- The return of Christ ("The end of all things is at hand") serves as a motivator for believers to live with intentionality, being "self-controlled and sober-minded for the sake of your prayers." (Sermon quoting 1 Peter 4:7).

2. Love as the Foundation for Hospitality:

- Above all else, Christians are called to "keep loving one another earnestly, since love covers a multitude of sins." (1 Peter 4:8).
- The speaker emphasizes the intensity of this love, noting that the word "earnestly" is the same word used to describe Jesus' fervent prayer in the Garden of Gethsemane.
- Showing hospitality is presented as a direct outworking of this earnest love. The Apostle Paul's words in Romans are cited: "Love one another with brotherly affection. Outdo one another in showing honor... Contribute to the needs of the saints and seek to show hospitality." (Romans 12:10 & 13).

4. The Imperative of Showing Hospitality:

The New Testament consistently emphasizes the importance of hospitality: "Show hospitality to one another..." (1 Peter 4:9), "seek to show hospitality" (Romans 12:13), and "Do not neglect to show hospitality" (Hebrews 13:2).

Carl Henry is quoted stating, "Christian hospitality is a matter of obedience to God." (Sermon and Slides).'

5. Hospitality as an Overflow of God's Grace and a Means of Glorifying Him:

- Just as God has shown hospitality to us through Christ, we are called to extend that same welcome to others. "If we have experienced the hospitality of God in Jesus Christ, then it should overflow our lives into the lives of others."
- Our individual gifts are to be used to serve one another, including the gift of hospitality: "As each has received a gift, use it to serve one another as good stewards of God's varied grace." (1 Peter 4:10).
- The ultimate purpose of showing hospitality is "that in everything God may be glorified through Jesus Christ." (1 Peter 4:11).

6. Overcoming Excuses and Focusing on Presence:

- The sermon acknowledges potential excuses for not showing hospitality (e.g., busy schedules, messy homes) but challenges listeners to evaluate these excuses.
- The emphasis is shifted from striving for perfection to simply being present with others and extending a welcoming spirit. "Biblical hospitality doesn't aim to impress, but to bless."

7. The Transformative Power of Hospitality:

- The illustration of the Grinch's heart growing three sizes is used to highlight the potential for personal and communal growth through the act of hospitality. "Extending hospitality to others is both an act of love and a means of growing your capacity to love."
- Neglecting hospitality, conversely, can lead to a shrinking of the heart and a weakening of the Christian community.
- Showing hospitality is directly linked to the mission of the church, demonstrating the love of Christ to the world and inviting others to experience it.

Conclusion:

The sermon argues that showing hospitality is not an optional extra for Christians but a vital expression of love, obedience to God, and a direct consequence of experiencing God's own welcoming grace. It calls for a redefinition of hospitality, moving away from the pursuit of perfection towards a genuine presence and willingness to share our lives with others. By embracing hospitality, individuals and the Christian community can grow in love, glorify God, and effectively demonstrate the transformative power of the Gospel to the world.
