
Heads up! This is one of the more challenging and difficult teachings of Jesus in the Gospel of Luke.

Archelaus, son of Herod the Great (23BC-c.18AD)



- Inherited a portion of his father's kingdom (4BC-6AD)
- Jesus' father, Joseph, heard that Archelaus was reigning over Judea, and "was afraid to go there" (Matthew 2:22)
- Quelled an uprising led by the Pharisees at the Temple by slaughtering 3000 people

Expository Commentary

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The word 'wicked' may sound severe, but that is how Jesus described him. Really, what else would you call a servant who refused to obey his master's command, slandered his master's good name, and





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was so afraid of making a mistake that he failed to do what he was supposed to do? According to Jesus, it is wickedness not to use what we have to serve our God.

The Gospel of Luke 19:11-28

28 And when he had said these things, he went on ahead going up to Jerusalem.



As he approached Jerusalem and saw the city, he wept over it and said, "If you, even you, had only known on this day what would bring you peace—but now it is hidden from your eyes.

The days will come upon you when your enemies will build an embankment against you and encircle you and hem you in on every side. They will dash you to the ground, you and the children within your walls. They will not leave one stone on another, because you did not recognize the time of God's coming to you.


The Jerusalem Sinner Saved — John Bunyan 1628-1688 —

One would have thought, since the Jerusalem sinners were the worst and greatest sinners— **Christ's greatest enemies—and** those that not only despised his person, doctrine, and miracles, but that a little before had their hands up to the elbows in his heart-blood, that he should rather have said, Go into all the world, and preach repentance


and remission of sins among all nations; and after that offer the same grace to Jerusalem; yes, it would have been infinite grace if he had said so. But what grace is this..., when it commands that this repentance and remission of sins, which is designed to be preached to all nations, should first of all be offered to Jerusalem, in the place of the worst of sinners!



Here is a trustworthy saying that deserves full acceptance: Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners of whom I am the worst.




But for that very reason I was shown mercy so that in me, the worst of sinners, Christ Jesus might display his immense patience as an example for those who would believe in him and receive eternal life.
