysis of the word "welcome," and the call for self-reflection and communal assessment provide a comprehensive framework for fostering a truly welcoming gospel community, distinct from mere social clubs. The inclusion of numerous supporting scriptures reinforces the biblical imperative for this "one another-ing."
